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It was the late 1970s. This sort of thing wasn't all that common: a woman, in her 40s, pregnant. She did a lot of crying. Granted, she might have been "expecting," but she and her husband weren't expecting *this*! Not at her age. It was unplanned. It was unconventional. It was life changing.

Moreover, there was real cause to have concern — health concerns. With her first child there had been birth complications - terrible ones. Not to mention, she and her husband had just suffered a devastating miscarriage. So the doctors warned her of the increased risk of "birth defects" for babies born to aging mothers. Her Lutheran pastor was also aware of the potential health risks. So he went out of his way to reassure her that if she wanted to terminate her pregnancy because of the potential "defects," her Lutheran church would stand with her in her decision. So would God.

Thankfully, I'm glad my mother didn't listen to her pastor. I happen to enjoy my life.

Yet I hope each of us do just that this Advent and Christmas season; listen to our pastors that is. Listen to them tell the story of something that wasn't all that common 2000 years ago: a woman, probably in her teens, pregnant... but with no husband to speak of. Perhaps she did a lot of crying too. She might have been "expecting," but Mary and Joseph weren't expecting *this*! Talk about unplanned! Talk about unconventional! Talk about life changing!

Though, isn't this *exactly* what we're expecting this Advent and Christmas: A baby that is going to change our lives too. And that's Good News! At least that's what the angel called it when speaking to some shepherds near Bethlehem. It's Gospel. Good News that gets spoken in

our ears each week too. Forgiveness, life, and salvation that is placed in our lowly manger, our lips, this season. His life, His death, and His resurrection that we have been baptized into, completely changing life as we know it. Yours and mine. Body and soul. A life we enjoy now, but a fulfillment that is not yet. New life that is nothing less than the holistic redemption of *all* creation.

Turns out, Jesus is holistically pro-life.

Just like Lifeline hopes to be, holistically pro-life that is; and hopes to encourage you to be until Jesus' Second Coming. Yes, abortion is an important issue to address

individually and as the body of Christ in our society, but it is not the *only* pro-life issue. Being holistically pro-life includes offering post-abortion support (something at which we



The Singing Church

Christmas greetings to you, beloved, in the Incarnate Son of God, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ:

Historically, ever since the 1500s, the Evangelical Lutheran Church has been known as “the singing Church.” Luther restored congregational singing. The laity were no longer spectators of a Divine Service but were singing worshippers, giving honor and glory to God in song. The Advent-Christmas-Epiphany season of the Church Year is known for its singing.

My prayer to the Lord God is that He help us always to be “*a singing church.*” That it would not just be the clergy, choir, or a praise band doing the singing, but that all of God’s people would sing His praises.

Years ago as a parish pastor, the congregations I served sang lots of hymns and carols of the season. Select stanzas, to be sure. The people loved it. They cherished singing so many of the favorite hymns and carols and songs, including a few beautiful but more challenging ones. And, yes, we even sang a stanza of “**O Come, All Ye Faithful**” in Latin.

Adeste fidelis, laeti triumphantes,

Venite, venite in Bethlehem.

Natum videte, Regem angelorum.

Venite adoramus, venite adoramus,

Venite adoramus, Dominum.

If you need that first stanza in English go to LSB 379.

What makes such a hymn endearing is not just a pretty, simple tune. It is the words, drawn from Holy Scripture (Luke 2, John 1). Let’s look at those words:

First, there is the invitation to the faithful as disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ to **come to Bethlehem**. We sing this to ourselves. We invite ourselves in a spirit of Christian joy and triumph to return to our blessed Savior’s birthplace. The word, “come” is again stated to **behold Him, “born the King of ages.”** Jesus, Son of the Heavenly Father and born of Mary, was and is the Messiah who came as the King of all humanity to rescue fallen humanity from the perils of our sins. We

come and adore Him.

Twenty-first century folk are not in the habit of adoring. Instead, we “worship.” Sadly, fellow North Americans “worship” sports heroes, Hollywood and media stars, and business tycoons, including some who are Christians. Too easily we put people of status, even those in the Church, up on pedestals. There is a lot of false “worship” in our culture of the current and next American idol or super-star.

Only One is to be worshipped and adored, the Triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We adore the Babe of Bethlehem, born to be our blessed Redeemer from sin. “Adore” means to hold in holy awe. It is a holy fear of God born out of love and deepest respect.

Each year at our Concordias and campus ministries, there are unique Christmas events. At one of our Concordias, CUAA (Concordia University-Ann Arbor), there is an annual Boarshead Festival, a **continued on page 3**

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Christmas commemoration, held in early December. Each year, the same two men serve as good King Wenceslas and head shepherd. The head shepherd is an older man who has a marvelous look of great awe on his face. His countenance is radiant. I wish you could see it!

At Fairlawn Lutheran Church in Akron, Ohio it is. Have you ever felt God laying an idea on your heart that scared and overwhelmed you? Operation Backpack was that idea for me this year. I am sure you can relate when I say “I am busy”; my list goes on and on just like I am sure yours does.

I know in my head that God cares very little about how much stuff I think I have to get done. He has this amazing ability to see the whole picture and see just how you and I will fit in nicely to His plan. All He asks in return is that we trust Him, trust that he has it all figured out and that He would not call us if He hadn't already orchestrated it all to work out for His glory. We are three weeks into our ministry.

