

THE CONVENTION ELECTION PROCEDURE

Nomination and election procedures are prescribed in the Synod *Handbook*, District Bylaws, and the District *Corporate Operations Manual*.

Four different procedures are prescribed according to the office involved:

- 1) Nomination and Election of the District President is governed by District Bylaw 5.2. Nominations for the office of President (Bishop & President) are directed by the District Secretary from the congregations to the Convention. The Committee on Nominations has no input. All congregations may nominate up to two candidates for President from the ordained minister roster of the Synod. The five pastors with the highest number of nominations for President who accept nomination are placed on the ballot. No nominations are permitted from the floor of the Convention. A candidate receiving a majority of votes cast shall be declared elected. If a second or succeeding ballot is required to reach a majority, the candidate receiving the fewest votes shall be dropped from the ballot. Balloting shall continue until a candidate is elected by majority vote.
- 2) Nomination and Election of District Vice Presidents is governed by District Bylaw 5.3. Nominations for the office of Vice President are directed by the District Secretary from the congregations to the Convention. The Committee on Nominations has no input. All congregations of the District may nominate up to two candidates for Vice President from the ordained minister roster of their own District region. The three pastors from each region with the highest number of nominations for Vice President who accept nomination are placed on the ballot. (In case of a tie in the number of nominations, all those tied and who accept nomination are placed on the ballot.) No nominations are permitted from the floor of the Convention. The Convention as a whole elects each Vice President. A candidate receiving a majority of votes cast shall be declared elected. If a second or succeeding ballot is required to reach a majority, the candidate receiving the fewest votes shall be dropped from the ballot. Balloting shall continue until a candidate is elected by majority vote. After all Vice Presidents are elected, they are ranked by ballot by the whole Convention, First through Fourth Vice President.
- 3) To elect Circuit Visitors, each circuit shall meet prior to the District Convention as a Circuit Forum and select a Circuit Visitor for the coming triennium (Synod Bylaw 5.2.2), with ratification of the slate of Circuit Visitors by the District Convention. Nominations for the office of Circuit Visitor may be submitted by a voting congregation of the circuit or suggested by the District President in consultation with the Praesidium of the District. If a circuit fails to select a Circuit Visitor, the District President shall appoint one. The Convention shall have the right to alter the slate by amendment. The Convention shall then ratify the slate of Circuit Visitors, which ratification shall constitute the election.
- 4) At least two nominees for District Secretary, elected members of the Board of Directors, the Endowment Fund Board of Managers, and Committee on Nominations are selected by the Committee on Nominations from those submitted to them by the congregations, individual members of the District, and members of District congregations. This Convention's Committee on Nominations was elected at the 2022 District Convention. Additional nominations are permitted from the floor of the Convention provided a written "consent to serve if elected" statement is submitted to the District Secretary. Candidates receiving a majority on the first ballot shall be declared elected. When a second or succeeding ballot is required to reach a majority, the candidates receiving the fewest votes and all candidates receiving less than 15% of the votes cast shall be dropped from the ballot, unless fewer than two candidates received 15% or more of the votes cast, in which case the three highest

candidates shall constitute the ballot. In every election balloting shall continue until every position has been filled by majority vote.

The Bishop/President and Vice Presidents, and the District Secretary, Circuit Visitors, Board of Directors, Committee on Nominations and Endowment Fund Board of Managers in attendance will be installed at the closing worship service.

PROPOSED STANDING RULES

- 1. Delegates wishing to address the Convention, when recognized by the Chair, shall state their names and the names of their congregations or other entity of the district they represent.
- 2. The voting body is composed of the voting delegates, one pastoral and one lay delegate, from each congregation or parish of the District. Voting delegates are expected to attend all sessions of the Convention. They must wear their badges at all sessions and sit in the sections reserved for voting delegates.
- 3. An electronic response system shall ordinarily be used to register votes. When not in use for motions before the Convention, the Chair shall call for a voice vote OR the raising of the right hand.
- 4. Questions of privilege shall ordinarily be addressed in writing to the Chair, or his appointee, instead of consuming Convention time.
- 5. Resolutions prepared by the floor committees which are not acted upon by the Convention before adjournment die. The subject matter may be reintroduced at the next Convention by means of an overture.
- 6. Unless covered by the Bylaws of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, the Bylaws of the English District, or the standing rules of the Convention, parliamentary procedure shall be governed by the most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order.
- 7. When speaking to the question on the floor, a delegate shall attempt to speak directly for or against the question. No delegate may speak more than twice to each question unless consent has been given by two-thirds (2/3) of the delegates. There is a two-minute speaking rule. Speakers must address their remarks to the chair or through the chair.
- 8. Any unfinished item of business or program at a time set for recess in the Convention Agenda will be resumed at the following session or at a time designated by the Chair.
- 9. Announcements should be submitted to the Chair. At his discretion, announcements will be made from the podium; others will be posted on message boards or distributed to delegates in other forms.
- 10. If a substitute motion is offered and seconded, the presenter shall be given two minutes to provide the rationale for offering it. The Convention shall then first decide by majority vote without debate whether or not to consider the substitute. If the decision is in the affirmative and the substitute motion is subsequently adopted, the original motion fails; if the substitute motion does not receive favorable action, either to consider or to adopt, the original motion shall again be placed before the house for debate.
- 11. The use of electronic devices (e.g. tablets, cell phones, and laptops) shall be permitted in the delegate section of the Convention. These devices must have the sound on "mute" at all times and should only be used for Convention business, such as viewing the Convention Workbook online. Courtesy, discernment, and good churchmanship should be demonstrated at all times with the use of such devices and must not distract from each delegate's responsibilities.
- 12. The standing rules may be suspended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the voting body.

GENERAL RULES OF DEBATE

- 1. A member who desires to speak in debate must obtain the floor by permission of the chair.
- 2. Each member has the right to speak twice on the same question on the same day but cannot make a second speech on the same question so long as any member who has not yet spoken on that question desires the floor.
- 3. No one can speak longer than permitted by the rules of the assembly.
- 4. Debate must be confined to the merits of the pending question.
- 5. Speakers must address their remarks to the chair or through the chair.
- 6. Speakers must maintain a courteous tone and avoid injecting personal notes or attacking another member's motives.
- 7. Speakers should refer to officers by title only.
- 8. Speakers should avoid the mention of other members' names as much as possible.
- 9. The presiding officer should not enter into discussion of the merits of pending question. If the chair feels compelled to do so, he/she must relinquish the chair to a different presiding officer before speaking to the question at hand.
- 10. The presiding officer cannot close debate so long as any member who has not exhausted his right to debate desires the floor, except by order of the assembly (calling the question to terminate debate), which requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

A. Purpose of Parliamentary Law and Procedure

Parliamentary procedure assists a deliberative and decision-making assembly in carrying out its purpose and aims in an orderly, fair, and expeditious manner.

It is not the purpose of parliamentary procedure to make the conduct of business in an assembly difficult, to entangle an assembly in technicalities, or to provide a channel for individuals to flaunt their parliamentary knowledge.

Parliamentary law protects six basic rights:

- 1) The right of the majority to make a decision;
- 2) The right of the minority to be heard in hopes that it may become the majority;
- 3) The right of absentees to be protected;
- 4) The right of the assembly to be comfortable and to hear;
- 5) The right of the individual member to be honored;
- 6) And the orderly consideration of one subject at a time.

B. Basic Steps of Parliamentary Procedure

The chair and members of the assembly should be acquainted with and observe eight basic parliamentary steps to take care of convention business in an orderly and fair manner:

MEMBERS:

- 1. Address the Chair: "Rev. Chair" (or "Rev. Bishop" or "Rev. President"). The members asking for the floor must identify themselves by name and congregation or other entity of the district they represent.
- 2. Await recognition by the Chair.
- 3. Make the motion. "I move that..."
- 4. Second the motion (unless not required).

CHAIR:

- 5. States the motion (or rules it out of order).
- 6. Calls for discussion (unless motion is undebatable).

 Ample opportunity must always be given for expression of opinion and for discussion.
- 7. Takes the vote (or "calls the question").
 A tie vote defeats the motion since a majority is required to adopt unless the motion requires a 2/3 vote.
- States the results.
 The vote does not go into effect until the results are announced.

C. Basic Parliamentary Principles for Convention

- 1. A district delegate convention is a parliamentary assembly called to deliberate and to make decisions. It receives the reports of the district president, executive staff, board of directors and various committees or mission action teams. In addition, the Convention deliberates and makes decisions on recommended resolutions of designated floor committees, which have considered proposed resolutions (overtures) from congregations.
- 2. All voting delegates have equal rights, privileges, and obligations.
- 3. The vote of the majority decides. The will of a District Convention is determined by the taking of a vote.
- 4. Free discussion of every proposition or resolution presented for decision is an established right for all delegates, voting and advisory. To accomplish the closure of debate a delegate must gain the recognition of the chair and, without any comment for or against the pending resolution, say, "I move the previous question." If seconded, this motion is put to an immediate vote. If adopted by a two-thirds majority, discussion is finished, and the pending resolution is put to the assembly without further debate. The convention has the right to decide when it has heard sufficient discussion. This right, however, should be exercised with restraint.
- 5. Both proponents and opponents of a given proposal have rights, which must be safeguarded. The decision belongs to the majority, but the right to discuss, the right to be heard, and the right to oppose should be upheld. A member of the majority on one question is often a member of the minority on another.
- 6. The simplest and most direct parliamentary procedure for accomplishing a purpose should be followed rather than taking devious routes and multiplying technicalities.
- 7. Every delegate has the right to know what question is before the Convention and what its effect will be, for every action taken by a deliberative body should be taken knowledgeably.
- 8. Voting delegates are not bound and are not to be bound by previous instructions of their home or neighboring congregations.

A Basic Primer of Parliamentary Procedure

I. Purpose of Parliamentary Law and Procedure

The purpose of parliamentary procedure is to carry out the aims of the assembly in an orderly and fair manner, to expedite business, to ensure justice and fairness to all, both the majority and the minority.

It is not the purpose of parliamentary procedure to make the conduct of business in an assembly difficult, or to entangle an assembly in technicalities, or to provide a channel for individuals to flaunt their parliamentary knowledge. The purpose is to make business flow more smoothly and make it easier for everyone.

II. Parliamentary Procedure at a Glance

The motions or points listed below, 1 through 9, are in order of precedence.

In other words:

- A. When any of them is pending, you may not introduce one listed below it.
- B. You may introduce one that is listed above it.

- A. When a motion to adjourn is pending
- B. When a motion to recess is pending
- C. When a point of privilege is pending.

IV. Substitute Motions

If a substitute motion is offered and seconded, the presenter shall be given two minutes to provide the rationale for offering it. The Convention shall then first decide by majority vote without debate whether or not to consider the substitute. If the decision is in the affirmative and the substitute motion is subsequently adopted, the original motion fails; if the substitute motion does not receive favorable action, either to consider or to adopt, the original motion shall again be placed before the house for debate.

GLOSSARY OF PARLIAMENTARY TERMS

Ad Hoc Committee: Special committee with a limited assignment and a limited life.

Advisory Delegate: A certified member of the Convention with the right to speak without vote; however, if appointed to a floor committee, entitled to vote there.

Agenda: List of items of Convention business "to be done.

Alternate: A full-time substitute to take the place of a delegate to the Convention, if necessary.

Amend: To change or modify a resolution or motion.

Appeal: An appeal from a decision of the chair requires that the decision be referred to the Convention for its immediate decision by a vote.

Audit: Official examination and verification of accounts.

Bylaw: A rule of the District ranking immediately below the constitution in authority and above standing rules.

Call the Question: A subject or point of debate or a resolution being or to be voted on.

Chair: The presiding officer of the Convention, usually the President, or temporarily a Vice President.

Constitution: The statement of the basic principles and structures of the Synod, the highest continuing authority created by the association of congregations, pastors, and teachers constituting the Synod. The Synod Constitution is also the constitution of all of its Districts.

Division in the House: A vote taken by rising or electronic device to verify a voice vote at the call of the Chair or at the request of a voting delegate.

Floor Committee: A working group of Convention voting and advisory delegates to whom the processing of a share of Convention business is entrusted for recommendation in turn to the Convention proper.

General Consent: An informal method of disposing of routine and generally favored proposals by assuming approval of a request unless immediate objection is raised.

Handbook: A manual containing the District or Synod Articles of Incorporation, Constitution, and Bylaws.

In Order: Correct from a parliamentary standpoint at a given time.

Majority: More than half the votes cast. The Synod Constitution provides: "All matters of doctrine and of conscience shall be decided only by the Word of God. All other matters shall be decided by a majority vote" (Article VIII.C). This means a majority in all instances except those which involve a proposed constitutional amendment; these require a two-thirds affirmative vote of all votes cast. All elections are determined not by simple plurality but by absolute majority.

Out of Order: Not correct from a parliamentary standpoint at that particular time.

Overture (Memorial): A recommendation or proposed resolution submitted by a member congregation or other authorized group for consideration by the convention.

Parliamentarian: A person designated by the Chair to advise him on the applicability of parliamentary principles and procedures in a given situation.

Pending: Not yet decided. A pending motion is one that has been stated by the Chair but is not yet disposed of by vote.

Point of Order: Any delegate may promptly call attention to the fact that the rules of the Convention are seemingly not in force by saying, "I rise to a point of order." Upon hearing the point made, the Chair rules as to its validity.

Postpone: To defer action on a question or proposed resolution (1) indefinitely or (2) until a certain specified time.

Preamble: The introductory part of a resolution or report, usually in the form of whereas clauses. The assembly has the right to perfect these since they are part of the resolution when presented together with the resolves.

Previous Question: The motion calling for the previous question stops all discussion or debate if two-thirds of the voting delegates vote "aye" after a motion has been made and seconded to call for the previous question. When two-thirds of the voting delegates have responded "aye," the Chair must immediately call a vote on the motion pending before the Convention.

Privileged Motion: A motion, such as to recess, to fix the time of the next session, and to change the Orders of the Day. It takes precedence over all other motions.

Question: A subject or point of debate or a resolution to be voted on.

Quorum: The fewest number of delegates that can be present and still permit business to be legally transacted. At least one-third of the voting members of the District represented by at least one of their respective representatives shall constitute a quorum (Synod Constitution XII.14).

Report: Usually the formal accounting given by an officer, a board, a commission, or a committee of the discharge of its responsibilities under the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod, such an accounting to be evaluated by the delegate convention of the Synod.

Rescind: To annul or to cancel. To undo or reverse a previous decision.

Resolution: A formal proposal submitted previously in writing by a Convention floor committee for action by the Convention.

Substitute Amendment: When a full paragraph, section, or resolution is dropped and another is inserted in its place.

Table (lay on the table): To set aside a motion or a proposed resolution for consideration in the indefinite future. If adopted, it usually kills consideration of and action on the main motion by postponing it without a set time to take it up again. If this is not the intent, the motion should really be not to table, but to postpone to a set time.

BISHOP/PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Rev. Jeffrey G. Miskus

Theme: Living the Baptized Life in Christ

"I have been crucified with Christ, and I no longer live, Christ lives in me.

The life I live in the body I live by faith in the Son of God

who loved me and gave himself for me."

Galatians 2:20

In our baptisms we were united with Jesus Christ in his death and resurrection. God's act of grace gave us faith and new birth as His children.

In our baptisms we have been crucified and raised with Christ. Glory be to God!

In our baptisms our sins were washed away, and we were clothed with the holiness and righteousness of Jesus – we were fit for the very presence of God.

In our baptisms we were filled with God's Holy Spirit.

In our baptisms we were saved.

As baptized believers we are called each day to offer our lives as living sacrifices to God as they are now holy, righteous, and pleasing to God because of Jesus.

We are called to live the baptized life of repentance, faith, and love that we've been graciously given.

Not only is this beautiful revelation our convention theme, but it has been our district's vision for the past year and will be into the future.

Thanks be to God!

It has been one of the greatest honors of my life to serve as your bishop and president. For this wonderful gift I give thanks to God. This calling is challenging, humbling, and exciting. It has brought me to my knees in prayer and lifted me up in praise and thanksgiving. I am thankful for the eight years of experience as your vice president. This gave me an introduction to what the presidency would entail.

WHAT DOES A BISHOP/PRESIDENT DO EXACTLY?

Visiting the Bride of Christ

One of the great joys of this calling is visiting the Bride of Christ. Traveling through the twenty-two U.S. states and one Canadian province where our congregations are located is an experience I treasure. Worshipping with over fifty of our congregations over the past year, encouraging the pastors, preaching, teaching, and sharing with others about the work of our blessed district and synod has been a privilege. Ordaining and installing pastors, celebrating congregational anniversaries and building projects, are just some of the joys I was able to share with God's holy people and their pastors.

Prayer and Devotional Study (Daily)

I begin each day with one hour of Scripture readings and prayers for the pastors and congregations in our district. It is the first thing I do and the most important thing that I do. The meetings I have had with many of you have helped guide my prayers.

Time with Every Active Pastor of Our District

I have met with almost every active pastor in our district (166) in a series of one-hour online meetings. My goal is to listen, encourage, pray for, and get to know the hearts of our district's pastors. This has been a joy. Our pastors are working hard, balancing family and church vocations, preaching and teaching faithfully, and visiting and caring for God's people. I have also started working on meeting with the retired pastors as well. They are filled with wisdom, experience, and grace. They are an invaluable resource to God's church, and we dare not forget them. We have 100 retired pastors in our district.

New Worker Orientation

I met with the newly ordained pastors in September 2024 for an online "English District Orientation" session. I worshipped with them, prayed for them, got to know them, encouraged them in their ministry, introduced them to our staff and supports, and made sure they were connected to their circuits and regions (circuit visitors and vice presidents). I helped them to understand our English District, where we are (regions, circuits, and congregations), and how we operate within The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). I also spent some time sharing with them my thirty years of experience in pastoral ministry — my many failures/opportunities to learn, and God's many victories. I also shared with them some tools of time management that have been a great help to me in my ministry.

Pastoral and Congregational Counselling

While pastors and congregations often work through the circuit visitors (CV) and the vice presidents (VP), there are some that call me directly looking for prayer and advice. There are also those that have gone through the CV and VP and now directly involve me because of the seriousness of the issue. I give praise and thanks to God for our VPs, CVs, as well as Rev. Derek Mathers and Mr. Albert Amling as we work together to support our brothers and sisters going through difficult challenges.

Weekly Staff Meetings

I have weekly virtual meetings with the district staff where we begin with a devotion, pray for each other and the district, and give updates on our ministries. While some of our district staff are deployed throughout the United States and Canada, my wife and I moved into a small home ten minutes from the district office in Livonia, Michigan.

Council of Presidents Meetings

An unexpected joy is the quarterly meetings of our synod's Council of Presidents. In these meetings our synod's elected leadership meets regularly to pray, study, worship, research, plan, hear reports, and enact convention resolutions assigned to us. I am so pleased to report that these meetings are godly, fruitful, and spiritually edifying. Our synod's leadership is doing what you would expect them to do. We discuss and handle difficult issues. We learn what is happening in our schools, congregations, and missions. We brainstorm subjects like congregational health, church worker wellness, and current issues of our culture and communities. We also worship and pray together. While there is not agreement on every issue, there is a wonderful spirit of brotherhood in our Lord Jesus Christ. The meetings are orderly (what else would you expect from Lutherans!), respectful, and relevant. Our Synod President, Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison, does an exceptional job of taking us through our Lutheran Confessions and reporting

on synodical matters. He does this with many years of experience under his belt and with a good sense of humor mixed in at the appropriate times.

Life March

In late January, I joined with our Synod President Dr. Harrison and most of the thirty-five district presidents in the Life March in Washington D.C. As we marched to give a voice to the unborn children of our world, we sang hymns, confessed our faith, prayed, and encouraged each other. The LCMS was well represented and joyfully proclaimed "Life" in Jesus Christ. This Life March is the largest of its kind in the world and I was honored to be a part of it. It was especially encouraging that both the president and vice president of the United States spoke in support of the March for Life.

Quarterly Board of Directors Meetings

I give thanks to God for your English District's Board of Directors. They have been a joy to work with over the past 10 years and I feel so blessed to be a part of their service to our English District. Our quarterly meetings are hosted by one of our congregations in one of our four regions. They have been a blessing to both the board and the Church at large. The hospitality of our congregations and pastors has been wonderful. There are often difficult issues to report on and challenging decisions to make. However, the board handles them with grace and wisdom.

Calls and Calling Congregations

This ministry involves all levels of our district, from my office as bishop/president, assistant to the bishop, district administrators, to the vice presidents (VPs), circuit visitors (CVs), voters' assemblies, and call committees. Most of the CVs and VPs have a close relationship with the congregations and pastors in their regions and circuits. They know their areas well and are a great source of information to pastors who have been called. Congregations work through a self-study before organizing to call a pastor to have a clear understanding of their context and needs. We are actively in communication with the pastors who are considering calls and are encouraging them with prayer and invitations to talk. We're committed to praying for, contacting, encouraging, and being available to the congregations and pastors in the call process. When considering men to place on a call list, we are looking for brothers who are passionate about being Confessional Lutherans – *Living the Baptized Life in Christ*, committed to our synod and district, and willing to put in the work.

Seminary Interviews

Pre-seminary interviews with those desiring to attend one of our seminaries are conducted with Rev. Justin Schmidt, Interview Committee Chairman; Rev. Derek Mathers, Assistant to the Bishop; Kathy Stanis, Administrative Assistant; and me. These interviews are administered prayerfully according to the qualifications given in Holy Scripture. Praise the LORD that men from our district congregations continue to be called to the Office of Holy Ministry.

