

Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness. (Matthew 3:15)

In His Baptism in the Jordan River, the perfect Son of God became sin as He began His work of redemption for us and for all sinners that would end on the Cross. Our Lord literally put Himself in our shoes (or sandals)! He needed to do this in order to carry out God's plan for salvation. Christ needed to become poor and weak to win victory for us over sin, death, and the devil. In our Baptism, we join in His death and resurrection, as God crucifies our old selves and raises us to new life, declares us righteous and free from the effects of sin, and grants us eternal life in Him. God does all of the work; we bring nothing to the table except the sin which we all have in common.

Consider that, in becoming weak, Jesus identified with the weakest among us. They too are included in God's plan of salvation. In truth, when measured up to His standard of perfection, we all are weak. God shows no partiality; all human lives matter to Him! And this includes our non-believing neighbors with whom we share the Good News, praying that God will use our words to bring them as well to the waters of Baptism and eternal life in Him. Like every day in the Church Year, the Baptism of our Lord truly proclaims the sanctity of all human life, from fertilization to forever.