God has provided money, time and a new found excitement to help those in need, not only in my life, but in the children, youth and adults I serve. I would encourage you to see where God is working and follow His lead. There are sick, dying and hungry people, both physically and spiritually. God cares about each one of them.

So if God is leaning into you, or laying some ministry idea on your heart, I would urge you to step out in faith and begin to take the steps to make it happen. He has it all planned and is including you in the service of His people. Won't you join Him?



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On Monday, September 29, 2014, ***Our Savior, Hartland, MI***, hosted a conference to discuss topics of Church and State. The conference, entitled *The Body of Christ and the Public Square*, was the brainchild of Rev. Christopher Thoma of Our Savior, and brought together nationally renowned speakers – historians, legal advisors, educators and politicians – with an assembly of pastors and lay leaders of Missouri Synod Lutheran churches. “The purpose of the event was to learn first-hand from people who are well-respected experts in particular fields how we as Christians can engage in the public square faithfully and fully,” said Rev. Thoma. “Unfortunately, when it comes to precise issues of ‘Church and State’ or ‘religious liberty,’ many pastors and churches exist in uncertainty.” Speaking over lunch, Michigan Senator Joe Hune urged those present to vote according to Biblical principles and encourage others to do so, too.

The sponsorship of Fabianne from Bolivia went well with letters being traded between her and the youth until her family moved. In 2012 the youth continued sharing God’s love by sponsoring Karely, also from Bolivia. Two years later the youth continue to write her letters and cards that let Karely know that they love her and Jesus loves her. The youth group donates \$38 a month to Compassion for Karely

that she might find love, encouragement and hope for the future.

School News

Advent Lutheran Preschool going strong after 14 years

The mission of Advent Lutheran Preschool, Zionsville, IN, is not unlike many Lutheran schools in the country. With the understanding that children are a gift from God, Advent's school staff endeavors to proclaim the gospel to their students. Advent's school doors opened in 2000.

Over the past fourteen years, the early childhood programs have included a Mom's Morning Out program for 2-year-olds, 3- and 4-year-old Preschool, Pre-Kindergarten, and an enriched curriculum class titled Explore.

In 2012 the state of Indiana extended half-day kindergarten programs to full day programs in public schools. Many other private and parochial schools followed suit. Because Advent is a self-supporting school apart from the church's budget, frugal stewardship of tuition and fundraising resources were needed in order to fill the subsequent niche in programming. With trust in God's mercy, Advent school opened one section of half-day kindergarten in September 2013.

The class roster included 14 students, and was taught by Mrs. Lois Dooms. Despite the fewer minutes of instruction, the curriculum contains best practices in literacy and math, with writing and science, large motor time, as well as daily religious circle time and weekly



chapel services.

"The opportunity to see the growth not only of students' reading and math, but more importantly the increase in their love of God and understanding of the faith is a blessing to me as a teacher," said Mrs. Dooms. Parents have also endorsed Advent's classes at all levels with an over 95% approval rating in the end of the year survey. The kindergarten offering continues this school year with six students. In a time when opinions on educational priorities abound, the simple humble work of Advent's school staff is a daily light to the true Teacher who blesses His children beyond the gift of a temporal education with the gift of eternal life.

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Zion, Detroit, MI hosted the 17th annual St. Michael Liturgical Conference, Monday, September 29, 2014. The keynote speaker, Rev. Dr. D. Richard Stuckwisch (Emmaus, South Bend, IN) presented on "The Pastoral Care of Catechumens and Communicants." Additional presenters included Rev. Fr. Joel Baseley (Emmanuel, Dearborn, MI); Rev. Fr. Burnell Eckardt (St. Paul, Kewanee, IL); and Rev. Dr. Daniel Reuning (Redeemer, Fort Wayne, IN). The conference began with Holy Mass commemorating St. Michael, Archangel. Rev. Fr. David Petersen (Redeemer, Fort Wayne, IN) served as the preacher; President/Bishop David Stechholz presided. Next year's conference is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 28, 2015.



What are Parish Nurses and how do they help our congregations?

According to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) website, “Health ministry helps congregations care for one another by attaining, maintaining and/or regaining the best possible whole person health—wellness of body, mind and spirit—that can be experienced.”

It is done with help from health professionals and other interested lay members, and they support the spiritual and health needs of the congregation.

Additionally, the LCMS website states that, “The parish nurse is a registered nurse who is committed to — and, on a broad level, is an integral part of — this concept of health ministries. He/she works with the members of the health ministry committee or health cabinet, helping and enabling people of the congregation and the community attain, maintain and/or regain optimal health. Parish nursing is a unique blending of professional nursing and spiritual care-giving.”

Registered nurses are encouraged to become part of this ministry, and there are two, four-day introductory courses offered in 2015:

March 16-19, 2015 and May 4-7, 2015

These courses will be held on the campus of Concordia University, Wisconsin. If you are interested, but can't attend onsite, there is an off-site distance learning format. Materials will be mailed to you and you will work with a mentor to complete the course. Partial scholarships are available.

May 27-28, 2015 is the 23rd Annual Parish Nurse

Conference, “Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus,” which will be held on the campus of Concordia University Wisconsin. There are some very special scholarship incentives to attend:

* \$75 scholarships for first-time LCMS RN's attending the conference.

* Full conference scholarships to the 23rd annual conference to LCMS clergy.