Time with Vice Presidents and Circuit Visitors

I meet with the circuit visitors and vice presidents of our four regions in four different regional meetings. The goal is to foster communication within the region regarding congregations who are calling or vacant, issues being handled, and concerns being addressed. I intend to hold these meetings three times a year, avoiding Advent and Lent.

Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF)

In 2024, we welcomed John Hoover as the LCEF Vice President to the English District. John is a wonderful Lutheran brother, an elder at his church in St. Louis, and has a resumé that demonstrates his

ability to structure loans. John attended two of the four regional conferences in his first year and has done a great job getting to know the pastors and congregations of our district. He actively visits congregations all over the United States.

Dominican Republic (DR) Lutheran Mission Visit (DRLM)

The English District has faithfully and generously supported this incredible mission for years. When a generous donor offered to fully fund the district presidents' visits to the mission, I accepted gladly. I visited the mission March 30-April 5, 2025. The trip was both inspiring and transformative. The Regional Director of the DRLM Rev. Theodore Krey, an English District pastor, provides his team with solid leadership and vision. The DRLM's passion for Confessional Lutheran teachings is made clear in their vision to Proclaim the Gospel, Plant Lutheran Congregations, and Show Mercy.

When I visited the churches, seminary, and mercy house of the DR, I clearly saw the three parts of the mission in motion. This is a young mission with long legs. It has the theological vision in place to grow a self-supporting church if it is given a few more decades of support.

I worshipped in Spanish for the first time and was impressed by the Spanish Language Lutheran Service Book. Whether it's Matins or Vespers, the liturgy is beautifully paired with music that respects the language and culture of the DR.

The work Deaconess Danelle Schumann has done with the group home in the DR is one of a kind in the entire country. I spent time with the residents and heard their stories of how God worked in their lives. This is evidence that our Lord Jesus is alive and working through His people to extend mercy where it is needed and felt most authentically.

The seminarian visits to the village surrounding the seminary reminded me of the work I did in the community surrounding my own congregation. Home visits where the Word of God and prayer are clearly the focus and goal are a huge part (fifteen hours a week) of their seminary training. Watching the young seminarians teach and interact with the villagers was inspiring. I had never been to a community with such poverty. I was humbled by what God had accomplished through His people and by what the mission team gets done with the few resources they have compared to us back in the United States and Canada. It is a lesson for everyone who visits, and you can't help but learn from it. Our God has truly given us everything we need for life and godliness through Word and Sacrament ministry.

WHAT DOES THE DISTRICT DO?

This question is asked of me during almost every congregational visit that I make. There are five major areas where the district serves the congregation:

- 1. Connecting the congregation to synod and other congregations.
- 2. Providing ecclesiastical authority to pastors and congregations.
- 3. Providing support to congregations in missions and church planting.
- 4. Providing support to congregations in education and schools.
- 5. Providing support for congregations in terms of funding.

The district and the synod are one. We have the same constitutions and similar bylaws. The district is essentially the synod in a smaller, local form. The district connects your congregation to her sister congregations and the wider synod. When a congregation celebrates an anniversary or a significant event, a representative from the district normally attends when invited and encourages sister

congregations to rejoice as one. When your congregation has a tragedy, the district normally sends a representative to grieve or support you through the crisis. You are not alone; God has given you sister congregations that walk with you, pray for you, support you, and look to encourage your congregation in good times and difficult times.

The district also watches over the teachings of the pastors and congregations – this is the ecclesiastical authority we exercise as a district. The district shepherds the shepherds. Church worker support and health is also an area where the district serves. We encourage the pastors and church workers to meet, study, and worship together in conferences (run by district and regions) promoting the unity of our doctrine and supporting each other in our callings.

When congregations need pastors, the district is right there in the person of the circuit visitor who connects the church with the bishop/president. My office works together with my assistants and administrators to review the congregational self-assessments and put together lists of pastors from our synod roster for them to consider calling. The pastors on our roster are educated, trained, certified, and ordained men who have completed a biblically based education approved by our synod. The circuit visitor also meets with the congregation and shepherds them through the time of vacancy, advising them on vacancy pastors and questions they might have. When a pastor accepts a divine call, a representative from the district visits and rejoices with the congregation. The pastor is properly ordained/installed according to Christ's Word. When congregations suffer conflict, the district is available to help and counsel.

Schools: If an English District congregation wants to start a school, the Education Executive Albert Amling, a retired Lutheran school principal with more than 30 years of experience, assists the congregation in its process. Albert gives his counsel and aid if one of our 36 schools is in need. When you read Albert's report, you will see that this keeps him very busy.

Missions: The district gathers and combines the funds gifted to district missions to accomplish what one congregation may not have the financial resources to do on its own. The missions of the district are trusted, Lutheran organizations and are properly administered. We visit and oversee our missions to ensure that they are acting according to their mission statements and keeping sound financial records.

Church Planting: The English District also comes alongside congregations that want to plant a church. We provide step-by-step procedures created and approved by our synod and based on years of experience. As the Church Planting Team follows the steps in the process, funds from the synod and district are accessed to support the work.

Congregational Revitalization: When a congregation wants to look at itself and get an idea of its purpose and direction, the district has synod-developed programs to help the congregation walk through this exercise without harming the vital Word and Sacrament ministry that is the lifeblood of our church and mission. Rev. Derek Mathers, Assistant to the Bishop/President and Mission Executive, has been trained to take congregations through this self-examination process. After completing the self-examination, the congregation may need funds to build or renovate. The district and Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) work together to help the congregation gain access to funds.

Fellowship: The district represents your congregation in its fellowship with the other districts of our synod. The bishop/president meets quarterly with the presidents of the other thirty-four districts as well

as the synod president and vice presidents to worship, study, pray, and discuss the important issues in our church body.

MISSIONS REPORT

The Rev. J. Derek Mathers
Assistant to the President/Bishop and Mission Executive

As my title communicates, my main area of responsibility in our district is in assisting our president/bishop, when requested, representing him at an ecclesiastical event, congregational visit, or a situation of conflict. In addition, my service to our district centers around three different areas of our mission together. First, by encouraging, tooling, and facilitating the member congregations and circuits of our district in establishing new mission opportunities and expanding existing outreach ministry. Second, by working with a group of skilled and dedicated individuals passionate about church worker wellness, which also extends to the worker's family. Thirdly, our district-wide 1-1-1 initiative.

In each of those areas I am honoured to work with groups of individuals who are intentional and focused on advancing our work and effort together as a District. It is a joy to work with and watch the growth of these ministry areas. Through these individuals God has planted and watered the work, yet, we need to remember that it is God alone who causes the growth. Therefore, all glory for what is accomplished belongs alone to our God. He receives all our praises and thanks.

As the Apostle Paul wrote: "So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only **God** who **gives** the **growth**." - 1 Corinthians 3:7

Reports from our Mission Action Team, our Ministerial Health Commission, and an update on our 1-1-1 initiative are within the pages of this workbook.

I am focusing my report on a few insights I believe are beneficial for us to share together. I am going to start with a reminder of our DNA.

This reminder comes from Rev. Dr. William Schumacher, who was our keynote speaker for our 2012 English District Convention. Since it was a significant anniversary year for us, He was asked to speak on the topic, "What is the English District About?" He summed up all he shared with the following:

"Sharing the good news of God's Kingdom across every boundary and barrier of human existence."

At the 2023 LCMS Youth Gathering this mural-sized picture hung right behind our district table in the district zone of the gathering. It is a graphic representation of Dr. Schumacher's observation about our district.

While geographic districts have clearly defined edges and limitation for their ministries, our English District's area of ministry, mission, and service are identified by the tan color, which is inclusive of the 22 states and the province of Ontario, Canada in which we have congregations. "God in All



Things ... Without Borders" reflects so much of our district's history and current focus. This is our DNA.

"God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work." - 2 Corinthians 9:8

Insight One:

In 2021, former Mission Executive and LCEF Vice President of our District Rev. David Thiele wrote a paper titled, "Considering Your Congregation's Future." It discussed a difficult topic that was slightly ahead of our reality, but the questions it raised and the points it made are even more a reality today, four years later.

Being very practical, a section of the paper walked through possible options for congregations whose ministry was no longer viable and was coming to a close. One of those thoughts was that the congregation could become a legacy congregation. Rev. Thiele wrote:

"The congregation can make an unrestricted gift to their district. Your congregation's Constitution will have instructions on how the congregation's assets are to be directed when a congregation closes. Many constitutions list the district of which they are a member as the recipient." (page 8)

In 2022, a few of our district congregations voted for the dissolution of their ministries. In that difficult time, they wanted their assets to continue the work of mission and ministry for which they were originally given to be a blessing for ministry and mission elsewhere. Then-Bishop Jamison Hardy presented a plan for the disbursement of these legacy gifts. The district Board of Directors agreed and established the guideline that when legacy gifts are received by the District 60% would go into the district's Endowment Fund, 10% would pass through our district and be sent onto the Synod, and the remaining 30% would become a fund for special mission grants, the focus of which would be to strengthen ministry of our congregations and schools, as well as support new or developing missions or ministries of our district.

The total amount of this legacy 30% grants in our recent triennium was \$1,056,830.

Together we grieve the dissolution of any one of our ministries or congregations and the loss of a mission and ministry presence in a community. Yet, we give thanks to God's people for seeing how there is further and future kingdom work to be accomplished. They have been and are a significant part of all the work listed above.

Insight Two:

The LCMS re:Vitality suite of tools continues to be available, without cost, to our district congregations. I continue to believe and encourage these resources can be a blessing and benefit to our congregations. Since 2018, thirty of our congregations have made use of the Congregational Assessment of Development and Decline Survey (CADDS). This starting tool for the re:Vitality suite is a survey-based self-assessment that helps congregations objectively answer the question "Where are we ... really?" Using this study will assist a congregation in determining which areas of ministry might be revitalized within their congregation with prayer and intentional focus of vision, energy, and effort.

More and more of our congregations are asking, how can we maintain vitality as a congregation?

It is important for us to be reminded that spiritual vitality has nothing to do with our actions. It is God alone who creates and strengthens our spiritual vitality. Where the true Word of God is shared and read, where the Sacraments are celebrated in accord with the Word of God, and the focus of worship is on God serving us with His law and Gospel, in that place, spiritual vitality exists.

It is institutional vitality that is really the focus of this question. Re:Vitality can assist a congregation in clarifying which aspects of the institution will benefit from intentional attention for meaningful institutional revitalization.

Re:vitality is never an action of just the leadership of a congregation but involves all the people of God in that specific context of ministry.

Insight Three:

The English District doesn't plant congregations from the top down but seeks to encourage congregations and circuits to prayerfully explore their communities and the context of the ministries with a visionary sight for what could be. When these mission planting teams contact our district, the answer will always be, "yes, let's talk more." Our district seeks to come along side such mission planting teams with support, guidance, and a little practical.

There has been much shared about the Church Planting Initiative which comes out of the synodical Office of National Mission. There is more that will be shared in the coming months.

Right now, let's answer the question, "Do we have new mission starts in our district?" The answer is yes, and they are in all stages of development.

I think we can say there are currently five to six solid starts in development, three that are still not yet in development, and one that has stalled. Everything is normal as this is how mission planting goes.

Our synod currently has 23 districts (out of 35) with active sites and plans for church planting. Twenty-seven states and one province have new church plant sites active in one of the six phases of the church planting process. Projected possible grants through the end of 2026 are now around 39 with a projected funding need across Synod of just over \$3 million.

I would like to remind everyone that Rev. Justin Laughridge (co-chair of our Mission Action Team) describes CPS as scaffolding around a new building construction. The scaffolding is not part of the building, nor is it intended to be present forever. Its purpose is to support the construction which has been envisioned. Scaffolding is a solid illustration of what our Mission Action Team is tasked to do in the CPS process.

Insight Four:

Pastor Justin Laughridge is in the middle of a four-article series entitled "Looking Back and Looking Forward". These articles are intended to share the history of mission planting and mission planting endeavors of our synod and districts. They are short, thoughtful, and challenging. The challenging aspect is the question, are our assumptions about church planting in our world today correct? Every one of us, every congregation, and even our district leadership, from president/bishop to appointed committee member, needs to check our mission assumptions for the most effective church planting to be accomplished.

My Conclusion:

Our unity in mission is not in the traditions, wisdom, or imaginations of men or women. No. Our unity, our unified focus of gospel proclamation, in mission is the work of God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit through our baptisms, the words of God, and the partaking of Holy Communion. Mission done apart from these gifts of God will not last long, nor will it be healthy.

Mission planting always comes down to this, plain and simple. One person shares with another person where to find food and water that truly lasts. One individual, in conversation with another, speaking of the forgiveness, hope, and love they know in the Bible.

SCHOOL MINISTRY REPORT

Albert J. Amling Executive Assistant to the President: School Ministry

INTRODUCTION

Greetings, in the name of our risen Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! It has been such a joy and a privilege to work with an outstanding staff at the district level, wonderfully supportive colleagues at the synod level, and dedicated and gifted administrators and directors at the educational ministry level. What a blessing it has been to watch these workers diligently serving the Lord with the goal of bringing more souls into the Kingdom. Each ministry setting is unique within our district. We serve families from a multitude of ethnic and faith backgrounds and socio-economic standings, and while the delivery of the message may need to be adapted, the message itself never changes. We profess and teach Jesus as Savior. Sharing that truth becomes our passion, and that is what I see in our schools: people loving and caring for their neighbors with passion!

OVERVIEW OF SERVICES

School ministry support consists of helping our elementary schools, preschools, child-care centers, and high school with staffing, call list preparation, curriculum, instructional management, resources, accreditation, spiritual growth, and on-site visits. Consultants provide contacts for National Lutheran School Accreditation and Early Childhood Accreditation. English District School Ministry also administers the Financial Aid for Future Church Workers program.

HIGHLIGHTS / OTHER INFORMATION

- 1. EDUCATIONAL MINISTRIES The English District works with 36 educational ninistries as of January 2025. Our educational ministries consist of free-standing PreKs, free-standing PreKs with daycares, PreKs with Kindergartens and daycares, PreK with a Kindergarten, PreK–6th grade elementary school, PreK–8th grade elementary schools, K–8th grade elementary schools, and a PreK–12th grade site. Education remains one of our district's distinctive ministries and most successful means to bring the Gospel to the lost, serving just under 3,500 children and their families. **This is an increase of over 300 students served!** Research has shown that children who attend Christian schools have a significantly greater success rate at life in general and are less likely to lose their faith, an eternal benefit! Eight of our schools are NLSA accredited. Well over 70% of the children attending our English District schools are not Lutheran. This accentuates that we are truly a mission field in action.
- 2. SCHOOL VISITS School and worker visitation continues to be a major emphasis of my work NLSA, consultations, presentations, conferences and workshops, call committees, and school board meetings. I consider much of this position as assisting schools with resources and serving as a consultant, coach, and mentor. Regular visitation to all of our schools is a high priority in my work life. My goal is to visit each English District education ministry at least once during the calendar year.
- SYNODICAL NEWS Dr. Alan Freeman is serving as the Director of LCMS Schools. LCMS serves
 over 186,000 children and their families in over 2,000 school settings. The school ministry office
 website for resource is: <u>luthed.org</u>. This site offers schools several resources including
 professional development webinars, manuals, Lutheran Schools Week materials, and a host of

other items at no cost to our schools. It has been an invaluable resource for our educational ministries.

4. RECOGNITION AND AWARDS – The English District celebrates the service of its workers (rostered and non-rostered) with anniversary awards and acknowledgments for 25 and 40 years of service in Lutheran ministry with a plaque. The Lumen Christi Award is presented by the English District to publicly recognize one professional staff educator and one congregational volunteer educator. Nomination forms are sent out each December to all English District pastors, principals, directors, and directors of Christian education. The Lumen Christi Award Committee reviews all nominations and each spring announces the two recipients. The Lifetime Ministry Award recognizes an individual who has demonstrated commitment to faithful, fruitful, and impactful servant leadership over a lifetime of ministry to the mission and ministry of Lutheran schools.

5 FINANCIAL AID FOR FUTURE CHURCH WORKERS — We have been blessed with the financial strength to provide grants to current ordained and commissioned called workers for debt reduction and scholarships to young people entering our Concordia universities and seminaries. Each year the district disburses approximately \$40,000, aiding students enrolled in church worker programs at the Concordia universities and students enrolled in our seminaries. - 6. NLSA We continue to actively promote NLSA (National Lutheran School Accreditation) among our district schools. We have an active English District NLSA commission: Gail Holzer, Commissioner, assisted by Crissy Peterson and Albert Amling. With the steep competition our schools face, it is important to provide high quality programs to the community. Lutheran schools continue to compete with public, charter, and other private schools. To be an effective "player" in the field of education we must provide excellence in education and become the school of choice in our neighborhoods. NLSA is the most effective way for our schools to evaluate success, progress, and weakness to set goals and objectives for the future. Gail Holzer, principal at Redeemer Lutheran School in Verona, PA, serves as the commissioner for the English District NLSA Commission. She will represent the English District on the national level and become our expert in the field. The NLSA has rewritten the standards, and it aligns with several secular accreditation bodies giving our schools a valued "stamp of approval."
 We must continue to assist schools and early childhood centers in taking the steps needed to demonstrate the positive, unmatched impact of a Christ-centered education.
- 7. CALL LIST PREPARATION/CONSULTATIONS The English District school ministry team devotes a significant amount of time assisting schools in the process of calling commissioned ministers. I meet with call committees to help with the process especially when there is a need for an administrator. With fewer workers in the field, finding qualified individuals who are willing and able to leave their current position becomes increasingly difficult. The Commissioned Minister Information Form (CMIF) is a database that assists us in the process. While it does come with challenges, it is much more user friendly than the last system.
- 8. SCHOOL LEADERSHIP Developing leaders continues to be a challenge for our synod. The School Leadership Development project (SLED) continues to be funded and offers a one-year training program for teachers who might be interested in leading a school ministry. Miss Grace Amling and Mrs. Katelyn Naber, teachers at Hales Corners Lutheran School, are recent graduates of this program
- 9. MISSION AND VISION Lutheran schools exist for the sole purpose of teaching Jesus' grace, mercy, love, forgiveness, and promise of salvation. We work to develop our students' faith lives, and part of that is teaching them to serve others out of Christ's love for them. The schools of the English District collect offerings, gifts, and items to provide for the needs of others. Our Lutheran education ministries are a vital part of the English District family. We teach using Scripture with doctrines based on LCMS theology; we demonstrate Jesus' love and compassion daily with students and families; we reach into the community and around the world to serve the hungry, homeless, and helpless. The Holy Spirit is present and active in our schools, opening doors and creating opportunities for the faith development of young and old alike. It is a privilege to serve as a partner with our district in serving and growing the Kingdom of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

FINANCIAL REPORT

The English District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod continues to be blessed with the financial resources to carry out mission and ministry. The strong financial position is because you and your congregations support the work accomplished collectively throughout the district and its partnerships with other entities.

Following are the Statement of Financial Position and Statement of Activities for the three fiscal years ended January 31, 2025, 2024, and 2023. The financial statements for January 31, 2023 combines all U.S. and Canadian activity including the Church Extension Fund activity in Canada while the January 31, 2024 and January 31, 2025 present Canadian activity separately. This is a Generally Accepted Accounting Practice reporting requirement based on the action of the Canada Corporation members and Board of Directors that have approved changes to its structure including that Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) is now the sole member of the corporation. LCEF will be continuing the work of Canada Corporation and expanding the services available to Canadian Lutheran churches and church workers.

The Statement of Financial Position reflects that the district's net assets (equity) have increased from \$5,633,219 to 9,004,628 over the last three years. Several events and items contributed to this change in net assets, the largest factor being gifts of monies and property from disbanded ministries of almost \$5 million and the earnings and valuations gains in endowment investments, with and without donor restrictions.

Unrestricted support (tithes) from English District congregations (U.S. and Canada) for the fiscal year ended January 31, 2023, was \$885,407, 2024 was \$884,659, and 2025 was \$851,291. The support from Canadian congregations is not combined with the U.S. support on the last two years of the included financial statements but shown as the line item "Discontinued Operations, Income (Loss) from Operations of Canada Corporation." For the fiscal year ending January 31, 2025, the loss from Discontinued Operations – Canada Corporation is due largely to currency exchange rate calculations. Additionally, congregations have provided restricted gifts, an average of \$76,000 annually, which included time restricted support and gifts for 1-1-1 Dollar for Missions.

This convention cycle the English District (U.S. & Canada Corporation) has pledged \$611,500 to Synod for national and international ministry. In this triennium the total amount given to Synod was \$950,679. These additional gifts of approximately \$343,000 were sent as a percentage of proceeds from disbanded congregations. Over the past three years an additional \$2,605,500 was given directly for mission grants, including for new mission starts, campus ministry, school ministries, ministry grants, church worker scholarships, church worker debt reduction, DRLM partnership, human care, and world missions.

The financial records are audited annually and the statement of functional expenses, statement of cash flows, and notes are an integral part of the financial statements but are not included in this report. A complete copy of the financial statements is available from the English District office.

Mission

The mission of Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) is to support The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) by ensuring that financial resources and related services are available now and in the future, empowering ministry and spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Organization Overview

Since 1847, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has steadfastly pursued its mission to "make known the love of Christ by word and deed within our churches, communities, and the world." Established in 1978, LCEF plays a crucial role in this mission.

- Purpose: To empower ministry by providing loans, investments, and support services designed to serve the financial needs of congregations, schools, and other ministry organizations within the LCMS.
- Growth: From humble beginnings with \$100 million in assets to a current portfolio exceeding \$2.0 billion—demonstrating our commitment to financial stability, trustworthiness, and advancing Christ's kingdom.

Historical Context

LCEF's primary function has been to provide loans funded by investments and gifts from dedicated church members and supporters. Over the years, our services have broadened to include strategic advisory services, such as:

- Ministry Solutions: Offering mission clarity and guidance through ministry clarity processes and capital campaigns.
- Real Estate Solutions: Providing expert consultation and execution in property development, repurposing, and expansion.

