Toolbox Ideas, Suggestions and Handy Bits




Lawn Signs

Advertising all your special services to the community can be done in a variety of unique ways. This can include everything from display ads in your local paper to making full use of the lawn outside of your door.

You may wish to consider having a full-color banner

made for your church lawn. There are a number of <u>companies</u> which make them. If you have your service at the same time each year you could consider leaving the date off and simply include the times for Good Friday and Easter services so that they can be used again the following year.

Our LCMS produces <u>Media Kits for</u> <u>Congregational Use</u>. Each of these can be personalized with your parish's information. This tells your community that what's coming is an event that's too good to miss.



Lawn Displays

Here's a great opportunity to take advantage of your lawn and the traffic along the street in front of your church. Consider erecting three crosses for Lent and



Easter. These can be made easily using lumber from your local hardware store. You can even drape a white cloth over the center cross for Easter.

Consider creating a simple closed/open tomb display using plywood. (See a similar table top version

on next page for an example.) You can also purchase readymade displays



<u>Easter scenes</u> featuring Jesus, Mary, Cross, Tomb and Stone.

Nativity Scenes, for your church's front lawn during Advent and Christmas, can be <u>purchased</u>. Plans are available from a number of sources online for you to build your own using plywood. They can be <u>simple</u> or quite <u>elaborate</u>. A simple silhouette scene can also be made easily by enlarging public domain clipart with a projector and tracing it onto plywood.



A Viral Video

Try your hand at creating a "viral video" that you can put on your web site and social media, and which your members can share. They can be



produced with little to no cost and can be prepared by any size congregation. Now before you pass this off as a gimmick, consider this example.

<u>Here is one</u> that was recorded by Rev. Robert Bugbee who, at the time it was made, was the president of Lutheran Church–Canada and served as Vice-Chairman of the International Lutheran Council. It's called "Good News from the Cemetery." It was taped fourteen years ago. Since that time it has racked up over 8,000 views. It's remarkable! It makes me smile every time I see it and it's a wonderful and simple reminder of what the celebration of Good Friday and Easter is all about. For your video, be sure and include your church address, contact information and special service times.

Invitation Cards

Consider preparing Invitation Cards which members can share with their friends and family. These can be digital eCards that vou make available on your website for your members to share with family and friends in their email, texts and social media. You could also design paper invitations which members themselves can print on their home computers. You could even have them produced professionally so that members could pick them up from your table at church.



These invitations can be much more than simply a vague invitation to worship. Have the text include an invitation, from the one sharing it, to pick up those who are being invited and bring them to church. If a ride offer is not feasible for some members then consider including text with the invitation, "Meet me at church and I'll save you a spot beside me."

Table Displays for Homes

Do you have someone in your congregation who enjoys woodwork? You may wish to invite them to make Lent/Easter scenes. Using scrap wood and a jigsaw a simple tomb scene can be created with a



moveable "rock" to seal the tomb until Easter morning. Your scene could even include a small cross. It can become a conversation piece for families and children can look forward to moving back the stone on Easter morning.



<u>Simple precut nativity</u> <u>decorations</u> can be included with invitations that your members share with friends. They can be purchased in bulk for as little as four cents each.

Advent and Lent Craft Event and Invitation

You may wish to have a craft morning with the young parents and children in your congregation. This can be a Saturday morning evangelism event to which these

event to which these same families can invite their friends. You can also extend an invitation to your neighbors.

Using cardboard rolls, along with <u>free</u> <u>downloadable</u> <u>patterns</u>, crayons, color pencils and paste, it's an inexpensive craft



that also presents opportunities to share the Gospel. (If you're going to extend the invitation to your neighborhood you will want to encourage members to start collecting cardboard rolls early.) This even can also provide an opportunity to extend an invitation to Christmas services and Sunday School.

You can also find free downloadable patterns to make "He is Risen!" scene for easter using paper plates.



Pulpit Rotation

Pulpit rotations during Advent and Lent were once very popular in the past. On the surface, it seems that this would lighten the load during the holiday season. After all, each pastor prepares one message to take with them to each of the congregations. However it actually involves



extra planning. This may be one of the reasons they have all but disappeared in recent years. However, the extra work may well be worth it.

While having one mass service together is also wonderful, there are some benefits that are unique with having a midweek rotation. They provide a number of opportunities for outreach. You can advertise the services, theme, sermon titles and visiting preachers in your local newspaper, on your signage, on your website and in your social media. Having a guest speaker is something that gets attention.

A rotation also brings other salutary benefits. It builds a better appreciation of our fellowship in Christ. In the event that there is an emergency during the rest of the year, or funeral that takes place while the pastor is away, the neighboring pastor who will come to assist will be a welcome and familiar face.

Need a common theme with prepared

artwork and services? Consider adapting one of the season packages prepared by Concordia Publishing House as a springboard to get the creative juices flowing. In many cases they include ready-made logos and media kit for promotional use.

Choir / Ensemble Rotation

Members who enjoy singing can form a traveling choir (small or large) which also participates in a rotation between the congregations. This also works well for an instrumental ensemble. (Create a different schedule so as not to follow the same pastor and hear the same sermon during the series.) Churches could include this in a news release to their local media.

Caroling