Financial Strength

LCEF's strong financial foundation plays a crucial role in supporting the LCMS today and securing its future. Our investment programs empower LCMS individuals and organizations, funding projects such as home loans, sanctuary renovations, senior living communities, and Lutheran schools.

Leadership

Our leadership is committed to guiding the organization with vision, expertise, and a dedication to our mission. Here's a snapshot of our leadership team and workforce:

- President and CEO: Bart Day, MBA MDiv, reports to a 12-member Board of Directors.
- Workforce: LCEF employs over 150 people across the United States, including our headquarters in St. Louis and representatives in 31 LCMS districts.

Connection to Ministries

LCMS ministries connect with LCEF through their district vice presidents (DVPs), who act as vital links to ensure our services meet each district's unique needs. For over 45 years, LCEF has been committed to providing the financial resources and services that support the church's mission. As we look ahead, we remain dedicated to serving the LCMS and strengthening ministries through trusted financial and strategic partnerships.

Economic Overview

A period of complex and evolving economic challenges:

2022:

- Continued recovery from the initial shock of the pandemic.
- Significant inflation, with the Consumer Price Index peaking at 9.1% in June.
- Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth of 2.1%.
- Unemployment was around 3.6% by year's end.
- Federal Reserve initiated a series of interest rate hikes to control inflation.

2023:

- Ongoing efforts by the Federal Reserve to combat inflation.
- Interest rates reached levels not seen since before the Great Recession.
- Inflation cooled to 3% by December.
- Tepid GDP growth of 1.8%.
- The housing market experienced a significant slowdown due to higher borrowing costs.
- Unemployment remained low at 3.5%.

2024:

- Continued economic challenges but signs of stabilization.
- Inflation moderated to 2.5% year-over-year.
- GDP growth is projected to remain sluggish at 1.5%.
- Unemployment slightly increased to 3.8%.
- The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) paused rate hikes to monitor economic data closely.

LCEF's Response

LCEF navigated volatile markets with prudence, strengthening our capital and positioning for sustained growth. Despite economic challenges, we ended FY 2024 with over \$17.5M in gains, reinforcing our commitment to financial stability and ministry support.

LCMS FOUNDATION

Ronald Grimm

Gift Planning Counselor – LCMS English District

Serving as your English District Gift Planning Counselor, I am an employee of the LCMS Foundation which has been doing gift planning and trust services for the Synod for 66+ years. To learn more about the LCMS Foundation, review this link to see the great work we have done in the last year: 2024 LCMS Foundation Ministry Report.

There are two components to my service in our English District. The first component is to assist congregational members through their will and estate planning process. This ministry is called "Lifetime Plan for Giving" (LPG) and is intended to assist an individual or couple in walking through the entire process of transferring the blessings (both at no cost and with total confidentiality) which God has given by being the best stewards of those resources for your loved ones and ministries that they care so much about. This includes, but not limited to, assisting with creating a Christian Preamble (to share your faith with loved ones), organizing your estate (via LPG Survey) and providing design concepts that enable the most cost-effective way to share those gifts with loved ones efficiently and with ministries that you care so much about, all while minimizing the tax effect on your estate and to your loved ones.

I can also provide legal documents for your charitable gifts (three attorneys on staff) and work with your legal counsel to coordinate, so that what God has written on your heart is carried out when you have been called home to heaven.

The second component of my service is with church leadership. I have available resources for discussing long-term investing opportunities via endowment funds and/or investment accounts, which can strengthen your ministry today, tomorrow, and forever.

A congregation may have created an endowment in the past, but it has become dormant. I can assist congregations in revitalizing those gifts for future benefit by using the Foundation's expertise in marketing, documenting the structure and guidelines to guide your congregation. Gift planning seminars are also offered that can help keep the endowment relevant and growing. The goal is always to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our world and growing these gifts enables larger distributions for those ministries valued in the hearts of the congregation.

Our English District is made up of about 155 churches within 22 states and the province of Ontario. Being a non-geographical district presents some challenges, yet in these last several years we have been able to be more efficient by presenting virtually when it is a struggle to get everyone together in the same place on the same day. The preferred way is always to be in person when speaking to a congregation. The focus is to be a faithful steward of the resources God has entrusted to us in this life as a child of God. The Lifetime Plan for Giving discussion is one that should be reoccurring with congregations periodically to enable members to participate whenever life changes have inspired them to plan for how best to transfer their blessings.

Over the last seven years I have been able to personally visit 101 of our congregations, their pastors and leadership. These opportunities have been a great blessing as I gained both insight into the contexts in

which our congregations do their ministries and was privileged to hear and see the wonderful ministries in which they are involved. I believe that the experience and knowledge I received has better equipped me when discussing ministries best aligned to a donor's desires in supporting God-pleasing work. The visits have opened the opportunity for me to lead over 43 "Lifetime Plan for Giving" (LPG) presentations (with more planned in the future) for congregational members, to then follow up and meet individually to work through the four-meeting process.

Through the gift planning process, generous English District members have provided testamentary gifts that could total in an excess of \$21,996,580. On average, about one half of the gifts go to local congregations. We also have testamentary gifts pledged to the English District Endowment Fund of potentially \$1,287,000.

In addition to the generosity of our members, we have been able to assist English District congregations, schools, and recognized service organizations with gifts totaling over \$1,350,080. In several instances some of these dollars were sitting stagnant in checking accounts for years and are now being invested and are growing to support ministries.

The coming triennium looks to be busy as I plan to present in another three congregations before year's end and estimate starting another six new gift plans in the near future.

- engage students at Princeton University and Princeton Seminary with monthly Table Talks (dinner discussions) of faith-shaped life in Lutheran perspective.
- rejoice in God's faithful financial provision as (a) younger members have willingly taken on the mantle of generosity from older members, (b) the cultivation of multiple income streams (e.g. facility rental, endowment earnings, specified gifts for major projects, estate planning, online payment processing, and encouraging and practicing tithing among members) bears fruit in ministry, and (c) responsible, diligent, and transparent financial management builds confidence among members in the church as an institution worthy of trust and investment.
- partner in mission with five nearby LCMS congregations, sponsoring and publicizing joint activities and worship services, encouraging inter-congregational fellowship, sharing resources and best practices, and cooperating in planning future ministry initiatives.
- bring God's gifts to our community in worship services, music, education, fellowship events, home visits, mercy ministry, online outreach, and financial support.

Logos (Philadelphia Lutheran Ministries), Philadelphia, PA – The Rev. Robert Kieselowsky In any location, but particularly in the city, mission work is more a marathon than a sprint. That has certainly been the case over the last three years. The primary endeavor of Philadelphia Lutheran Ministries has been outreach in the heart of the city center on word and sacrament ministry at Logos Lutheran. We saw an increase of undergraduate students as well as young professionals in attendance at Divine Service. The nature of the city is very transient. As we welcome new individuals to our midst, we regularly bid farewell to those we have known so well. Your prayers are very much appreciated. Additionally, we have enjoyed getting to know and see the growth of nine different vicars, each of whom brings something unique. Two years ago, the weekly rhythm was changed by the vicar to include a dedicated meal and intentional theological conversation as a means of asking questions in a causal setting. This has been a means of pointing people to regular attendance at Divine Service on Sundays as well as weekly prayer and Scripture study on Tuesday evenings.

In 2018, Pastor Kieselowsky took an opportunity to begin a weekly Bible study in the Philadelphia prison. While the Bible study was temporarily suspended due to pandemic restrictions, he has been invited back to meet with a high-need section of the prison serving those who require unique psychological support. The proclamation of liberty in Christ continues to go out to the far corners of the city of Philadelphia. The support of the English District is a tremendous encouragement. Our Lord has brought the world to our doorstep, and it is a privilege to be included in His gracious work to bring people to the knowledge of our Savior Jesus Christ.

Mt. Calvary, Lititz, PA – The Rev. Christopher Seifferlein

Mount Calvary Lutheran Church serves longstanding members, transfers, and those seeking refuge from other denominations with the true Word and Holy Sacraments. Blessed to be in a numerically growing

area as well as in the protected "Bible Belt of the East," congregational membership is stable to growing. The congregation has completed a major renovation and update to their physical plant and facility. The temporary sanctuary, built in 1993 by LCEF Laborers for Christ, has been transformed into a permanent worship home. The aging HVAC system was removed and a new system installed. Challenges include the need for additional pastoral support and remaining faithful to the Lord Jesus in an increasingly secular mindset.

Faith Lutheran Church, preaching the Word of God, continues to grow. We are currently at 742 baptized (which includes 564 confirmed) members as of 2025. We are steadily working on building back from the COVID era in 2020 with 815 baptized members. With joy, we continue to be blessed with our Administrative Pastor Brad Hildebrandt (recently celebrating 12 years of service at Faith) and the newest member of our ministry team Associate Pastor Owen Duncan (recently called from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis) who was installed in July of 2024. We continue to be involved with our Lambs of Faith Preschool, Mission of the Month Program entering its 15th year of operation, and Faith in Action Program having sent 98.5 tons of troop care packages since 2003. We are preparing for the 25th anniversary of Pastor Don Treglown serving as Senior Pastor at Faith. Jesus Christ and His love continues to be the message we tell, live, and share as His followers.

Shepherd of the Coast, Palm Coast, FL – The Rev. Gregory Michel

The past triennium was a transition period for Shepherd of the Coast. After 26 years of faithful ministry to the congregation, the Rev. Bill Douthwaite retired in July 2022. The Rev. Greg Michel accepted the call to serve as the congregation's next pastor and was installed in February 2023. Benjamin Janssen, our 2021-22 vicar at Holy Cross Chapel (Hazelwood), was called and ordained as the mission's first pastor (see below). Sherri Crum, the long-time director of our Pittsburgh Lutheran Center for the Blind, retired May 18, 2024 after 18 years of faithful service. Deaconess Zoë Huelsman, a daughter of the congregation who was catechized and confirmed at First Trinity as an adult in 2016, accepted the call to serve as the new part-time director and was installed on July 21, 2024. Rev. Douglas Spittel, the parish pastor for over 26 years, accepted another call and left First Trinity in September 2024. For over 24 years, the Rev. Eric Andræ has continued to serve in full-time campus ministry and now also as the vacancy parish pastor. He is currently the longest-serving campus pastor in Pittsburgh and in the LCMS. Besides the full-time campus ministry, the parish hosts part-time homeless, deaf, and blind ministries. "Transitions" seems to be the word of this past triennium for our circuit. We welcomed First Lutheran Church-Kingsville into our circuit, as well as Rev. Colton LaMay at Redeemer, Sarnia, and Rev. Gerald Andersen at Grace, Mitchell. In 2024, Our Saviour's, Chatham agreed to form a dual parish with Good Shepherd, Amherstburg (while retaining their synodical memberships with the LCMS and Lutheran Church—Canada, respectively) and began the call process.

This dual parish was a fruit of the greatly improved relations between the LCMS and the Lutheran Church—Canada (LCC). Annual Koinonia meetings have brought together our Ontario English District pastors, Bishop Jamison Hardy, leadership in the SELC District (with Pastor Charles St. Onge in Montreal), President Matthew Harrison and members of his staff, along with pastors of LCC in the Ontario region and their regional and synodical leadership.

Though our circuit is spread far apart, the bonds of brotherly love knit together by the Holy Spirit is clear to see. First, Kingsville, ON – vacant

First Evangelical Lutheran Church has been focused on leading people to a growing relationship with Jesus Christ and welcoming everyone to come and worship. Our church and our members have grown in many ways the last three years. Weekend worship services have been well attended by members, and we also welcomed many guests. We began new fellowship-based and bible study-based growth communities to support the discipleship process. Our Sunday school ministry was reestablished, and its space was renovated to meet its needs. We continued to support our community partnerships with Augustine Villas (assisted living), the Town of Kingsville (supporting special events), Hogs for Hospice (supporting Blessing of the Bikes and the summer registered ride), and our local high school.

Our global outreach team went to Nicaragua in 2023 and 2024 supporting two Lutheran congregations and plans to return in December 2025. The GYM (God's Youth Ministry) met every Friday evening for sports, activities, and a Gospel message for community high school students. We are also able to restart our public high school lunch and devotion ministry in April 2025, serving about 100 students. We celebrated this officially on December 10, 2023. We are trusting God as we wait on His timing to provide a shepherd for our congregation. We have been vacant since September 2024. We do not have a vacancy pastor, but we are grateful to Rev. Glenn Stresman

who serves us once a month when we share in Holy Communion and to the many lay people who assist with services on other Sundays.

Gethsemane Lutheran Church continues the search for a new pastor, praying that Christ guides their path. Rev. Jordan Simon, our assistant pastor, faithfully guides us in liturgy and Holy Communion. Until Rev. Roger Ellis was hospitalized in May 2023, we were very blessed to have him serve as our vacancy pastor. For a few special services like Christmas Eve, Rev. Ellis video records a sermon for us to play during the service.

Grace, Mitchell, ON – The Rev. Gerald Andersen

After being vacant for about a year, Grace called Rev. Gerald Andersen in May of 2024 to be their pastor. He was installed on September 7, 2024. In his first five months Pastor Andersen conducted one baptism and two funerals. He started up the confirmation class with six youth, and a Bible study on the Nicene Creed with around eight in attendance. Visitation of shut-ins and those in care homes is being conducted and Word and Sacraments administered. Grace entered a church float in the town Santa Claus parade on St. Nicholas of Myra day with about ten children and ten adults on the float. This was done after many years of not entering the parade. There is an active Sunday school, and 23 children took part in the annual Christmas play. Grace is also active in gathering food for the town food bank and toys for the local Christmas hampers. Other fellowship/community activities have included roast beef dinners, annual community Christmas dinners and meat pie sales. We look forward to seeing what this new year will bring as Pastor Andersen becomes more familiar with our congregation and town.

We give thanks to God for Pastor Pollex who has been our shepherd since the congregational split in 2019 and through the Pandemic. Through the Holy Spirit, he has helped to equip the membership to work together unified in the one true faith to rebuild our congregation in Chatham. We praise God that we have seen steadily increasing membership over the past few years. We welcomed eight new members in 2022 and three new members in 2024. We have increased our community presence through social media which includes a new church website, a Facebook page and a YouTube channel where we post the weekly sermons. In 2024, we also established a Board of Evangelism to oversee local community outreach and the social media presence. In 2024, the congregation entered into a new joint parish agreement with Good Shepherd Church in Amherstburg. We look forward to the arrival of our new pastor Rev. Dionotan Ferreira of Brazil.

For 81 years, our congregation has proclaimed the peace of Christ to a world filled with conflict and death. We celebrated our 80th anniversary in December 2023 with then-Bishop Jamison Hardy preaching God's faithfulness to us. We were privileged to witness our church's son Rev. Jeffrey Miskus being installed as bishop during our regular morning service in August 2024.

We continue to reach out to the community with our food bank, providing for about 200 families per month. We could not do it without the generous donations of our local Metro grocery store and other businesses and individuals inside and outside the congregation. We held both a car show and a concert to raise funds as well. Our facilities also host Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous groups seven nights a week, as well as other community service groups.

We have continued in our sponsorship of a Middle Eastern Christian family in partnership with LCMS congregations in Illinois and Missouri. The family's application was finally completed in 2024, and we now are praying that the government of Canada approves their immigration.

We continue to give thanks to God that our church member Rev. Emeritus Glenn Stresman is able to fill in for us when Pastor Leistico needs to attend to business at circuit congregations on Sunday mornings and that he also has preached at other vacant congregations in the area.

Membership and attendance are quite steady, and we have rejoiced at recent baptisms, first communions, and confirmations of members of faithful families. Our budget is long-term secure due to a rental relationship with a very stable charter school organization. By God's grace, and thanks to the support of the English District and the Synod as well as many private gifts, Zion's building and grounds emerged from a major flood in 2021 much better positioned to weather any similar future events.

Zion continues to be blessed with one of the richest calendars of liturgical observation and opportunities for study of Scripture of any congregation, especially relative to its size. Holy Mass is celebrated every Sunday and Wednesday and on many other feast and saint days. Five regular studies of the Bible or important works of the Church are held, youth Sunday school is weekly, and the Daily Office is prayed throughout the week.

Zion supports the work of the Synod and the English District as her pastor serves as an adjunct member of the faculty of the seminary, and as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Concordia University System; and our congregational chairman serves on the English District Board of Directors.

Zion is also privileged to host a prominent annual event, the St. Michael Liturgical Conference, each September. Geared toward clergy and focusing on the doctrine of liturgy, attendance has recently grown to over 100 attendees.

- Having served AoC since September 2013, the Rev. Daniel Grams accepted the divine call to serve at the Kansas District office and departed in September 2023. On the First Sunday in Advent, December 3, 2023, Bishop Hardy installed the Rev. Larry K. Loree Jr., to serve as sole pastor.
- After serving three years as Vice President and another seven years as president of the congregation, Dave Lambert passed the gavel to Mr. David Preiss, who has now begun his first term as president. Thankfully, Dave Lambert will continue to serve the congregation, both as chairman of the Board of Elders and in his new role as Director of Administration.
- Being blessed with several faithful young couples, the congregation has enjoyed the natural growth
 of the congregation through six infant baptisms. Three of these families are currently expecting their
 next child.
- Son of the congregation, Mr. James Gramzow, entered the seminary at Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne (CTSFW) in fall 2022 to begin his preparation for the office of the holy ministry. He is currently wrapping up his vicarage at Grace, Naples, FL, before heading back to the seminary to start his final year in fall 2025.

- Our Human Care Team has become very active and has connected with several groups and
 organizations to provide an increased number of opportunities and projects for members to support

 in Detroit.

- In 2023, our congregation began participating in the deaconess intern program, receiving our first intern from CTSFW. We are now hosting our second deaconess intern, both of whom have been exceptional, bringing significant value to our congregation and childcare program. The office of deaconess has been a true blessing to our parish, enriching our congregational life.
- Despite increased competition from our State's free Pre-K program offered through school
 districts—which impacted our enrollment in fall 2024—our child care center adapted with creativity

 overall capacity of 52 children, we entered spring 2025 with 48 enrolled. Now in its ninth year of

Martin Luther Chapel, East Lansing, MI – The Rev. Curtis Dwyer and The Rev. James Robinson Martin Luther Chapel at Michigan State University is a congregation comprised of people of all ages and stages of life united around the gospel of Jesus Christ and dedicated to serving the campus community of Michigan State University. Alongside year-long resident members, students are involved in nearly every aspect of congregational life. In order to support the outreach to students, the English District has given us a grant every year of our existence, including the past three years.

Every year a team of students are identified as Student Leaders. These student leaders serve as officers of our Registered Student Organization on campus as well as the core group to help organize outreach and events for students. The student leaders meet weekly with one of the pastors (usually Pastor Robinson) for a meal, devotion, and prayer, and to discuss upcoming ministry events. The focus for every event is to reach new students, foster community among the students, and raise up new leaders. Every semester students plan two retreats, weekly Bible studies, and various other events. Every fall Pastor Robinson helps organize a retreat for students from several Michigan campuses, and each spring we send a group to the Campus Ministry Leadership Conference with students from across the Midwest.

In addition to student-specific events, students sing in the choir, assist with planning and leading our children's ministry, attend the Sunday morning Bible study, participate in the monthly Church Council meetings, attend and sometimes prepare congregational meals, become trained Stephen Ministers, assist with scripture readings and communion distribution during worship, and participate in any other role that suits their gifts and abilities.

Pastor Robinson and Pastor Dwyer work year-round to identify and connect with incoming students. Pastor Robinson regularly leads chapel services at Lutheran high schools around the state of Michigan. In cooperation with the Michigan District, we help support the "Campus Connect" initiative every summer, inviting Michigan LCMS congregations to connect their students with the appropriate campus ministry at several Michigan schools. We receive referrals from across Synod through the LCMS-U website. As members of the MSU Religious Advisors Association, we work with other religious organizations to ensure that all MSU students are connected with the religious organization of their choice.

Over the past three years, since the summer of 2022, we have reached out to over 1200 students through events, mailings, and other outreach like social media or a flyer around campus. We have had approximately 50 join us for worship, Bible study, retreats, and other activities, including luncheons and regular church functions.

Of special note: On February 13, 2023, a shooter claimed the lives of three MSU students and seriously injured five others. During the tragedy and in the immediate aftermath, Martin Luther Chapel was able to take a leading role in serving the whole MSU community: hosting a prayer service the next night, helping coordinate the presence of Comfort Dogs on campus, and offering words of encouragement and support to countless students (along with hundreds of cookies donated by members and friends). Pastor Dwyer, as the President of the MSU Religious Advisors Association, coordinated several clergy who ministered directly with the families of the students who were killed, and he was invited to help organize and speak at the campus-wide memorial two days after the tragedy. In the midst of overwhelming grief, we were able to point the campus to the eternal hope that we have in Christ, who triumphed over death and the grave.

MIDWEST REGION

The Rev. Robert A. Rogers, First Vice President

As of June 2025, I have been the Vice President of the Midwest Region for 11 years. Starting as 4th Vice President, I have climbed to 1st Vice President and the time has come to step aside for younger men to serve God with their gifts. I have had the pleasure of being in many of the congregations of the English District, especially those in the Midwest Region, and I find it truly remarkable to see what God does through the people of the English District. We have congregations who practice the highest of high church, and we have congregations who practice cutting-edge, modern worship. We have pastors who are some of the best preachers I have ever heard and all our pastors strive to glorify God in their leading of the liturgy and proclamation of the Gospel. I am very proud of the Midwest Region. While we have struggled with declining attendance and closing congregations, I believe that this is not a case of the Church dying (for that cannot happen), but a distillation process in which the saints of God are becoming purer and more intense. That is a good thing because as we continue forward into the end times, things are not getting easier but more difficult. If the LCMS is to continue to thrive (as I am certain she will), she will need congregations who both understand the value of standing on the shoulders of 2,000 years of saints and look for every possible way to speak the Gospel to the modern hearer.

The Midwest Region includes Nebraska, Missouri, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois and Kentucky. Our congregations are more varied than average for the LCMS. Highlights include:

- Bethesda in Chicago runs an international school serving many ethnicities and cultures. The congregation itself is about 1/3 Anglo and 2/3 Asian Indian.
- Grace in Vine Grove, KY is our southernmost congregation both geographically and culturally. It is a recent mission plant that is fully self-supporting, and I am very proud of the work they have done under their young pastor to overcome bumps in the road and thrive.
- Redeemer in Lincoln, NE is perhaps our most solidly Midwestern congregation. They are grieving
 the retirement of Pastor Ebert after serving them 41 years. He is a remarkable man and I look
 forward to seeing how God will use him in retirement. Redeemer is powering through the
 vacancy of their senior pastor like the powerful servant they are while simultaneously
 sponsoring their faithful DCE, Rod Lane, to be their Specific Ministry Family Life Pastor.
- I am always proud to say that my region is the home of the largest congregation of the LCMS, Hales Corners Lutheran Church. With an average worship attendance of some 1,500, their new senior pastor Leon Jameson is doing a faithful job of serving them and the Lord, but size is immaterial. My classmate Keith Speaks, their former senior pastor, has noted that more money means more problems. Truly, Hales Corners is not remarkable because of its size but because of its commitment to find innovative ways to proclaim the Gospel, especially to children and families. God has blessed them, and they have used those blessings to glorify Him.
- And now a shout out to one of the smallest congregations in the Midwest Region. Messiah in Elmhurst, IL has about 20 worshippers gathered on a good weekend. And yet, they still make an impact in their community. Under the long and faithful leadership of Rev. Brad Maxon, Messiah prides itself on being the small church presence in the shadow of massive reformed and community congregations. One of Messiah's members is 100 years old, and she still attends almost every LWML Zone meeting. Jesus has commissioned us to proclaim His Word wherever we are and administer His sacraments wherever we are and that is exactly what Messiah continues to do.
- I am also very proud of Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit and their young pastor Dan Greg. They have recovered from their former pastor's tragic car accident which led him to leave

congregational ministry. They are once more a growing confessional, liturgical congregation that would make Bishop Pittelko very proud (he was their pastor for 20+ years before he became bishop).

I would love to mention all my congregations because they are all doing amazing things to serve the Lord and the English District but there is only so much room in the workbook. Suffice to say, the Midwest Region is blessed with innovative and faithful congregations and pastors. Advent, Zionsville, IN – The Rev. Marcus Mackay and The Rev. Aaron Schultz Jesus called them to him, saying, "Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God" (Matthew 18:16). Advent Evangelical Lutheran Church and School, enriched by God's blessings, has been emboldened to expand the breadth and scope of ministry these past three years. In July 2022 we installed Rev. Aaron Schultz as our new headmaster and associate pastor. In August 2022 we installed Deaconess Dr. Jennifer Siukola. In fall 2022 we expanded our school to include 1st and 2nd grades. Our excitement for this endeavor was paused as we grieved together at the death of Deb Grady, Assistant Pastor Rev. Jim Grady's dear bride. We rejoiced in the Resurrection yet to come and the rest granted to her after battling cancer. Christ is yet victorious even in death for us! August 2023 brought the addition of 3rd through 6th grades and the installation of two new teachers: Ms. Elizabeth Paul and Mrs. Jena Mackay. Pastor Grady stepped down from full-time to part-time pastoral work in September 2023 and then retired completely in July 2024, being granted emeritus status. He is yet an active and involved member at Advent. Running out of classrooms, Advent began a three-year capital campaign in December 2023 to raise funds for our Phase III expansion (auditorium, classrooms, and offices). Initial commitments of \$2.1 million were pledged towards a goal of \$3.5 million. God be praised for this historic and generous campaign! A building committee was formed and has worked diligently towards ground-breaking on our Phase III expansion, slated for 2025. God willing, the doors of our new expansion will be open for classes and use in the fall of 2026. The fall of 2024 brought continued growth in our school with the addition of 7th and 8th grades. We will also add another Kindergarten class in the fall of 2025 and continue to have a waitlist for our other early childhood classes. We are currently out of classrooms and looking forward to the additional space. Advent sincerely thanks the English District for the gift of a generous grant to help with our Lutheran school expansion.

Additional staff members have also been added to our church and school, namely assistant teachers, school advancement coordinator, and professional bookkeeper. Over the course of the last three years, God has also blessed Advent with church growth of 54 households (96 new members), 26 child and 6 adult baptisms, and 17 youth and 21 adult confirmations. Advent continues to support the musical arts by hosting public events such as Abendmusik and Holy Week Cantata. The other 271 are younger than that, and 125 are under 12 years old. We see 98% of our members in worship at least once a month. We have enjoyed a significant number of adult and family converts in response to our evangelism efforts based on thorough catechesis and liturgy. Come and find me. I'd love to talk to you about it! Along the way, a congregation was planted in Marshall, MI for the English District, and we helped them eventually to get their own pastor. We also started a classical school which currently has 54 children enrolled. It is the only Lutheran school in Ft. Wayne that is growing at the moment. The people that God has sent to us are hungry for more than a quality education. They want a thoroughly rigorous theological education with daily, liturgical worship. We also called an associate pastor. We recently obtained a new school building to help us expand. And, of course, a lot of Jello has been eaten in the church basement. More than a few meetings have been held in the parking lot after the so-called "real" meetings, and the copy machine has had a jam or two. All this, by God's grace, without merit or worthiness in us. Bethesda, Chicago, IL – The Rev. Dr. Paul Bacon, The Rev. Dr. Shadrach Katari, and The Rev. Jean Bingue After living through the pandemic with no hospitalizations and no deaths, Bethesda Lutheran Church and School steadied its congregational life and looks to the future with hope. The "English" component at Bethesda numbers about 20 communicants and the Asian Indian Telegu part 45 adults and children. We have been worshiping together in English since 2020 and have held together with no difficulty.

Bethesda International Academy, serving three-year-olds through eighth grade numbers at 80 with a good prospect of reaching into the eighties by the fall. The Chicagoland Lutheran Education Foundation, which grants tuition and salary support along with capital funds, which over the years has amounted to more than \$10 million, has been the major support for Lutheran education in Chicago that keeps us alive.

Pastor Katari and Pastor Bacon look at the four youngsters under four years of age born to our families as a sign of continued life, for they show up in worship regularly. We know we are blessed.

Christ English, Chicago, IL – The Rev. C. J. Wright

Christ English Lutheran Church is in the process of restarting our educational program. We are located on the west side of Chicago, and we are the only African American LCMS church on this side of the city. We are preparing to incorporate artificial intelligence (AI) into our educational training. Currently, we are not able to afford full-time teachers, but AI technology will allow our students to get the same benefit that would be received from the instruction of a full-time teacher. Although we will not have full-time instructors, in the AI culture, we will have what are called coaches. These are people who have the responsibility of ensuring that the students correctly understand and follow instructed training. The concept of coaching in the realm of AI culture typically revolves around facilitating growth,

improvement, and learning but through a distinctly technological lens. Al coaching can be described as the practice of providing tailored guidance, insights, or mentorship using artificial intelligence systems. These systems rely on vast data analysis, pattern recognition, and predictive analytics to offer personalized feedback or recommendations to help individuals (our students) achieve their goals—be it in specialized development, skill building, or even mental health support. We intend to partner with organizations that specialize in Al education to access resources, workshops, and support networks. For instance, platforms like Open Roberta offer tools for programming educational robots, making Al concepts accessible to younger learners. Also, we will develop policies that promote the responsible use of Al, emphasizing ethical considerations and digital citizenship. This will help students understand the broader implications of Al technology. God willing, we plan to open this coming fall. We humbly solicit your prayers for this endeavor to come to fruition.

In July 2022, the congregation called Rev. Brian Crane to be our pastor. He accepted the Divine Call and was installed on October 9, 2022. His installation marked the end of a nearly five-year pastoral vacancy. During that time, the congregation was blessed to be served by Rev. Steven Resner as its vacancy pastor. Rev. Resner worked hard to ensure the congregation was in a sound financial position to support a full-time pastor. God blessed us with membership growth during his tenure and that growth has continued into the present. Many people have visited and joined our congregation because of our distinctly Lutheran traditional, liturgical worship.

God has also blessed us with the addition of an associate pastor. On February 21, 2025, Rev. Rob Doughty III was ordained by Bishop Jeffrey Miskus and installed as our associate pastor. Because Rev. Doughty is a full-time attorney, he serves the congregation in a limited, part-time capacity, assisting Pastor Crane as necessary. In these and many other ways, God has been exceedingly good and gracious to our congregation as we seek to share the love and message of Jesus to people in Mesa and the East Valley of Phoenix.

Faith, Overgaard, AZ – The Rev. Rodney Schmeltz

Since Faith Lutheran Church is on the Mogollon Rim, there are a number of our members who reside with us in the late spring through early fall. They then reside in the "valley" for the remainder of the year. This fluctuation does involve proportionately less than it had since a few of those members have moved their membership.

Faith Lutheran Church has a sizable nest egg which will allow us to carry on until we grow to provide the offerings necessary to endure or the Lord decides we have existed in the kingdom work long enough. All of us at Faith are determined that the Lord has us here for a reason, and we realize the reality: we are in a time of rebuilding in the ministry here.

Our three Bible studies are fairly well attended, and we have almost all of our members worshipping every Sunday. It is wonderful to hear and see faith maturing in the members here.

The 1-1-1 Mission jug is utilized by a good many of the people here, and in 2024 the Council approved the increase of our District support from 3% to 5%.

The congregation expects and encourages Pastor Schmeltz to be involved with Circuit Winkels and other matters.

It is stressed often and regularly here at Faith that our mission and calling is to preach the Word and rightly administer the Sacraments. God gives the increase, and He will bring into our midst those He already knows who will join us. We remain optimistic for the days, months, and years ahead.

Lord, use us always for Your glory and the good of Your kingdom, Amen.

Family of Christ, Phoenix, AZ – The Rev. Fred Gerlach

Rev. Fred Gerlach has labored tirelessly at Family of Christ Lutheran Church which is located in a close suburb of Phoenix. He faithfully preaches the Word of God and properly administers the Sacraments as instituted by Christ. He serves as the pastor of this very small congregation, as well as the director of the child care/preschool of the church and community.

In the past six months, Pastor Gerlach has baptized several children and catechized several adult members. Family of Christ is located in a very mobile suburb, and therefore the change in membership is much greater than in other locations. As Rev Gerlach says, "I will serve this church and preschool until the Lord of the Church calls me elsewhere."

Messiah, Parker, AZ – Vacant

For 20 years Rev. Roger Yoder served the brothers and sisters of Messiah Lutheran Church as its called SMP pastor. Pastor Yoder, at the age of 80, retired as of February 2025. The congregation is at the beginning of the Call process and would appreciate the prayers of the English District that our heavenly Father would see fit to provide a pastor to serve them. Even though they are not a large congregation, they are active and want to remain a viable English District parish.

Shepherd of the Canyon, Gold Canyon, AZ – The Rev. Dr. Mark Wood

Shepherd of the Canyon Lutheran Church (SCLC) began as a new church start in August 2022 with a core group of eight people. Using the LCMS's new church planting process (now called Church Planting Simplified), the core group formed the Church Planting Team and worked with the District to establish an Advisory Team. After meeting for about one year in the conference room of a local hotel, SCLC was able to secure a lease for commercial property in Gold Canyon. Then Bishop/President Rev. Dr. Jamison Hardy joined us for a dedication service and celebration in October 2023. In June 2024, SCLC was able to expand into additional space in the same office complex. On February 23, 2025, SCLC was received into membership in the English District by Bishop/President Rev. Jeffrey Miskus. On that same day, Pastor Mark Wood was installed as SCLC's first called pastor. The congregation was chartered with 32 members. SCLC has received two grants from the English District and is the first recipient of the LCMS's granting program under Church Planting Simplified. The District's and Synod's support has been instrumental in SCLC becoming a chartered congregation in the LCMS. The near-term focus of SCLC is on establishing witness and outreach activities.

Shepherd of the Mountains, Pinetop, AZ – The Rev. Michael Mathews

After Rev. Daniel Warner accepted a call to Colorado, we were served during the vacancy by emeritus pastor Rev. David Kaiser until Rev. Michael Mathews accepted the call to serve us and was installed in February 2024. We continue to reach out to residents and visitors in the White Mountains area of Arizona with the good news of salvation in Jesus Christ.

Shepherd of the Pines, Payson, AZ – Vacant

After a successful 5+ years of Rev. Larry Bell serving at Shepherd of the Pines Lutheran Church, he made the decision to retire from parish ministry. We join our brothers and sisters in Christ in thanking Pastor Bell for his time among them. He and his wife Pam have decided to remain in Payson for retirement. Congratulations to the Bells!

The congregation is currently in the Call process. They ask for prayers on their behalf that the God of the Church would send them a new under-shepherd in the near future.

ARIZONA-SOUTH CIRCUIT #20

The Rev. Dr. John Stieve, Circuit Visitor

The Arizona South visitation circuit encompasses congregations, schools, and special ministries in the greater Tucson, Arizona area. God has richly blessed the people, programs, and spiritual life of our circuit throughout the 2022–2025 triennium.

Ascension, Tucson, AZ – The Rev. Thomas Braun, The Rev. Samuel St. John, and The Rev. Stephen Martin Ascension Lutheran Church and School serve the Oro Valley area, just north of Tucson. They are in the beginning stages of making it easier to enter worship as well as combining all the school classrooms into one building for enhanced security purposes. They continue to grow numerically and spiritually through the Word of God, worship, and Bible study. Ascension feels blessed to be serving people of different backgrounds.

Catalina, Tucson, AZ – The Rev. Dr. Michael Morehouse and The Rev. Bruce von Hindenburg Catalina Lutheran Church has continued to build upon a strong foundation of biblically grounded, highly liturgical and confessional worship and teaching. The congregation again participated in the LCMS vicarage program, with plans to continue that in the future. We offered professional church worker continuing education courses annually through both U.S. seminaries. Congregational outreach to local communities included their Operation Barnabas Chapter and that of lay diaconate members. A women's theological book club was added, and the pastors continue to serve the Church in the world through participation in KFUO's "Thy Strong Word." Catalina completed a three-year capital campaign, and a second campaign has begun. God has granted funds to empower them to expand their facilities footprint on their current grounds. They are considering purchasing a permanent vicarage house near the congregation property and expanding the classroom, kitchen, and fellowship spaces.

Christus Rex, Rio Rico, AZ – served by The Rev. Roger Stuenkel

Christus Rex Lutheran Church gathers a small group of faithful believers around Word and Sacrament each Lord's Day. They serve their southern Arizona Rio Rico Community – less than fifteen miles from the Mexico border. Christus Rex plans greater visibility and outreach in the coming months.

Crosspoint, Sahuarita, AZ – The Rev. Jason Hong

Crosspoint Lutheran Church continues to grow in membership in the fast-developing community of Sahuarita, about fifteen miles south of Tucson. They welcomed their new pastor in August 2023 and have since added new ministry and activity areas, including home Bible studies, children and youth events, and adult fellowship groups. In February 2025, after worshiping in a local restaurant meeting room for fifteen months, Crosspoint dedicated a new worship and ministry center – the church's home base for worship, fellowship, nurture, and service.

Faith, Tucson, AZ – served by The Rev. Nicholas Wirtz

Faith Lutheran Church, the mother LCMS church for the Tucson area, continues to be a missional, English-speaking congregation by hosting a Spanish ministry, a parochial school, and a campus outreach (Arizona Lutheran Campus Mission Society). Pastor Wirtz serves as the deployed Hispanic missionary to

Santa Trinidad through Lutheran Church of the Risen Savior, Green Valley. Pastor Todd Zill serves Faith Lutheran Church as their deployed missionary to campus ministries in Tucson.

Faith Lutheran School has been giving parents and students a distinctly Lutheran alternative to public school since 1952. Offering Kindergarten through 8th grade along with a toddler and preschool program, it continues to be staffed by dedicated and loving teachers. A low student-to-teacher ratio allows for individual attention to students' educational, emotional, and spiritual needs. Faith is currently in discussions with other LCMS congregations and schools in the Tucson area as they explore the possibility of a city-wide educational association: Southern Arizona Lutheran Schools Association.

LCMS U at the University of Arizona – The Rev. M. Todd Zill was in a part-time capacity with an attempt to develop the campus ministry into a full-time ministry for the first time. Making this happen has had its challenges, both locally specific and general to all who engage in campus ministry today. The Campus Christian Center at the University of Arizona was partially owned by the District but was not utilized during these years due to an ongoing lawsuit. Despite the changes and challenges, a small but stable student group continues to be well served and demonstrates a great zeal for faithful Lutheran catechesis and fellowship, in conjunction with the continued support of the circuit, the District, and the local ALCMS (Arizona Lutheran Campus Mission Society).

Holy Trinity, Tucson, AZ – served by The Rev. Dr. Garry McClure

Holy Trinity Lutheran Church moved from its southern Tucson grounds to a store site on the far west side of Tucson. They purchased land in that area and hope to erect a church building on it in the coming years. They conduct regular Divine services, Bible studies, and group activities, as they seek to reach the community around them.

Messiah, Tucson, AZ – The Rev. Luther Esala

Messiah Lutheran Church meets within a home for worship, study, and fellowship. This small band of believers continues to serve in an area of northwest Tucson.

Mt. Olive, Tucson, AZ – The Rev. Isaac Wirtz

For the first time in years, Mt. Olive Lutheran Church took six youth to the 2022 LCMS National Youth Gathering. In 2024, they raised funds and attended Higher Things and plan to do so again. Confirmation classes have grown to over a half-dozen per class and twice as many in youth group events. They completed updating their constitution and bylaws. Weekly attendance has grown steadily, with individuals or families visiting each week, many whom are entirely new to Lutheranism.

Risen Savior, Green Valley, AZ – The Rev. Todd Arnold

Lutheran Church of the Risen Savior maintains a healthy and active membership in the Green Valley retirement community about twenty miles south of Tucson. Staff additions included a Director of Technology and Communications (who also serves the circuit) and a Parish Nurse. 2024 was an anniversary year, celebrating fifty years at their current site and sixty years as a congregation. Pastor emeritus John Stieve spoke at the 50-year dinner celebration, and Bishop Jeffrey Miskus preached for the 60-year Divine Services. In February 2025, a Lutheran Hour Ministry Weekend was held with Lutheran Hour speaker, Rev. Dr. Michael Zeigler preaching. The campus hosts many community groups, including A.A., quilters, and musicians. The church's semi-monthly "SOUL Lunch" continues to feed and provide fellowship for hundreds around the community.

Misión Luterana Santa Trinidad, Tucson, AZ – The Rev. Nicholas Wirtz

Misión Luterana Santa Trinidad, which has been active for 30 years in the Tucson area, continues its mission work to Spanish-speaking folks. It serves four generations of Spanish speakers with abuelas (grandmothers) and abuelos (grandfathers), bisabuelas (great-grandmother matriarchs), mothers, fathers, and their children who attend Santa Trinidad and some who also attend Faith Lutheran School.

<u>The Sanctity of Life ministry</u>, led by Dr. Roni Grad, organizes the circuit to participate in the annual Tucson March for Life. Additionally, he keeps pastors and congregation leaders updated on District and Lutherans for Life events locally, regionally and nationally. A few congregations have Life Teams, churches support pregnancy care centers, and prayers are offered in the vicinity of a local Planned Parenthood office.

<u>The Lutheran Servanthood School</u> continues to educate, train, and prepare laity for meaningful diaconate work throughout the circuit. This school continues its over 35 years of service.

NEVADA/TEXAS CIRCUIT #21

The Rev. Stanley Lacey, Circuit Visitor

Prince of Peace, Mesquite, NV – The Rev. Robert Bruggeman

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church began 2024 with a Vision Workshop, emphasizing that the kingdom of God would not only grow within each of the saints but also extend to our local community, state, and national outreach. Prince of Peace is predominantly a congregation of retirees, many of whom live in Mesquite, NV, from October until April before returning to their summer homes and family congregations. Whether we have everyone here or are awaiting their return, Prince of Peace Lutheran continues to sustain and thrive.

Our spring outreach event was Mesquite Days where we handed out pamphlets and extended an invitation to join us for Divine Services, Christian education, and fellowship opportunities, including Women of Life, Campfire Fellowship, ATV Fellowship, Hope & Comfort Club Fellowship, Sunday Brunch Fellowship, and Movie Fellowship. We also distributed nearly 100 Portals of Prayer and registrations for our Vacation Bible School initiative (which welcomed five children in its first summer).

One of our members came forward to answer the call to pastoral ministry through the Specific Ministry Program. We offer prayers for his ordination and installation in 2026. As part of the program, Pastor Bruggeman installed him as the vicar at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. In September, they both attended the SMP orientation at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN. He has since completed his fall Lutheran Confessions course and begun a course on the Gospel of Luke.

Prince of Peace Lutheran continues to show love for God and neighbor, as several saints stepped forward to serve as elders, and our council vice president assumed the office of president when our previous president suddenly entered glory.

Improvements to our facilities have been both industrious and creative. One family hired a carpenter to install shelving and cabinetry for our library. Our Women of Life welcomed the teachers and staff of Virgin Valley Elementary School back with a breakfast, where they also provided Prince of Peace Lutheran drawstring backpacks. Additionally, they organized our second annual Angel Tree event for Virgin Valley Elementary School through which over a dozen families received Christmas gifts.

St. Paul, Paris, TX – The Rev. Toby Byrd

In the spring of 2024, nine dedicated families, confessional Lutherans all, met and agreed to form a confessional Lutheran congregation in Paris, TX. The congregation was to center around Word and Sacrament ministry. After securing a facility for worship—the conference room of the VIP Inn & Suites motel in Paris, TX—and asking the Rev. Toby Byrd to lead the service, the fledgling group held its first Divine Service on April 7, 2024.

From that first worship service, the group pledged to fund the new congregation through offerings, covering the cost of a facility in which to worship, the purchase of altar and communion ware for Divine Service, and the cost of worship and Sunday school materials. With this pledged support, the congregation chose a name—St. Paul Lutheran Church—and contacted the president of the English District for inclusion in the district.

After our initial Divine Service, the following happened in succession:

- 1. The application for membership in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and the English District was completed by the president/bishop of the English District on April 30, 2024.
- 2. The Rev. Toby Byrd transferred into the English District.
- 3. The Constitution of St. Paul Lutheran Church was approved by the English District Board of Directors on May 23, 2024, and St. Paul became a member of the English District on that date.
- 4. The Rev. Toby Byrd accepted the call of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Paris, TX, as their pastor and was installed as pastor by English District Bishop Rev. Jeffery Miskus on May 25, 2024.

The Lord has been gracious to us throughout the year, providing a venue for Divine Services for which the congregation is grateful. As God's Word is proclaimed and the Sacraments distributed, the congregation has grown, adding two adults through baptism and confirmation. However, during the year, we lost one of our saints as he was called to God's kingdom of glory. The Lord giveth, and the Lord taketh away.

Throughout the year, Christian education has been continually provided with a Sunday Bible study, Sunday school, and a Wednesday morning Bible study at a local restaurant. On Monday evenings, one of our younger members is completing her second year of catechism and will be confirmed on Palm Sunday 2025. We give thanks to God for these wonderful blessings He continues to pour out upon us.

The congregation has continued to meet at the VIP Inn & Suites but always with an eye toward a permanent church of our own. Our search for an already constructed facility has met with disappointment, as no suitable facility has been located. Therefore, looking toward the future, the congregation is in the process of purchasing a 1.94-acre lot on the northwest side of Paris, TX, on a major avenue that runs the entire length of the city from north to south. This purchase is scheduled to close on February 28, 2025. Once complete, the congregation will embark on a plan to construct St. Paul's church, utilizing the lot as often as possible for evangelism, outreach, and worship while we await the construction of our new church building.

We are excited about the opportunities the Holy Spirit has placed before us in the Paris, TX community, and we look forward to meeting these great mission opportunities while also asking for your prayers as we endeavor to do the Lord's work in this great community.

We look forward to meeting our fellow brothers and sisters at the convention in Ann Arbor in June.

St. Thomas, Magnolia, TX – The Rev. Stanley Lacey

St. Thomas Evangelical Lutheran Church held its first gathering on Epiphany in 2024. By the grace of God, the congregation was officially chartered as a member congregation of the English District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in April 2024. We are deeply grateful for the support and encouragement of the English District, especially then-Bishop Jamison Hardy and now Bishop Jeffrey Miskus, as we continue to grow and increase awareness in our community.

St. Thomas began with 37 charter members. Since the installation of Pastor Lacey in August of 2024, we have received two members by baptism and thirteen by transfer from other LCMS congregations, bringing our total membership to 61. On a typical Sunday, our average attendance is 60. We celebrate the Divine Service with Holy Communion every week, followed by beginning catechesis for children around ten and under who are preparing for First Communion and family catechesis for older youth and adults. During Advent and Lent, we offer Thursday evening prayer services, which a local LCMS congregation, St. Paul of the Texas District, kindly allows us to hold in their space.

As a young and vibrant church, St. Thomas is committed to outreach and evangelism in the growing Northwest Houston area. Our primary efforts have included establishing an online presence through our website, optimizing search engine visibility, and maintaining active engagement on Facebook and Instagram. We are also working on improving signage to make our worship location easier to find on Sunday mornings. Looking ahead, we have begun exploring different property options to better understand potential costs for a more permanent location.

One of the biggest challenges we have faced is raising awareness of our congregation in a sprawling suburban area. However, we have been richly blessed with faithful families, many children, and an active laity who are eager to deepen relationships within the congregation and work to identify pathways to community engagement. The past year has been a whirlwind—truly a gift from God. We never expected to be where we are in such a short time, but we are energized by the constant reminder that God is in charge and has set a path before us. Now that we have a pastor, we look forward to engaging more actively with our community, inviting people into our church, and sharing the love of Christ with those around us.

We thank God for His abundant blessings upon our congregation and pray for His continued guidance as we seek to be faithful stewards of His Word and Sacraments in our community.

First, El Cajon, CA – The Rev. James Huenink

The past triennium has been filled with both highs and lows for First Lutheran Church. Since 2022, we have had a number of new Christians enter our congregation including four adults through baptism and four adults through confirmation. All of these people came to us as gifts from God with no previous

connection, including one who said something like, "So I decided I wanted to be a Christian. I started with the book of Genesis."

In 2024 we celebrated the 60th anniversary of our sanctuary and installed a new organ. Our congregation has been working on ways to connect with the Afghan, Chaldean, Syrian, and Kurdish immigrants and refugees in our neighborhood. has blessed us with five infant/child baptisms, four adult baptisms, two adult confirmations, three junior confirmations, and four professions of faith. Communion was offered on the 2nd and 4th Sundays.

New Life's Sunday worship is trilingual (English, Cantonese, and Mandarin) with livestream on YouTube. During 2022-2025 New Life continued outreach through special celebrations including New Beginnings Sunday, Mid-Autumn Festival, Reformation Day, "Saints & Treats" activity for the children, Thanksgiving Sunday, Thanksgiving Day home devotions, Christmas Sunday and Christmas program (praise God, in 2024 He brought 92 people to attend!), Christmas Day home devotion, Chinese New Year Sunday, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday worship services. Each of these had related activities to engage, befriend, and share the Good News of Christ with people!

The education hour, Sunday school, and small groups occur after worship. Attendance is about 50% of the Sunday worshippers. Several small groups, including the Friday Men's Group (Zoom), Blessing Fellowship Cantonese Bible study, Wednesday Outreach/Prayer Cantonese small group (Zoom), and Wednesday Bible study (Zoom), each use specially prepared small group questions related to the sermon for the purpose of providing more in-depth examination and practical application of Sunday's sermon text. We also have Chinese adult Cantonese group, English adult group, Friday youth and young adults fellowship, once a month young professionals group, discovery classes (adult and junior confirmation), and the Alleluia Choir, Hosanna Choir, Men's Choir, and Joyful Sound Ensemble.

In 2022 we had a summer retreat with the theme "Overcomer." We had special congregational picnics in both 2023 and 2024, which served as outreach opportunities.

Thanks be to God, New Life had 10 persons who attended the 2022 LCMS National Youth Gathering! The youth and young adults had really meaningful winter retreats in 2023 and 2024.

New Life has two additional reasons to praise Jesus for His work:

- 1. Her "son" Michael Yee, graduate of Concordia University Irvine's Director of Christian Education program, is currently seeking to attend seminary to serve God as a pastor; and
- 2. Her "son" Corey Chang was ordained as associate pastor at Hope, Daly City, CA in 2024.

New Life triennium service activities included Operation Christmas Child (2022, 50 boxes; 2023, 72 boxes; 2024, 50 boxes), Christmas caroling to the shut-ins, and having a leading role with Pastor Otis Byrd (SOTH) and Pastor Curtis Binz and West Portal Lutheran Church in the annual LCMS participation in the Walk for Life West Coast and the LCMS Pre-Walk Gathering.

Thanks be to God, New Lifers have participated in these "mercy ministries:" English District's 1-1-1 Mission Initiative, English District Gala, hurricane relief (Ian, Idalia, Lee, Helene, Milton), Kentucky flood relief, tornado relief, Mississippi tornado relief, earthquakes in Turkey and Syria, national offering, Ukrainian relief, Maui fire relief, Morocco's earthquake, Libya's flooding, the Nagorno-Karabakh Armenian Christian refugees, Iowa flood relief, California wildfire relief, and Alpha Pregnancy Center.

St. Mark, Ferndale, CA – The Rev. Tyrel Bramwell

St. Mark Lutheran Church continues to listen to the Word of God and hold fast to it in good hearts, bearing fruit with patience. The center of our life together is the Divine Service, with the Lord's Supper

celebrated weekly. We have two in-person family Bible studies (Sunday and Wednesday), where all ages grow in the wisdom of God together, and one live Bible study (Tuesday) online. The congregation wants more! Individual Confession is available weekly (Thursdays) and by appointment. The pastor and people actively engage with neighbors, contending for the faith against many evil efforts to lead our neighbors astray, suffering for the sake of Christ, and are blessed to see many fruits of faithfulness. In addition to serving our local neighbors, St. Mark is actively serving the Church-at-large through the online publication of educational videos.

West Portal, San Francisco, CA – The Rev. Curtis Binz and The Rev. Jacob Swenson West Portal Lutheran Church and School in San Francisco, California, is now blessed with a new associate pastor, Rev. Jacob Swenson, who comes to California from the Iowa East District. West Portal Lutheran School will be celebrating 75 years next year. God continues to bless West Portal Lutheran Church and School with a steady/increasing school enrollment and many faithful church members. Many long-time church members have entered into the church triumphant in the past few years, but God continues to bring new people to us to be instructed in God's Word and receive God's gifts through the Word and Sacraments.

MISSION GRANTS

All Saints Lutheran Church Campus Ministry, Slippery Rock, PA

The Rev. Jacob Deal and Mrs. Augusta Mennell, Campus Ministry Director

1. Congregation Development

- a. Campus ministry does not happen well outside of an established congregation. We are thankful that the involvement of members has continually been increasing. The leadership in the congregation continues to show love for the members and our college community seeking to provide balance and attention to both. The mortgage has been paid off making a way for us to do more with the gifts the Lord provides.
- b. Other opportunities for catechesis and involvement in the life of the church are available, including Sunday afternoon congregational catechesis.
- c. The congregation created a sacristy in an upstairs room and cleaned out the narthex to make room for overflow when the sanctuary fills up.
- d. There has been an increase in community presence at Village Fest and Giant Eagle (bell ringing). We have, over the last couple years, become a presence at Village Fest, hosting a tent and handing out free water and information about Lutheran doctrine.

2. Vicarage Support

a. Over the 2023-2024 school year All Saints Lutheran Church welcomed Vicar Zachary Wessel thanks in large part to the support of the English District. His love and care for the people of God grew and grew throughout the year resulting in a richer preaching and teaching of Christ the Crucified.

3. Lutheran Student Fellowship - Grove City College

- a. The members of All Saints are continually looking for ways to engage more students who are away at college. Dr. Kelsey Madsen, a member and French professor at Grove City College, was instrumental in helping our students organize the Lutheran Student Fellowship (LSF).
 - i. Sunday evening study is offered on Grove City College's campus; students have the opportunity to request the study of topics that interest them.
- All Saints has provided support and encouragement as students developed a chartered LSF group on Grove City College's campus. LSF has hosted three official events on campus thus far.

4. Lutheran Student Fellowship - Slippery Rock University

- a. The 2024-2025 school year saw an increase of interest from Slippery Rock students, some Lutheran and some exploring other denominations. Our new student president for the LSF is working closely with the Campus Ministry Committee to revitalize the organization and provide spiritual care to the students on campus focusing on worship and Bible studies.
- b. Weekly Wednesday evening Bible study is offered at All Saints for students from Slippery Rock University.

5. Campus Ministry Committee

a. This new committee was formed to help keep track of the schedules of both colleges, giving the students the greatest opportunity to participate in activities. It works closely with the student fellowship leaders to plan, support, and advertise on-campus and off-campus events. This can be everything from budgeting to transportation. All Saints is

trying to provide fellowship activities to help students build a community of faith; events have included axe throwing, kayaking, and trap shooting, with plans to have a men's camping trip, range time, and other activities.

- 6. Campus Ministry: Increasing Visibility
 - a. The office of the campus ministry director was moved to a more visible and accessible location for local college students to visit during the week. Campus Ministry Director Augusta Mennell is available to meet with students Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays; Pastor Jacob Deal is also available whenever needed.
 - b. Mrs. Mennell remains in close contact with current and former international students in an effort to continue to share the gospel.

Bethesda Asian Indian Ministry, Chicago, IL

The Rev. Shadrach Katari

Asian Indian Ministry was started in 1998 to preach the Gospel among all Asian Indians especially among Telugu people of India. It is a great blessing to have many people added from other suburbs in Chicagoland. We reach out to believers and non-believers to know our Lord through the gospel and invite them to our Christian community to know each other and learn more about the word of God.

Through our Bible studies our church families are learning about the faith and become involved in discussions. In the last four years, we have finished many books in the New Testament, and by following the Lutheran perspectives and methods, we are encouraging our Christian families who do not know how to understand the word of God. The small groups are helping to reach many families with prayers around the city. Every Friday we have the Bible study in our Telugu language, and every other Saturday we have Bible study in English.

We conduct intercessory prayer twice a week to help the needy and sick. We also have online prayer meetings once a month where we invite families from other countries to share their needs. We had many people witness about how the prayers are helping them to see the miracles in their lives.

We have new families coming to our church worship services in English at 10:30 a.m. and to Telugu worship services at 7:00 p.m. We invite Christian and non-Christian families to our services and are happy to see them on Sundays. For family thanksgiving prayers and birthday celebrations, our church people gather in the assembly hall in church, and many invite new people to these events. We preach the gospel, and it gives us the opportunity to invite them to our weekly programs and Sunday worships. It is a great privilege for me to meet them and pray for them.

We invite families and friends to attend the gospel concerts and gospel meetings which gives us the opportunity to invite them to attend our church programs throughout the year. Many youth and children involved in the singing share their experiences about their personal relationship with Jesus. They express how our church programs encourage them to grow in faith.

We provide transportation to bring families to church and to take the elderly to their doctor's appointments. We also assist families with groceries and clothing. We have distributed gospel tracts and Bibles to people in our community. We help new mothers with babysitting, and we invite all these families to attend our fellowship services.

We appreciate and are thankful to our president/bishop and the English District for their prayers and support for me and our ministry to grow in faith and reach out to many souls to bring them to the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

First Trinity Lutheran Church, Pittsburgh, PA

Highlights from Lutheran Student Fellowship and International Student Ministry:

- Hosted in-person and online speakers on and off campus on a variety of topics: "What Does It
 Mean to Be Human?", "The Truth Will Set You Free: Christian Discernment in an Age of Political
 Extremism and Conspiracy Thinking," "Sex and Gender," and more.
- Two adult baptisms, plus one infant baptism of a child of graduate students; nine adult confirmations.
- Every Ash Wednesday we offer the imposition of ashes, tabling at central locations on campus at CMU (student union) and Pitt (dorms/cafeteria).
- First Trinity Homeless Ministry, a daughter mission of the campus ministry, provides weekly lunch rounds. Students from LSF, as well as non-churched students, commonly participate. The campus pastor begins with brief devotions. Students also volunteer at the Pittsburgh Lutheran Center for the Blind, housed at First Trinity.
- Campus pastor continues to serve on advisory council of the Beatrice Institute, as chaplain for the Pitt Pre-Med Hospice Volunteer Program, and as a member of the CMU Council of Religious Advisors and the Pitt Association of Chaplaincies; he is also a regular guest on WORD-FM.
- Annual popular social events include welcome back picnic, hayride/bonfire/corn maze;
 Thanksgiving feast; Shrove/Fat Tuesday pancake dinner and party; symphony outing;
 international potluck; and much more.
- Every year we table at the fall and spring semester activities fairs of Pitt, CMU, and Chatham and
 at the Wellness Fair of Pitt (only religious organization represented); Pastor Andræ also regularly
 tables on campus and in front of the church with a "Free Prayer" sign; outreach events include
 free ice cream days, free pancakes days, and more.
- Pastor attends CMU Humanist League meetings several times each year.
- Pastor continues regular gigs on local Christian radio station, WORD-FM, as well as involvement with local pro-life network of organizations.
- Weekly LSF dinner, Bible study, and Compline; ESL class and Bible study; Catechesis.
- Weekly Divine Service with the First Trinity congregation and student lunch.
- Pastor facilitates quarterly meetings of the Pitt Pre-Med Hospice Volunteer Program.
- Campus pastor regularly involved with local Redeemer Lutheran High School: opening prayers, speaking about college choices and life, etc.
- Pastor Hans O. Andræ (Fr. Hans), designated pastor emeritus, died 2/13/23; son and Campus Pastor Eric R. Andræ preached at the funeral, 2/18.
- Pastor presented paper and preached at new LCMS U conferences 2023, 2024.
- First Trinity hosted PALM/Higher Things youth retreat with Pastor Andræ as plenary speaker and a college student panel, 2/16-2/17/24.
- Pastor conducted private prayer service for comfort and consolation for ESL student, Zheng, a believer from China, and her non-believing niece. Zheng's daughter, a CMU student from China, had taken her own life.

- Pastor was guest lecturer in Concordia University online classes and in person, 9/11, 10/14, 10/16/24
- Pastor spoke at large group meeting of CMU InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, 2/21/25.
- First Trinity/Holy Cross hosted Concordia Theological Seminary (CTS) "Urban Immersion" for three students, 3/1-3/4/25.
- Three alumni are currently enrolled in seminary toward the ministry.
- Lots of alumni visitation both with former students visiting Pittsburgh and during campus pastor's travels.
- Lots of regular, ongoing pastoral care, counsel, private confessions, etc. This has included transformative experiences for people involved in severe spiritual warfare, the occult, and Satanism.

Martin Luther Chapel Campus Ministry, East Lansing, MI

The Rev. Curt Dwyer and The Rev. James Robinson

Martin Luther Chapel at Michigan State University is a congregation comprised of people of all ages and stages of life united around the gospel of Jesus Christ and dedicated to serving the campus community of Michigan State. Alongside year-long resident members, students are involved in nearly every aspect of congregational life. In order to support the outreach to students, the English District has given us a grant every year of our existence, including the past three years.

Every year a team of students are identified as Student Leaders. These student leaders serve as officers of our Registered Student Organization on campus as well as the core group to help organize outreach and events for students. The student leaders meet weekly with one of the pastors (usually Pastor James Robinson) for a meal, devotion and prayer, and to discuss upcoming ministry events. The focus for every event is to reach new students, foster community among the students, and raise up new leaders. Every semester, students plan two retreats, weekly Bible studies, and various other events. Every fall Pastor Robinson helps organize a retreat for students from several Michigan campuses, and each spring we send a group to the Campus Ministry Leadership Conference with students from across the Midwest.

In addition to student-specific events, students sing in the choir, assist with planning and leading our children's ministry, attend the Sunday morning Bible study, participate in the monthly church council meetings, attend and sometimes prepare congregational meals, become trained Stephen Ministers, assist with scripture readings and communion distribution during worship, and participate in any other role that suits their gifts and abilities.

Pastor Robinson and Pastor Dwyer work year-round to identify and connect with incoming students. Pastor Robinson regularly leads chapel services at lutheran high schools around the state of Michigan. In cooperation with the Michigan District, we help support the "Campus Connect" initiative every summer, inviting Michigan LCMS congregations to connect their students with the appropriate campus ministry at several Michigan schools. We receive referrals from across Synod through the LCMS-U website. As members of the MSU Religious Advisors Association, we work with other religious organizations to ensure that all MSU students are connected with the religious organization of their choice.

Over the past three years, since the summer of 2022, we have reached out to over 1200 students through events, mailings, and other outreach like social media or a flyer around campus. We have had

approximately 50 join us for worship, Bible study, retreats and other activities, including luncheons and regular church functions.

Of special note: On February 13, 2023, a shooter claimed the lives of three MSU students and seriously injured five others. During the tragedy and in the immediate aftermath, Martin Luther Chapel was able to take a leading role in serving the whole MSU community: hosting a prayer service the next night, helping coordinate the presence of Comfort Dogs on campus, and offering words of encouragement and support to countless students (along with hundreds of cookies donated by members and friends). Pastor Dwyer, as president of the MSU Religious Advisors Association, coordinated several clergy who ministered directly to the families of the students who were killed, and he was invited to help organize and speak at the campus-wide memorial two days after the tragedy. In the midst of overwhelming grief, we were able to point the campus to the eternal hope that we have in Christ, who triumphed over death and the grave.

Philadelphia Lutheran Ministries - Logos, Philadelphia, PA

In any location, but particularly in the city, mission work is more a marathon than a sprint. That has certainly been the case over the last three years. The primary endeavor of Philadelphia Lutheran Ministries has been outreach in the heart of the city center by word and sacrament ministry at Logos Lutheran. We saw an increase of undergraduate students as well as young professionals in attendance at Divine Service. The nature of the city is very transient as we welcome new individuals to our midst and regularly bid farewell to those we have known so well. Your prayers are very much appreciated.

Additionally, we have enjoyed getting to know nine different vicars and see them grow during their time with us. Each of them brings something unique to the ministry. Two years ago, the weekly rhythm was changed by the vicar to include a dedicated meal and intentional theological conversation as a means of asking questions in a causal setting. This has been a means of pointing people to regular attendance at Divine Service on Sundays as well as weekly prayer and Scripture study on Tuesday evenings.

In 2018, Pastor Kieselowsky took an opportunity to begin a weekly Bible study in the Philadelphia prison. While the Bible study was temporarily suspended due to pandemic restrictions, he has been invited back to meet with the high-need section of the prison with unique psychological support.

The proclamation of liberty in Christ continues to go out to the far corners of the city of Philadelphia. The support of the English District is a tremendous encouragement. Our Lord has brought the world to our doorstep, and it is a privilege to be included in His gracious work to bring people to the knowledge of our Savior Jesus Christ.

Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry

At Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry (PLDM) we use our hands to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the Deaf community of Pittsburgh through weekly signed Bible study, weekly interpreted Divine Services, third Sunday Deaf luncheon and social, instruction in American Sign Language for hearing and hard of hearing members of the congregation, local Lutheran high school elective classes, local pastors who may

also wish to start a similar ministry, and outreach to other LCMS Deaf ministries across the United States.

We proclaim the Gospel of Christ to the Deaf community in Pittsburgh in accord with the Great Commission. To preach and teach the true Word of God and administer the sacraments that all who hear the Word and receive the sacraments may live and grow in faith in Jesus Christ. To act in faith with love and mercy toward others, especially the Deaf in the Pittsburgh area, as Jesus Christ would have us do.

The highlight in the year of Our Lord 2024 at the Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry was the baptism and confirmation of five of our newest members at First Trinity Lutheran Church. Rev. Eric Andræ baptized and confirmed in the faith three deaf women and confirmed in the faith two additional deaf women. The two sponsors for the baptisms were deaf members of First Trinity Lutheran Church.

We look forward in 2025 to the baptism, confirmation and marriage counseling of a deaf couple that will be married at First Trinity in 2026. We are excited to have our first deaf wedding! The Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry also looks forward to hosting a table at the Pittsburgh Sign-A-Thon in March. This is where the majority of Deaf in the Pittsburgh area go to meet old friends and see new technologies and resources available for the deaf. We distribute Catechisms on thumb drives, Bible stories for children, and give out a cross and bracelet to wear as well as information about our ministry.

The Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry constantly thanks God for His continued gifts and blessings upon His people, for His mercy never ceases! We pray His blessing to be upon each of you, and we encourage you to reach out to us if you would like to begin a deaf ministry in your church.

Redeemer Crisis Center and Iglesia Cristiana Hispana (ICH), Cleveland, OH Mrs. Diane Zellmer, Director

God's gift of perseverance, protection, and provision are clearly visible here in Cleveland! Here are just some of the ways He ushered in new expressions of hope, through serving, witnessing and celebrating!

2,558 unduplicated families **(6,746** family members) connected to Redeemer/ICH through programing and outreach.

999,989 lbs. of food was provided to families through **16,434** food service requests at a cost of \$131,708.

That's ... **678,810** meals provided at a cost of **\$0.14** each over the last three years (2022-2024) with a retail value of **\$4,591,485**.

63 volunteers worked 16,285+ hours in 2024!

Service hours are valued at \$488,550 and invested by committed volunteers from the neighborhood and surrounding congregations. Glory be to God for He does marvelous things.

<u>When I was hungry...can you help?</u> The center continues to provide a five-day supply of groceries monthly. We are amazed by 49 seniors (80+ years) who have stood in line to receive food and browse through the donated clothing. Families average about 6.5 visits per year. To make this task a little easier and remain good stewards, the Center participates in a bulk buying program and utilizes USDA food commodities. Retail food donations have increased, and area congregations continue to sponsor food drives, fresh vegetables, and bread.

When I was lonely...can you help? The Center continues to be a place of forgiveness, strength and healing. Broken families, mentally ill, lonely and drug addicted are encouraged to join us for morning prayer. Concerns brought to the group include relationships, neighborhood issues, the Center's ministry, new babies and pregnancies, healthy families, celebrations, and thankfulness.

Our Summer Youth Family Days themed "Fun Under the SON" are celebrated on Thursdays during July. These outdoor events are guided and held in our yard and playground providing neighbors with the opportunity to meet and engage with one another in a safe place. Lunch is provided by the area congregations, and a sack bag goes home with everyone. Teens use this time to build their resumé, gain work experience and gather references providing them with the edge needed to find employment and/or college money.

When I was naked...can you help? Through the ministry of "Babies' Care Cupboard," the Center was the instrument used by God to spread the news that we are robed in Christ's righteousness through baptism. With an attendance of 12-24, people received an explanation of God's mercy and forgiveness provided us. This year safe homes and healthy families will be our topic. Parents attending education sessions, monthly gatherings, and who become involved behind the scenes will have the opportunity to work toward receiving one of the following: car seat, play yard, activity center, stroller, or highchair. These items will be provided through our English District mission grant.

The donations received from churches and individuals continue to be given away free of charge. We are finally digging out from our COVID "stay at home clean outs" which provided a reserve of clothing that had never been seen before. A furniture and appliance needs list is maintained so that donations and requests can be matched. Blankets are greatly appreciated by our families and those who continue to find themselves living under bridges, in tents, and on the streets.

Support from the Hunger Network of Greater Cleveland, English District LCMS, Lutheran Urban Community Ministry, Thrivent, Cuyahoga County, Cleveland Foodbank, area churches, organizations, businesses, clubs, and individuals comes in many forms – cash, food, clothing, labor, furniture, toys, and household items.

Persian Ministry – St. Luke, North York, ON

LCMS U at the University of Arizona

During this triennium the campus ministry has been served by Rev. M. Todd Zill. Despite best efforts, a full-time campus ministry is simply not reasonable in Tucson for both current locally specific challenges, as well as circumstances and issues that are common to all who engage in campus ministry today.

The Campus Christian Center at the University of Arizona has not been available for campus ministry purposes due to the withdrawal of the English District in 2020. Despite the changes and challenges, a small but stable group of dedicated students continues to be well served and demonstrates a great zeal for faithful Lutheran catechesis in conjunction with the continued support of the circuit and district through the ALCMS (Arizona Lutheran Campus Mission Society). This faithful group of young people greatly personifies the campus ministry's slogan, "No Gimmicks. Just JESUS." They meet on a weekly basis primarily at Faith Lutheran Church, the mother LCMS congregation in Tucson, and on campus where possible and as needed.

We ask for the continued prayers of all as we work to chart a path forward and develop both a short-term and hopefully a long-term plan for the development and growth of this cherished and foundational campus ministry. Thank you for your prayers, encouragement, and continued financial support.

- In April 2023, Gail Greiser resigned for personal reasons. Christopher Cassel was appointed as her replacement.
- In August 2023, the Synod Convention elected Rev. Dr. David Petersen to serve on the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations, and he chose to resign his position on our Board of Directors to take up that position. Rev. Todd Arnold was appointed as a replacement.

This was only the beginning of changes to our Board:

- In October 2023, Lucas Fitzgerald was suddenly called home by God and Teacher Keith Vieregge was appointed as a replacement.
- In June 2024, our Bishop/President Rev. Dr. Hardy accepted the call to serve as CUS president leading to Rev. Jeffrey Miskus becoming Bishop/President. This also created an empty regional vice president seat. Rev. Zachary Marklevitz was appointed to fill this seat.
- In August 2024, Rev. Dr. Douglas Spittel was called to serve as CUS Vice President and Rev. Rob Kieselowsky was appointed to replace him as Eastern Region Vice President. Rev. Justin Laughridge was appointed to replace Rev. Kieselowsky as a voting member of the Board.
- In October 2024, Lutheran Church Extension Fund Vice President Rev. Daniel Lepley was replaced by John Hoover.

All these additions have been a blessing and they have quickly become a valuable part of the Board. It's been a busy three years just maintaining a full board!

Change in board membership wasn't the only thing we had time for. Your Board found time to meet eleven times in person and seven more times electronically during the triennium. We continued to be in the district by meeting at district congregations:

- Lutheran Church of the Risen Savior Green Valley, AZ

All were gracious hosts to the Board. I would like to point out that the Board was in Canada for an international meeting. This supported Bishop Hardy's triennial theme, *God in All Things Without Borders*! This meeting also coincided with the installation of Bishop/President Miskus. What a blessing for the board to be part of this celebration!

Some of the highlights of board work were the startup of four new congregations, two in Texas, one in Idaho, and another in Arizona. Several constitutions have been either approved or revised. The sale of a number of properties acquired by the district and the establishment of a model for the distribution of those funds was created. The Board oversaw the management of the district's Endowment Fund which God has blessed abundantly. A portion of the Fund's earnings are distributed as grants to support many different ministries around the district. Funds also support church worker scholarships and church worker debt reduction. The English District is a leader in the Synod in both efforts.

We have worked with LCEF and our Canada Corporation to transfer control that will allow LCEF to fund church worker loans in Canada much like they do in the United States, a blessing to our Canadian church workers who have not been able to participate in the benefits of LCEF loans. This is still a work in progress as we dot all the I's and cross all the T's to cover all the legal requirements.

We have authorized improvements to our district office property. We continue to pursue legal action regarding the Campus Christian Center on the campus of University of Arizona. We have navigated the waters of leadership change, and I'm very proud to say the transition has been seamless.

As my time on the board comes to a close due to term limits, I would like to say it has been my honor and pleasure to serve with such a great group of God-minded servants. The English District is in God's hands, and we have good people doing His work! God in all things without borders!

REVISIONS TO DISTRICT CORPORATE OPERATIONS MANUAL DURING THE 2022—2025 TRIENNIUM

District Bylaw 9.8 authorizes the Board of Directors to establish and maintain a Corporate Operations Manual that includes various regulations for how the District functions. This is a document of quaternary authority below the Synod Constitution, Synod Bylaws, and English District Bylaws:

- 9.8.1 The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain the District's *Corporate Operations Manual* and shall approve appropriate modifications.
- 9.8.2 Only the District in Convention shall have the power to amend the *Corporate Operations Manual* with respect to sections dealing with the election of officers and the Board.
- 9.8.3 Modifications to the *Corporate Operations Manual* approved by the Board to any other sections shall be reported at the next Convention.

The Board of Directors made several revisions to the *Corporate Operations Manual* during the 2022—2025 Triennium, which are outlined below:

1. Establishing New Standards for District President Retirement Compensation

Article II.B concerning District President retirement compensation was amended as follows:

- B. Retirement Compensation
 - 1. End of term. If the President eannot, chooses not to run for another term in office or is defeated for reelection, he shall receive three (3) months' salary and health and retirement benefits from the date of his successor's installation. End of Term. If the President cannot or chooses not to run for another term in office or is defeated for reelection, he shall receive three (3) months' salary and health and retirement benefits from the date of his successor's installation.
 - 2. Voluntary. If the President leaves office during a term, he shall receive three (3) months' salary and health and retirement benefits, payable bi-weekly or however it is typically paid, from the date of his resignation. Voluntary. If the President leaves office during a term, he shall receive one (1) month's salary and health and retirement benefits from the date that his successor assumes the duties of the-office. During the transition period, the outgoing President shall be available as a consultant.
 - 3. Involuntary. If the President is removed from office, he shall receive thirty days' salary and health and retirement benefits, payable bi-weekly or however it is typically paid, from the date of his removal
 - 4. If appropriate, retirement compensation for the outgoing President shall begin three months after the election of a new President.

2. Removal of Provisions Related to the Canada Corporation

Several provisions related to the Canada Corporation were removed, as that corporation will no longer exist as a subagency of the English District:

- (a) Responsibility of the District Treasurer to serve as Treasurer of the Canada Corporation was eliminated from the District Treasurer's Job Description.
- (b) The section on the Canada Corporation, including its bylaws, was removed in its entirety.

3. Revisions to the Endowment Fund Governing Document

(a) The section on the composition of the Endowment Fund Board of Managers was revised as follows:

5.3 Composition

- 5.3.1 The Board of Managers shall consist of:
 - a. The Treasurer of the District, who shall serve as treasurer of the Fund
 - b. One member of the District Board of Directors elected by the Board
 - c. One regional manager (preferably laity) elected from each region of the District; Four individuals, preferably laypersons, elected from the District at-large by the District Convention
 - d. One Canadian representative elected by the Canada Corporation
 - e. d. The District President
- 5.3.2 All elected members of the Board of Managers shall be members of English District congregations.
- (b) The section on the election of the Endowment Fund Board of Managers was revised as follows:
 - 5.5 Nomination and Election of Regional Managers

- 5.5.1 Nominations for the regional elected managers positions shall be gathered by the District Committee on Nominations before each District Convention to fill each position.
- 5.5.2 Election of each regional manager shall be held at the District Convention by a vote of the Convention. Election of managers shall be conducted at the District Convention [cf. District Bylaw 5.5ff].
- (c) The section on filling vacancies on the Endowment Fund Board of Managers was revised as follows:

5.6 Vacancies

- 5.6.1 A vacancy in any <u>regional elected</u> manager position shall be filled by appointment of the District President, subject to approval by the Board of Directors. The appointed <u>manager</u> individual shall serve the remainder of the term.
- 5.6.2 A vacancy in the Canadian representative position shall be filled by appointment of the Canada Corporation. The appointed manager shall serve the remainder of the term.
- 5.6.32 A vacancy in the Board of Directors position shall be filled by appointment of the Board of Directors. The appointed manager individual shall serve the remainder of the term.

[Note: This change will become effective if the District Convention approves the proposed amendment to District Bylaw 6.2.5.]

4. Amendment to the Investment Policy of the English District Endowment Fund

The Investment Policy concerning the permissible Types of Investments was revised as follows:

Types of Investments

Mutual Funds, Equity, Fixed Income, Alternative/Non-traditional Investments utilizing Mutual Funds, Exchange Traded Funds (EFT's), Venture Capital, and Direct Investments will be used to maximize diversification, liquidity, and investment management expertise. Prohibited investments shall include substantial involvement in tobacco, alcohol, gaming, abortion, etc.

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ELECTED OFFICERS - RIGHTS & DUTIES

I. The rights and duties of the elected officers of the District

President

Vice Presidents

are noted in the Handbook of The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod (LCMS) and the Bylaws of the English District.

II. The Office of President

A. The term Bishop may be used in addition to or as an alternate term to President, especially in interchurch relations.

B. Retirement Compensation

- 1. End of Term. If the President cannot or chooses not to run for another term in office or is defeated for reelection, he shall receive three (3) months' salary and health and retirement benefits from the date of his successor's installation.
- 2. Voluntary. If the President leaves office during a term, he shall receive one (1) month's salary and health and retirement benefits from the date that his successor assumes the duties of the office. During the transition period, the outgoing President shall be available as a consultant.
- Involuntary. If the President is removed from office, he shall receive thirty days' salary and health and retirement benefits, payable bi-weekly or however it is typically paid, from the date of his removal.
- If appropriate, retirement compensation for the outgoing President shall begin three months after the election of a new President.

C. President-Elect

When a new President of the District is elected, he shall be installed as President-Elect at the Electing Convention, assume office not earlier than two or later than three months after the election, and be installed as President of the District on the Sunday following his assumption of office. He may begin to receive salary and benefits one month prior to his assumption of office.

D. Position Description

In accord with the *Handbook* of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (Constitution Article XII and Bylaws Article 4.4), the President's responsibilities will include, but not be limited to the following:

- $1. \quad \text{Supervision of doctrine and life of district professional workers;} \\$
- 2. Supervision of administration of district professional workers;
- 3. Visitation of ministries and professional workers;
- 4. Administrative actions relating to his role as chief executive of the district.
- E. The President shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

APPOINTED STAFF – JOB DESCRIPTIONS

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT: MISSIONS

1. POSITION

The responsibility of the Executive Assistant to the President: Missions, is to promote mission vision in the District and administer the mission program of the District, under the direction of the President.

2. CALL

The Executive Assistant to the President: Missions, an ordained pastor of the LCMS, shall be called by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation of the President. The original call shall be for a specific period not exceeding three months following the date of the next District Convention. The call may be extended for up to an additional three-year periods by the approval of the Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the President. The call may be withdrawn upon three months' prior written notice by the approval of the Board of Directors. The call shall be withdrawn prior to expiration of the three-month period if the Executive Assistant to the President: Missions accepts another call prior to such date.

3. COMPENSATION

The salary shall be recommended by the President and approved by the Board of Directors annually. The Executive Assistant to the President: Missions shall also be entitled to receive such benefits as are then offered to all similarly situated employees. Compensation shall be paid until the date of resignation, disability or withdrawal of the call or until such earlier date as this person accepts another call.

4. LOCATION

The English District office in Farmington, Michigan, or other District office location as may be established or at a deployed location at the discretion of the President.

- A. Guided by and supportive of the mission and vision of the President, he will, in an executive capacity, work cooperatively with the President and other members of the District staff.
- B. Create and administer the Mission budget.
- C. Oversee the mission grants to new church plants, specialized ministries, campus and university work, urban, ethnic, and cross cultural ministries.
- D. Explore, study and initiate new mission opportunities, fields and methods of mission development that will best utilize resources of people and possessions.
- E. Conduct workshops and seminars in leadership, evangelization, assimilation, revitalization and process planning.
- F. Work with congregations that desire to identify their God-given mission and develop new strategies for effective ministries.
- G. Coordinate with The Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) Vice-President to facilitate mission opportunities.
- H. Shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT: PARISH SERVICES

1. POSITION

The responsibility of the Executive Assistant to the President: Parish Services is to provide leadership in education and parish services to the District, under the direction of the President.

2. CALI

The Executive Assistant to the President: Parish Services, an ordained or commissioned minister of the LCMS shall be called by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation of the President. The original call shall be for a specific period not exceeding three months following the date of the next District Convention. The call may be extended for up to an additional three-year period by the approval of the Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the President. The call may be withdrawn upon three months' prior written notice by the approval of the Board of Directors. The call shall be withdrawn prior to expiration of the three-month period if the Executive Assistant to the President: Parish Services accepts another call prior to such date.

3. COMPENSATION

The salary shall be recommended by the President and approved by the Board of Directors annually. The Executive Assistant to the President: Parish Services shall also be entitled to receive such benefits as are then offered to all similarly situated employees. Compensation shall be paid until the date of resignation, disability or withdrawal of the call or until such earlier date as this person accepts another call.

4. LOCATION

The English District office in Farmington, Michigan, or other District office location as may be established or at a deployed location at the discretion of the President.

- A. Guided by and supportive of the mission and vision of the President, s/he will, in an executive capacity, be available to the President and work cooperatively with the President and other members of the District staff.
- B. Serve as a consultant and resource person for congregations and schools in behalf of Lutheran School ministry and other parish educational programs and services
- C. Assist the President in supervising the doctrine, the life and the official administration of the commissioned ministers of the District and the calling of commissioned ministers; providing counsel and responding to requests and inquiries regarding staffing and team ministry.
- D. Assist district church workers with call, vocational and other professional matters and affirm workers, congregations and schools through regular contact, presence at installations, retirements, the awarding of years of service awards and upon the granting of school accreditation as possible.
- E. Give consultation, care, vision and leadership to congregations beginning or maintaining early childhood centers, elementary schools, and high schools, through visitation, through contact and regular communication with school administrators, boards, and other leaders.
- F. Serve as the district point person for schools, congregations and workers for National Lutheran School Accreditation, the Lutheran School Portal and as an advocate and link to the School Ministry, Children's Ministry, Family Life Ministry and Youth Ministry departments of LCMS District and Congregational Services.
- G. Provide leadership regarding the selection and implementation of key programs, conferences, gatherings and other events, a Resource Library for the strengthening of Lutheran schools and other parish educational ministries and administration of the financial aid program for future church workers.
- H. Shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT: BUSINESS AND FINANCE AND TREASURER

1. POSITION

The responsibility of the Executive Assistant to the President: Business and Finance and Treasurer, is to carry out the execution of the District's accounting and financial programs in accordance with sound business practice and manage the day-to-day function of the District office, under the direction of the President.

2. CONTRACT

The Executive Assistant to the President: Business and Finance and Treasurer, a layperson of the LCMS, shall be contracted by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation by the President. The original contract shall be for a specific period not exceeding three months following the date of the next District Convention. The contract may be extended for up to an additional three-year period by the Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the President. The contract may be withdrawn upon three months' prior written notice by the approval of the Board of Directors. The contract shall be withdrawn prior to expiration of the three-month period if the Executive Assistant to the President: Business and Finance and Treasurer accepts another contract prior to such date.

3. COMPENSATION

The salary shall be recommended by the President and approved by the Board of Directors annually. The Executive Assistant to the President: Business and Finance and Treasurer shall also be entitled to receive such benefits as are then offered to all similarly situated employees. Compensation shall be paid until the date of resignation, disability or withdrawal of the contract or until such earlier date as this person accepts another contract.

4. LOCATION

The English District office in Farmington, Michigan, or other District office location as may be established or at a deployed location at the discretion of the President.

- A. Guided by and supportive of the mission and vision of the President, s/he will, in an executive capacity, be available to the President and work cooperatively with the President and other members of the District staff.
- B. Organize and administer all financial systems of the District, including accounting, reporting, analyzing, planning, and budgeting. Be responsible for banking and investing funds, receiving and disbursing the monies of the District, and borrowing and loaning money in its name. Serve as Treasurer, trust officer and business advisor to the Board of Directors. Regularly report on fiscal and business matters to the Board of Directors and the District Convention. Report to the congregations through the District newsletter.
- C. Manage and protect the assets of the District. Maintain and insure its properties. Buy and sell property in its name. Engage legal counsel when necessary and act as the District's agent in matters of law and real estate. (Note provisions under "Contracting Policies")
- D. Maintain and supervise the clerical and accounting personnel in the District office and oversee employee payroll and benefits.
- E. Perform such related duties as the Board of Directors may assign to him/her and administer his/her office in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the English District, as directed by its Board of Directors.
- F. Shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT: VICE-PRESIDENT – LCEF, ENGLISH DISTRICT

1. POSITION

The responsibility of the Executive Assistant to the President: LCEF (Lutheran Church Extension Fund), English District is fund promotion, investor development, and the processing and servicing of mortgage loans within the English District.

2. CONTRACT

The Executive Assistant to the President: Vice President – LCEF, English District shall be contracted by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation by the President. The original contract shall be for a specific period not exceeding three months following the date of the next District Convention. The contract may be extended for up to an additional three-year period by the Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the President. The contract may be withdrawn upon three months' prior written notice by the approval of the Board of Directors. The contract shall be withdrawn prior to expiration of the three-month period if the Executive Assistant to the President: Vice President – LCEF, English District accepts another contract prior to such date. (Note the LCEF, LCMS Position Document.)

3. COMPENSATION

The salary shall be recommended by the President and approved by the Board of Directors annually. The Executive Assistant to the President: Vice President – LCEF, English District shall also be entitled to receive such benefits as are then offered to all similarly situated employees. Compensation shall be paid until the date of resignation, disability or withdrawal of the contract or until such earlier date as this person accepts another contract.

4. LOCATION

The English District office in Farmington, Michigan, or other District office location as may be established or at a deployed location at the discretion of the President.

- A. Guided by and supportive of the mission and vision of the President, s/he will, in an executive capacity, be available to the President and work cooperatively with the President and other members of the District staff.
- B. Report to the District President and the President of LCEF.
- C. Work with the District President, District staff, District Board of Directors and the Committee for Stewardship, and with District congregations.
- D. Perform such related duties as the Board of Directors may assign to him/her and administer his/her office in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the English District, as directed by its Board of Directors.
- E. Shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT: GIFT PLANNING COUNSELOR – DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

1. POSITION

The responsibility of the Executive Assistant to the President: Gift Planning Counselor – Development Director, is to promote a Lifetime Plan for Giving and the Gift Planning Strategy of the District to people and ministries in the District, under the direction of the President.

2 CONTRACT

The Executive Assistant to the President: Gift Planning Counselor – Development Director, a layperson of the LCMS, shall be contracted by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation by the President. The original contract shall be for a specific period not exceeding three months following the date of the next District Convention. The contract may be extended for up to an additional three-year period by the Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the President. The contract may be withdrawn upon three months' prior written notice by the approval of the Board of Directors. The contract shall be withdrawn prior to expiration of the three-month period if the Executive Assistant to the President: Gift Planning Counselor – Development Director accepts another contract prior to such date.

3. COMPENSATION

The salary shall be recommended by the President and approved by the Board of Directors annually. The Executive Assistant to the President: Gift Planning Counselor – Development Director shall also be entitled to receive such benefits as are then offered to all similarly situated employees. Compensation shall be paid until the date of resignation, disability or withdrawal of the contract or until such earlier date as this person accepts another contract.

4. LOCATION

The English District office in Farmington, Michigan, or other District office location as may be established, or at a deployed location at the discretion of the President.

- A. Guided by and supportive of the mission and vision of the President, he/she will, in an executive capacity, work cooperatively with the President and other members of the District staff.
- B. Coordinate with the District Executive staff to identify congregations that are living out their mission and ministry.
- C. Work with congregations that have identified their God-given mission and develop new strategies for funding those opportunities.
- D. Serve as a consultant and resource person for congregations and schools seeking to strengthen their mission and ministry by establishing, promoting, growing and managing an endowment fund.
- E. Conduct workshops and seminars: Transfer the Blessings, Ministry Endowment Funding, Charitable Giving, Investing, and others.
- F. Personally visit congregational members and school constituents regarding charitable planning and invite them to complete their Personal Gift Plan for their families and ministries. Implement individual gift plans based on scriptural stewardship principles.
- G. Maintain and continually improve knowledge and expertise in gift planning and all relevant principles and concepts in charitable giving.
- H. Mentor Congregational Gift Planners.
- I. Coordinate online giving opportunities.
- Represent and promote the District at conferences, conventions, workshops, meetings and other functions.
- K. Create and administer the Gift Planning Development budget.
- L. Shall abide by the rules and intentions of the Executive Handbook.

6. RELATIONSHIPS

- A. Maintains close working relationship with the Senior Vice President of Gift Planning Services of the LCMS Foundation and the Director of Gift Planning Development, Mentoring and Training of the LCMS Foundation.
- B. Relates to, assists, and coordinates with other Gift Planning Counselors, volunteers, and other
- individuals and entities as authorized by the President.

 C. Works closely with development staff from other LCMS organizations and all fraternal organizations.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors sets the policy and direction for the work of the English District. Policy is implemented by the President working through his executive staff. The President is responsible to the Board for all policies set by the Board and through his executive staff will supervise, oversee, and encourage appropriate and Godpleasing mission and ministry.

The Board of Directors Manual (including the Board of Directors Policies) describes the officers, duties of the Board and its relationship to the President. It is reviewed and modified or affirmed once each triennium.

COMMITTEE FOR STEWARDSHIP

A Committee for Stewardship will be appointed by the President through the Board to comply with the stewardship programs and goals of the LCMS. (*Handbook*, Article 4.6.) Duties include, but are not limited to: stewardship information and education; communication on Synod and District stewardship emphases; and coordination with the President.

DISTRICT ARCHIVIST

The District Archivist will compile and keep in order the District's history in all phases of District work and history of each District congregation; preserve copies of the District convention proceedings, the Synodical convention proceedings, the District publication, and other documents of historical value to the District; and provide a haven in the archives of the District for records of special committees, obsolete reports, etc.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS (*Note English District Bylaws 5.4 and 5.5*)

Function: Prepare slates of candidates for the offices of Secretary, Board of Directors, Committee on

Nominations, Endowment Fund Managers, and Other Boards or Committees, as required

by the bylaws of the Synod and District.

Membership: The committee shall consist of one pastor and one layperson or commissioned minister from

each region of the District, elected at the District Convention. They shall organize

themselves nine months prior to the Convention at the "call" of the President.

Duties: A. Receive nominations for Secretary, Board of Directors, Committee on Nominations, Endowment Fund Managers, and Other Boards or Committees from the congregations,

officers, and members of the District, and the laypersons of the congregations of the District.

B. Prepare a slate of at least two candidates and one alternate for each above-listed position

to be filled by election at the District convention.

C. Request from all candidates for elected positions (1) biographical information and (2) a statement concerning his/her candidacy. Publish and distribute the same to all the convention delegates at least six weeks prior to the convention. The committee may pose

questions to the candidates and limit the length of the response.

CONTRACTING POLICIES

Contracts reserved for the Board of Directors or its appointees: Call documents; Real estate purchases and sales; Mortgages; Notes and Loans.

Ministry arrangement contracts must be signed by the District President.

All other District contracts may be signed only by the President or the Executive Assistant to the President: Business and Finance and Treasurer. These include, but are not limited to: Utility and Phone contracts; Employee benefit contracts; Maintenance agreements (one-time contracts, annual agreements, and contracts over one year, etc.); Hotel, meeting, catering, and banquet facility contracts.

ENGLISH DISTRICT ENDOWMENT FUND GOVERNING DOCUMENT

1.0 Name

The Fund shall be called the English District Endowment Fund, English District, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. It shall be a separate fund, but it shall be one of the funds of the District.

2.0 Purpose

The purpose of the English District Endowment Fund is to provide God's people with a unique opportunity to participate in a perpetual fund. This fund shall assist congregations in developing new ministries, support current missions and ministries; revitalization efforts, church workers and seminary students, and provide financial assistance for other approved mission endeavors.

3.0 Distribution of the Funds

- 3.1 The Fund shall be construed as a perpetually endowed fund, subject to the provisions of Paragraph 4.0. As such, all gifts and bequests shall form the corpus of the Fund, which shall be invested in a prudent manner.
- 3.2 It is not intended that the corpus of the Fund received from gifts and bequests be used in funding grants.
- 3.3 Only the earnings generated by the donor-gifted corpus will be utilized in funding grants according to the donor stipulations.
 - $3.3.1\quad 75\%$ of earnings may be distributed each year with 25% being retained within the Fund.
- 3.4 Earnings from the Fund may be used annually through the specific funding model: Human Care/Disaster Relief 5%, New Missions 35%, Scholarships 30%, Church Worker Debt Reduction 10%, Campus Ministry 15%, Other Ministry 5%.
 - 3.4.1 It is not intended that earnings be used to fund normal operating expenses of the English District, except where those expenses are considered grants for ministry or missions.
- 3.5 In addition, up to 5% of board-designated funds may be distributed in a given year for the work and mission of the English District.
- 3.6 Undistributed earnings
 - 3.6.1 Any earnings generated by the corpus that remain undistributed at the end of the fiscal year may be retained for future distribution for up to three years.
 - 3.6.2 Any undistributed earnings that remain after three fiscal years will be added to the corpus of the Fund.

4.0 Duration of the Fund

The English District Endowment Fund shall continue in existence as long as the English District shall continue to exist. If the English District should cease to exist, then the remaining properties, funds, principal and accrued income constituting the English District Endowment Fund shall become the property of (a) successor(s). The English District at the time of dissolution has the right and duty to determine the existence of (a) successor(s) and shall execute the necessary documents to effect the transfer. If the English District fails to act in this matter, the Fund becomes the absolute property of the The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod Foundation, to be held and used at the discretion of the Board of Trustees of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod Foundation. Such transactions will be in accord with the Bylaws of the English District.

4.1 Donor designations of gifted funds will supersede any transfer upon dissolution of the English District.

5.0 Board of Managers

5.1 Administration

- 5.1.1 The administration of the Fund shall be delegated by the District Board of Directors to a Board of Managers, which will include the District President as a voting member of said board.
- 5.1.2 The District Board of Directors shall possess reserve powers over the Fund, and shall review the activities and actions of the Board of Managers to ratify and, if deemed necessary, to rescind or alter actions of the Board of Managers.
- 5.1.3 The Board of Managers shall report its Minutes and its activity and actions at least quarterly to the Board of Directors and shall report to each convention of the District.
- 5.1.4 The Board of Directors shall develop a budget for administration and promotion of the Fund.

5.2 Duties

- 5.2.1 The Board of Managers shall serve as the promotion agency, including publicity and fund raising, for the Endowment Fund.
- 5.2.2 The Board of Managers shall review and recommend to the Board of Directors any changes in the Endowment Fund investment policy and management agreement.
- 5.2.3 The Board of Managers may make recommendations to the Board of Directors quarterly regarding the number, size and recipients of grants made from the Endowment Fund.

5.3 Composition

- 5.3.1 The Board of Managers shall consist of:
 - a. The Treasurer of the District, who shall serve as treasurer of the Fund
 - b. One member of the District Board of Directors elected by the Board
 - Four individuals, preferably laypersons, elected from the District at-large by the District Convention
 - d. The District President
- 5.3.2 All elected members of the Board of Managers shall be members of English District congregations.

5.4 Term and Tenure of Elected Managers

- 5.4.1 Managers shall be elected to a three-year term that begins on the 1st day of September following a District Convention.
- 5.4.2 Maximum tenure shall be four consecutive terms.

5.5 Nomination and Election of Managers

- 5.5.1 Nominations for elected managers shall be gathered by the District Committee on Nominations before each District.
- 5.5.2 Election of managers shall be conducted at the District Convention. [cf. District Dylaw 5.5ff].

5.6 Vacancies

- 5.6.1 A vacancy in any elected manager position shall be filled by appointment of the District President, subject to approval by the Board of Directors. The appointed individual shall serve the remainder of the term.
- 5.6.2 A vacancy in the Board of Directors position shall be filled by appointment of the Board of Directors. The appointed individual shall serve the remainder of the term.

5.7 Removal from Office

Any or all managers may be removed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors or Convention of the District.

5.8 Meetings

The Board of Managers shall meet at least quarterly at a time and in a manner deemed appropriate by the Executive Committee of the Board. [See Paragraph 6.4.]

5.9 Quorum

A majority of the Managers shall constitute a quorum for any meeting of the Board.

5.10 Manner of Acting

The action of a majority of the Managers present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall constitute an action of the Board, unless a greater number is required by the Bylaws or the District Board of Directors. The Chair may make or second motions and may cast a vote on any and all matters before the Board of Managers.

5.11 Compensation and Remuneration

Managers shall not receive any compensation for their services, except for remuneration incurred in accordance with established District policy.

5.12 Expenditure of Funds

- 5.12.1 The Board of Managers may make recommendations to the Board of Directors in accordance with its operating policies regarding the expenditure of all funds, including payment of expenses, allocation of grants, and all other expenditures.
- 5.12.2 All funds shall be handled by the Treasurer of the District, who shall provide the Board of Managers with accounting reports necessary to carry out its work.

6.0 Officers of the Board of Managers

6.1 Number

The Board shall have a Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary and Treasurer (who must be treasurer of the District). Other officers may be elected by the Board in accordance with the needs and purposes of the Board.

6.2 Election and Term of Office

With the exception of Treasurer and District President/Bishop, officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Managers, and all officers shall serve until a successor is elected.

6.3 Duties of Officers

The duties shall be the usual and customary duties of the office held or as prescribed by action of the Board. In addition, officers shall be active in promoting the Fund and revenue raising activities for the Fund.

6.4 Executive Committee

The Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and District President shall constitute the Executive Committee.

6.4.1 The executive committee shall meet quarterly to assess the Fund's performance and to make recommendations to the Board of Managers regarding any potential changes in the investments of the Fund. The Executive Committee shall not, on its own, have the power to make changes in the investments without the approval of the full Board of Managers, subject to Paragraph 7.0.

7.0 Investment

The Board of Managers shall research and give guidance in the investment of Fund moneys. Final responsibility for such investment lies with the Board of Directors of the District. (Note District Doard of Directors Policy I.D.2.)

8.0 Reception of Funds, Gifts and Property

- All gifts, contributions of funds or bequests to the English District Endowment Fund will be received by the District Board of Directors through the District Treasurer.
- 8.2 The District Board of Directors may reject any contribution, gift or bequest directed by the donor to the English District Endowment Fund.
 - 8.2.1 The Board of Directors may direct any rejected gifts into another program or ministry of the District with the approval of the donor.
 - 8.2.2 Gifts accepted, but not used for the intended purpose within three (3) years, will be reviewed, reevaluated, and may be redirected, subject to Paragraph 8.2.1.

- 8.3 Real estate donations shall be researched completely and thoroughly before acceptance. These, and other property gifts, may be kept, sold or disposed of by action of the Board of Directors and be used to grow the balance of the Fund.
- 8.4 All deeds, leases, title papers, contracts, insurance policies, securities and evidence of ownership of property of the District and other valuable papers related to the English District Endowment Fund shall be kept under such safe keeping or custodial arrangement as the Board of Directors of the District shall, from time to time, select and designate.

9.0 Endowment Fund Reports

- 9.1 The Board of Managers shall report quarterly to the District Board of Directors. This report shall be made available to any member of the District upon request.
- 9.2 The District Board of Directors shall submit a report to any regularly called convention of the District.
- 9.3 The quarterly report and the convention report shall include the gifts received; the size of the Fund; and the number, size and recipients of grants distributed from the Endowment Fund during that given time period.

10.0 Changes and Amendments

- 10.1 Any article of this document, with the exception of Paragraph 4.0, may be changed or amended by a simple majority vote by the Board of Directors of the English District or by a convention of the English District.
- 10.2 Paragraph 4.0 may be changed or amended only by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors of the District or a majority vote of a convention of the District.

Investment Policy for English District Endowment Fund

Investment Purpose:

The overall objective is to be good stewards of the financial resources the Lord has provided through the Endowment Fund, and to manage Endowment assets in order to optimize the fund's total return in the context of its risk profile as defined below.

Investment Policy:

Applicable Laws

The English District Endowment Fund (EDEF) will follow the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA).

Risk Profile

General investment policy is intended to be that of a prudent fiduciary investor whose investment purpose includes both income and capital appreciation. The general level of acceptable risk is a Moderate Growth Model, however, investment manager(s) at their discretion will be allowed to move investments to defensive investments, even cash, when market condition dictate protection of the investments.

Target Return

Target Return should be rate of return (net of investment expenses) of 5% plus inflation rate as defined in the consumer price index.

Time Horizon

The investment time horizon of the fund is in perpetuity.

Use of Outside Advisor

The EDEF Board of Managers shall be authorized to hire outside investment advisors as needed.

Types of Investments

Mutual Funds, Equity, Fixed Income, Alternative/Non-traditional Investments utilizing Mutual Funds, Exchange Traded Funds (EFT's), and Direct Investments will be used to maximize diversification, liquidity, and investment management expertise. Prohibited investments shall include substantial involvement in tobacco, alcohol, gaming, abortion, etc.

Grant Spending Policy

Payouts will be in accordance to the terms of the EDEF.

Earnings

Earnings of the EDEF are to be defined as dividends and interest and other income (rent, option income, etc.), prior year's undistributed income, and appreciation. Account valuation date for determining appreciation of assets will be January 1. This may be reviewed and modified by the Board managers periodically.

Monitoring Performance

The EDEF Board managers will receive written reports from the investment manager at least quarterly. The Board shall meet in accordance with the EDEF, and at least quarterly to review performance of the fund.

ENABLING STATEMENT

Revisions within the English District Corporate Operations Manual approved by the Board of Directors during the 2006-2009 triennium will take effect at the beginning of the 2009-2012 triennium, with the following exceptions:

- (1) The Office of President, paragraph "B"
- (2) Executive Assistants to the President, paragraphs 2 and 2 --- for those positions existing (staffed or not) at the beginning of the 2006-2009 triennium.

These exceptions will cease at the beginning of the 2012-2015 triennium.

REVIEW OF DOCUMENT

This document will be reviewed and affirmed at least once each triennium by the District Board of Directors. Any substantive changes shall be reported at the next Convention.

1-1-1 MISSION INITIATIVE

The Rev. J. Derek Mathers

Introduction - Our 1-1-1 Mission Initiative was established on the principle that "there is power in many giving little as we are moved by God's Spirit." This model was officially launched during the 2018 English District Convention and has continued as a voluntary initiative for all congregations. The program is designed to support and develop new missions while enhancing existing ones, encouraging broad participation through small, consistent contributions.

The 1-1-1 Model - The 1-1-1 funding approach is simple yet effective: each baptized member of a congregation is encouraged to contribute \$1 per week towards mission work. This collective effort demonstrates the power of the Body of Christ working together in faith and generosity. Unlike other funding models, every dollar contributed to 1-1-1 is fully allocated to mission work, with no administrative deductions.

Participation and Impact - The 1-1-1 program operates on an annual cycle from September 1 to August 31. Over the years, participation has fluctuated, but it has consistently enabled meaningful mission work:

- **2018-2019:** Supported Concordia Lutheran Mission (Myerstown, PA) and the Dominican Republic Lutheran Mission.
- **2019-2020:** Assisted Holy Cross Lutheran Chapel (Hazelwood, PA) and Tree of Life Lutheran Church (Inverness, FL).
- 2020-2021: Focused on campus ministries during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **2021-2022:** Supported Blessed Sacrament Lutheran Church (Hayden, ID) and St. John's Lutheran Church (Clarksburg, WV).
- 2022-2023: Funds designated for Logos (Philadelphia, PA) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Likraine
- **2023-2024:** Contributions went to Eastern Washington University LCMS-U Chapter and the Nuer (South Sudanese) Language Fellowship at St. Mark, Mississauga, ON.
- **2024-2025:** Current recipients are Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry and Montreal FORO, supporting diverse mission efforts in both Pittsburgh, PA, and Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

The Need for Continued Support - Despite its success, there are still misconceptions that mission expansion is limited due to a lack of funds. The 1-1-1 Initiative proves otherwise by enabling congregations to contribute beyond their regular district giving. The English District Mission Action Team (formerly the Missions Council) plays a crucial role in supporting, equipping, and encouraging mission work through this initiative.

Conclusion - The 1-1-1 Mission Initiative has demonstrated that small, collective contributions can have a profound impact on mission work. As we move forward, our shared goal is to strengthen and expand this initiative, bringing greater support to missions locally and globally. Through faith and unified effort, the English District can achieve a lasting legacy of mission support and outreach.

ARCHIVIST'S REPORT

The Rev. Dr. David P. Stechholz, Chair

It is an honor to serve as English District Archivist. Each district of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is to have an archivist who is connected to Concordia Historical Institute (CHI). CHI is the archival agency for matters relating to the history of our Synod, districts and their antecedent districts, North American Evangelical Lutheran history, congregations, schools, seminaries, synodical colleges and universities, auxiliaries, and other entities of Synod. I recommend you or your congregation subscribe to the Concordia Historical Institute Quarterly (CHIQ) for reading interesting historical articles.

Occasionally, I am asked to find historical information for an English District congregation or pastor. First, though, go to your own church's historical archives, parish registry book and records, and conserved history. I encourage each congregation to have a pictorial gallery of current and past pastors in the narthex or undercroft, honoring them for their service to the Lord in a given congregation. This helps teach future generations a respect for the pastoral office and thankfulness to God for faithful undershepherds of the Lord Jesus Christ. Schools might also consider a pictorial gallery of teachers, DCEs, deaconesses, or others who serve or have served during the school's history.

At our English District office in Farmington, Michigan, there is a room that houses various books, pamphlets, articles, and artifacts. For example, we have a processional cross that was donated year's ago by the Rev. Zerit Yohannes, a then English District pastor who served in his native Eritrea as an LCMS missionary in conjunction with support from the English District. The cross is made of bullet shell casings that had been used in Eritrea's war of independence.

As most of you know, in 2021 the English District published the book that I wrote after retiring as Bishop/President. It is titled *The English District Saga: A Niche in the History of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in North America*. Every pastor, school principal, and church library should have a copy of this book, which may be purchased at the District Convention and signed by the author or purchased online. Remembering our history is vital. It was an honor to write this book, chronicling the history of our beloved district and her antecedents.

The matter of historical preservation: pastors, principals, and congregational leaders play an important role in the preservation of church and school history. Do not rely on your or older members' memories of anniversary services of worship and other important events. The Lord God blesses us with the ability and skills to record history in written and digital form. CHI strongly recommends keeping written documentation as well as digital preservation. Some of your church's and school's history can be succinctly shared in online and printed newsletters. Be sure to keep file of anniversary booklets and services and also share them with CHI. *Soli Deo Gloria*.

CAMPUS MINISTRY TASK FORCE

The Rev. Dr. David Dressel, Chair

The campus ministries in the English District value the significant and meaningful support from the English District and its bishop, Jeff Miskus. During one of our virtual meetings, he enthusiastically encouraged us as campus ministry workers and talked about how campus ministry bears long-term fruit and is an essential investment for the church here in North American and throughout the world. We in campus ministry give thanks for this and find encouragement from this support and spirit!

The English District Campus Ministry Task Force generally meets 2-3 times a year, once in fall semester and once or twice in spring semester each year in a Zoom conference call format. We have developed and with the Spirit's guiding try to live out our **rationale for campus ministry in the English District** which reads as follows:

Campus Ministry in the English District LCMS exists to encourage and strengthen young adult Christians, reach those who do not know Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, and care for all on our university and college campuses (students, their families, faculty, staff, administration, and campus communities) with the love of Christ.

Participants have included those involved in campus ministry as well as those seeking to start or grow their campus ministry: Princeton, U of Pittsburgh/Carnegie Mellon/and others, Slippery Rock, Oberlin College, U. of Toledo, Michigan State University, University of Arizona, U. of Wisconsin-Whitewater, Eastern Washington U., Hope College and Grand Valley State, Toronto universities, a Lutheran Campus Mission Association representative, Assistant to the Bishop Pastor Derek Mathers, and Pastor Justin Laughridge, English District Mission Action Team co-chair. We have also included two ministries from the New Jersey District, Rutger U and Apple of His Eye ministries.

We encourage each other, share recent events and talk about how we can be more effective in ministry. We look for opportunities and ways to plant new English District campus ministries (including international student ministries) through English District congregations, circuits, or regions, while at the same time strengthening existing campus ministries.

Through our partnership with the LCMS Recognized Service Organization the Lutheran Campus Mission Association (LCMA), we have been part of the annual Campus Leadership Conference, bringing together student leaders and staff from upper Midwest campus ministries. In addition, through LCMA we have contact and liaison with the LCMS Board for Youth Ministry as it carries on its work for church-wide campus ministry through LCMS-U.

We celebrate the mission work that is happening through English District ministries. Please continue to pray for these, your campus ministries that are developing faith-filled leaders that go into (and help start) churches across North America and the world.

CANADA CORPORATION

Jim Thielen, Chair Bart Day, President and CEO, Lutheran Church Extension Fund

The Canada Corporation was incorporated in 1954 under the name, "Mission Board of the English District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod, in Canada." and was changed in October 1961 to "The English District of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod." In September 1986, the Board of Directors authorized the Corporation to borrow money, issue bonds, invest reserves, mortgage and sell property with power to delegate same to Directors or officers. In addition, the Corporation accepted deposits from congregations and members of congregations that became reserves for lending purposes in Canada.

Several years ago, the English District opened conversations with Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) about the possibility of the Canada Corporation entering LCEF. While the existing structure has faithfully served for many years, there were expanded opportunities if the Corporation was under the umbrella of LCEF. Most importantly, the Corporation would continue serving LCMS congregations and ministries in Canada but with additional capital could serve the extension fund needs of Lutheran Church—Canada. The lending scope would also include mortgage lending to rostered church workers.

After more than two years, and several approvals, including the LCEF and LCMS Board of Directors and the Canada Corporation Board of Directors and Members, LCEF has become the sole member of "The Lutheran Church Extension Fund–Missouri Synod Canada Corporation."

The newly constituted Corporation re-elected four Directors: Jim Thielen, Rev. Gerald Luck, Ann Marie Weselan, and Rev. Philip Gai. Two new Directors were also elected: Sue Elsholz and Rev. Charles St. Onge. Officers include Jim Thielen, chair; Ann Marie Weselan, vice-chair; Rev. Charles St. Onge, secretary; and Sally Naglich, a non-director, to serve as Treasurer. These individuals have done an outstanding job helping manage through the transition.

While this new opportunity provides the ability to expand and grow lending across Canada, the important non-lending services provided to congregations of the English District will continue. Employee expenses and charitable acknowledgements will continue to occur through the Corporation.

At the time of this writing, several transfer details are being finalized with the expectation everything will be complete by the time of the convention. The Corporation is assuming all assets and liabilities and in exchange, the English District will receive an annual payment of \$37,000 for the next 10 years.

LCEF is thankful for Canada Corporation partnering with LCEF and the opportunities this affords the Corporation to honor the past as we build an expanded future serving across Canada.

CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE

The Rev. Luke Zimmerman, Interim Chair

During the 2022–2025 triennium, the English District Constitution Committee reviewed both numerous new constitutions and bylaws and revisions to existing constitutions and bylaws submitted by congregations.

These approval processes are required by Synod Bylaws. LCMS Bylaw 2.2.1 requires District review of congregational constitutions and bylaws as part of the application process for membership within The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. LCMS Bylaw 2.4.1 requires District review of revisions to congregational constitutions and bylaws by congregations that already hold membership within the Synod. Both review processes also include approval of the constitutions and bylaws by the Board of Directors upon recommendation by the Constitution Committee.

This report identifies the congregational constitutions and bylaws that were favorably reviewed by the Constitution Committee and approved by the Board of Directors from March 1, 2022 - February 28, 2025.

ENDOWMENT FUND BOARD OF MANAGERS

The Rev. Fred Gerlach, Chair

On behalf of the Board of Managers it is my privilege to present the English District's Endowment Fund (EDEF) report. The Fund continues to experience growth which produced increased distributable earnings now available for grants. As the Lord's servants, the managers strive to be good stewards of the Fund's considerable assets in order to strengthen and advance the mission of the Gospel proclamation in and through the English District.

In our quarterly teleconference meetings prior to each Board of Directors meeting, the managers review financial reports and monitor asset distribution between two major investment funds to determine the need for asset reallocation. Since the last convention, the board of managers transferred funds from Stifel Nicolaus/American Funds to Confluence/Raymond James to continue our relationship with the investment manager who has guided our investment strategy for many years. The success and growth of the funds over the last several years influenced our decision to continue this advisor's financial counsel.

The Endowment Fund was established as a fund in *perpetuity, meaning it is expected to be in existence* forever with an income-producing investment strategy to secure future resources to achieve the District's mission objectives. The funds are invested in industries that conform to the Synod moral and ethical standards. The Endowment Fund objective is to assist congregations in supporting ministries and missions such as campus ministries, human care and new missions.

There are six categories the managers evaluate for funding: human care/disaster relief, new missions, scholarships, church worker debt reduction, campus ministry and other. If the managers decide a grant application meets the criteria of the fund we recommend to the Board of Directors that a grant be awarded and the financial support is provided to facilitate their objectives. Since the previous convention, the endowment fund earnings supported church worker debt reduction totaling \$36,973, scholarships of \$84,650, other missions and ministries of the district that fall under the six categories above for \$278,486, for a total of \$400,109 as of January 31, 2025.


At the end of December 2021, the Fund value was \$2,648,602; at the close of December 2024 the fund's value increased to \$4,780,829. This foundation creates an opportunity for continued growth and income to fund our mission objectives.

The English District has supported a partnership with the LCMS Foundation since 2018 with the objective of serving the congregations of the District, large and small, providing services at no cost to the congregations to assist in long-term investing and gift planning (helping church members go through the will and estate planning process) to be the best stewards of the resources God has blessed us with. Over the years this Lifetime Plan for Giving ministry supports many valuable ministries for today, tomorrow, and into the future. Ron Grimm has served over 100 churches, giving presentations to over 45 congregations, and from those efforts testamentary gifts to ministry could top \$22 million dollars. Of those charitable gifts the EDEF could receive up to \$1.3 million dedicated to supporting missions and the churches of the English District. This on-going ministry continues the benevolence and stewardship to our ministries to encourage more of our congregations to give and enable the church to share the good news that Christ is risen!

It is a privilege to serve as a member of the Board of Managers, and I look forward to working with the other managers to oversee and prosper God's gifts in this unique service of supporting various Gospel missions.

The Lifeline Team has grown and flourished over the past triennium! As you can see above, we now have a team comprised of members from each of the regions of our district and including Canada. Specific activities since 2022:

- 1. The rebuilding of the Lifeline webpage on the district website, with links to the sanctity of life resources of LCMS, Lutherans for Life, and other organizations.
- 2. Brief write-ups in Servant to Servant (S2S) covering sanctity of life topics. In 2023 we had a concentrated focus on topics related to the family, and we still have interest in including these. Since late last summer, we have focused on the theme of Every Sunday Is Life Sunday, unpacking the Divine Service liturgy, lectionary readings, and hymnody to proclaim the sanctity of life. The 2014 Pew Research Center Religious Landscape Study found that of those members of LCMS congregations surveyed, 36% of those who attend services at least once a week think that abortion should be legal in all or most cases, and 37% favor or strongly favor same-sex marriage. Yet, each and every individual in the pew is hearing, reading, confessing, praying, and singing the sanctity of life at every service. God's services to us are all about life!
- 3. We now have a Lifeline blog, on which pieces published in S2S may be found; this may be accessed at https://englishdistrictlifeline.blogspot.com.
- 4. English District pastors and laity have played major roles in organizing Lutheran participation in March for Life events in Washington D.C., Pennsylvania, Arizona, and Ontario.

We are here as a resource for you! Please let us know how we can help. Additionally, we welcome your submissions of sanctity of life material for our webpage and/or the Servant to Servant newsletter.

MINISTERIAL HEALTH COMMISSION

The Ministerial Health Commission (MHC) recognized the importance of the LCMS Church Workers Wellness Survey 2017 and saw the findings as an invitation to change its focus. The MHC identified the need for a cultural shift and furnishing agency to its church workers and their families. This would entail a shift in its purpose, direction, and strategy in addressing wholeness, wellness, and well-being.

While the MHC continues to assist as a support to our Bishop, if requested, we intentionally moved to a direct hands-on support style within a culture of acceptance and encouragement. Our aim is to provide a more practical, supportive, and interactive approach and be the ever-present resource that stands alongside our church workers and their families.

The MHC has worked diligently to establish a sturdy foundation with cornerstones of strong values and principles. We have fine-tuned our direction and efforts to create, establish, and maintain sustainable and supportive resources whereby a church worker and their family member can directly seek help themselves.

The MHC has consciously sought and participated in a multitude of ways to increase awareness of our existence, communicate our foundational values and practices, and ensure our presence and accessibility. We have created an ongoing online "Toolbox" on the English District website whereby individuals can access credible resources in conjunction with customized wellness assessment and worksheet tools. In an effort to provide a broader choice of contacts and resource options, the MHC expanded its demographic and professional representation. Tools and practices were developed and implemented to guide our endeavors and the quality and array of our resources, and to ensure our integrity. Actively the MHC investigated and engaged in partnering and collaborative ventures to expand and strengthen the resources and supportive options for church workers and their families.

- Develop and execute a comprehensive communication strategy to broaden our audience base, heighten awareness and promote MHC values and accessibility.
- Increase networking efforts towards expanding MHC representation and presence within the English District and beyond its borders.
- Explore a partner relationship with the Office of National Mission and Concordia Plans to further enhance/achieve our goals that the MHC has established in support of our church workers and their families.

As we move forward, we will continue to be ever-present and steadfast in our approach guided by our values and by our faith.

NATIONAL LUTHERAN SCHOOL ACCREDITATION (NLSA)

Gail Holzer, Accreditation Commissioner

Introduction: It is my joy to continue working with English District education centers through the National Lutheran School Accreditation process. It is an arduous process for our school ministries, but the benefits bring clarity of mission and vision, as well as an assurance that our children are receiving the best educational experience in our Lutheran Schools. In addition, the process challenges our policies, processes, philosophies and demands that the Christian faith is integrated throughout the curriculum to ensure our schools exist for the purpose of sharing the love, grace, and mercy of Jesus Christ.

Mission of NLSA: NLSA encourages and recognizes schools that provide quality Christian education and engage in continuous improvement.

Changes to NLSA Protocol: The National Accreditation Commission (NAC), led by LCMS School Ministries has reworked NLSA protocol and has rolled out Protocol G for Prek, Elementary and Secondary schools to use. An early childhood protocol for standalone Early Childhood Centers will be ready within the next year.

The protocol added a more comprehensive financial section of standards for our schools to meet. The purpose is to ensure the financial viability and sustainability of our school ministries.

Another change is the use of JetPack, an online system that will house all NLSA documents from all of our schools starting with the application and continuing through their documentation, strategic plan, and annual reports. This system will allow the Commission to track a school's progress and affirm their NLSA status.

NLSA schools reapply for accreditation status every 5 years. The ED has 8 school ministries accredited by NLSA, 1 is an early childhood center moving to add elementary grades, 3 are traditional PreK - 8 Lutheran Schools, 1 is a traditional PreK - 12 Lutheran school, and 3 are classical Lutheran schools.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

I have been serving as the English District Stewardship Committee chair since 2018 and have attended the District Stewardship Leaders Conference each year it has been held. In 2023 the theme of the conference was "Steward's by God's Design," which is an adaptive change process designed by the LCMS Michigan District to impact the lives of individual stewards in the congregation as well as the corporate stewardship life of the congregation. Participants were trained to be facilitators of this process for their respective districts. In 2024 the conference Theme was "Set Free to Lead: Discovering the Abundant Life for the Steward Leader." Focus was given to reinforce the training in 2023 for the Stewards by God's Design program, and strategies for disseminating the program to the district were discussed. After more than 40 years of gathering in the Phoenix, AZ area each February, the conference has been revamped for 2025 and assembled in March at Messiah Lutheran Church in Plano, TX with a focus on the topic "Beyond Generosity – A Life of Grace" as presented by Phil Krupski of LCMS Foundation. Each of these conferences has provided valuable information for congregations that are struggling with stewardship as well as synodical resources that are available. More information on these resources, as well as the Stewards by God's Design program will be provided in the coming months through the district's Servant to Servant newsletter.

Overture 1-02

To State Religious Objection to Government Interference of Parents' Duty

WHEREAS, the Small Catechism confesses that God has created and given to each person "my body"; and

WHEREAS, the body of the baptized is the temple of the Holy Spirit and belongs not to government or its institutions (such as schools: public or private), but to God (1 Corinthians 6:19); and

WHEREAS, the Fourth Commandment, as explained in the Large Catechism, places all authority over a child on the parents of that child, so that we confess, "All authority flows and is born from the authority of parents. Where a father is unable alone to educate his child, he uses a schoolmaster to teach the child... So all whom we call 'masters' are in the place of parents and must get their power and authority to govern from them" (para 141-142; emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, the Scriptures (and the Catechism) do not limit parental authority to a particular age, but state that God has given authority to parents over all children who live in their household; and

WHEREAS, government in our society – at federal, state, and local levels – has attempted or may attempt to step between children and their parents (impeding the parents' duty to raise their children in the faith and life of the Christian confession) in various ways, including but not limited to

- Laws that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval
- Laws that allow, recommend, or give children sex-change operations or medical procedures for "transitioning" minors without parents' approval
- Laws that permit minors to get an abortion without parents' approval
- Laws that label parents who refuse their minor children vaccines, sex-change operations and procedures, or abortions as engaging in child abuse
- Laws that remove children from the custody of parents who refuse their minor children vaccines, sex-change operations and procedures, or abortions
- School policies that teach children various anti-scriptural social agendas without parents' approval
- School policies that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval
- School policies that encourage children to "transition" or use gender-confusing language or introduce sexual or gender identities that do not conform with the child's birth sex without parents' approval

Therefore, be it

Resolved, that the English District boldly, unequivocally, and plainly states its objection on the grounds of religious belief to any federal, state, or local law or mandate, or any school policy, that imposes the government's will over the parents' duty to raise their children or that aids the minor child's will to be kept secret from the parents; and further be it

Resolved, that the English District state plainly its willingness and readiness to support, come to the aid of, and speak in defense of any parents within sister congregations of the English District who face the challenge of government laws or school policies interfering with parents' duties to raise their children in the fear of the Lord; and further be it

Resolved, that the English District urge The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod in convention and each and every one of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly state their unconditional agreement with this religious objection to government interference in the Christian parents' duty to raise their children in the faith and life of the Christian confession; and further be it

Resolved, that the English District urge The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod and each and every one of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly denounce any teachings of any church bodies which seek to advocate for or tolerate the government interfering with parents' duties in raising their children in the Christian faith and life. Such teachings are unbiblical, unchristian, heretical, opposed to God, and worthy of condemnation; and finally be it

Resolved, that the English District urge her congregations and all their families to benefit their children with the use of Lutheran schools or Lutheran homeschools/hybrid co-ops, or to become involved in their local public school government, that the parents may safeguard their God-given responsibility, and that the children may be protected from such government overreach and godless agendas and may be raised in the proper fear of the Lord.

To Reject Kinism

To Amend English District Bylaws 6.2.5 and 9.1.2

Preamble

At its December 2–3, 2022 meeting, the English District Board of Directors enacted an agreement with Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) that would transfer governance of the Canada Corporation from the English District to LCEF. LCEF would replace the Canadian congregations of the English District as the sole member of the Canada Corporation and that, as the sole member, it will have the power to elect that entity's Board of Directors.

The agreement with LCEF to assume governance of the Canada Corporation was done, so that LCEF could potentially provide loans to Lutheran congregations and church workers in Canada that held membership outside the English District. That included both SELC congregations and church workers, as well as congregations and church workers belonging to Lutheran Church—Canada.

Authorization for LCEF to provide loans to entities not belonging to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) required The LCMS to amend its bylaws. The LCMS Bylaws were amended at the 2023 Synod Convention [2023 Resolution 9-10A], allowing LCEF to lend to non-Synod entities with the approval of the LCEF's governing board and the approval of The LCMS Board of Directors.

LCEF's assumption of governance of the Canada Corporation received final approval by The LCMS Board of Directors when it met on November 22–23, 2024. On December 5, 2024, the Members and Board of Directors of English District Canada Corporation voted to amend the corporation's governing documents. These actions mean that the former subagency of the English District—the Canada Corporation—has now become an incorporated subagency of an agency of the Synod—LCEF.

Rationale

With the Canada Corporation having become an incorporated subagency of LCEF, it is no longer under English District governance. The English District Board of Directors no longer has fiduciary responsibilities concerning the Canada Corporation. This makes representation of the Canada Corporation to the English District Board of Directors no longer necessary. Additionally, the change in status of the Canada Corporation includes a Board of Directors with members who are not members of English District congregations. Such an entity should not be empowered to make appointments to English District boards or committees.

Therefore be it

This led to several individuals beginning their service 7 during the triennium, while other individuals completed more than half a term prior to their resignation. 8 9 As the nominating process for the 2025 District Convention reached its conclusion, questions were asked 10 concerning the application of District Bylaw 5.1 to individuals who had served multiple terms in office but 11 had resigned during their current term. 1 **COMMITTEE ON CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES** 2 3 Overture 4-01 4 5 To Request a Comprehensive Review of the Theological Concerns and Practical 6 **Procedures When a Call Is Terminated or Self-Terminated** 7 8 **Preamble** 9 WHEREAS, The LCMS has committed to caring for pastors and church workers in one of its seven mission 10 priorities, to wit: "To promote and nurture the spiritual, emotional, financial, and physical well-being of 11 pastors and professional church workers;" and 12 13 WHEREAS, There are a number of reasons a person might self-terminate a Divine Call, e.g. age of retirement, mental or physical health concerns or incapacitations, personal conviction, etc.; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, There is biblical precedent for the non-death ending of a tenure of service, e.g. Numbers 17 8:23-26; and 18 19 WHEREAS, The CTCR discussed termination of Divine Call in its 2003 Report "Theology and Practice of 20 'The Divine Call'' only from the perspective of outside termination and not self-termination; and 21 22 WHEREAS, Care should be given to the worker and the people of God served by the worker throughout 23 the length of a Divine Call, including if a Call is terminated or self-terminated; and 24 25 WHEREAS, There is a paucity of theological rationale and practical direction in the Synod for the many 26 ways a Divine Call might be self-terminated before death; and 27 28 WHEREAS, There can be confusion in the Church over legitimate and illegitimate reasons for terminating 29 or self-terminating a Divine Call which might result in anxiety over Candidate status; therefore be it 30 31 Resolved, That church workers and congregations be given clear teaching on the theological and 32 practical procedures when a Divine Call is terminated or self-terminated; and be it further 33 34 Resolved, That the English District memorialize Synod to instruct the CTCR to offer clarity regarding 35 theological and practical considerations for the ways a Divine Call might be legitimately or illegitimately 36 terminated or self-terminated; and be it further 37 38 Resolved, That the English District in convention memorialize Synod that the COP is to establish support 39 and training materials for church workers who self-terminate their Divine Call legitimately; and be it 40 further 41 42 Resolved, That district presidents and circuit visitors work with the workers and congregations of their 43 district to support their called church workers before, during, and after times of termination and self-44 termination; and be it further 45 46 Resolved, That the English District convention send this resolution as an overture to the 2026 Synod 47 convention. 48 49 Submitted by Indiana Circuit #14

Overture 4-02

To Direct the Office of National Mission to Perform a Systematic Review of All Registered Service Organizations (RSOs)

WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has historically emphasized accountability and doctrinal integrity in its affiliations, ensuring that those organizations receiving its endorsement or partnership remain faithful to the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Titus 1:9, "He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it"); and

WHEREAS, The LCMS recognizes certain organizations as Registered Service Organizations (RSOs), granting them recognition and endorsement, and in some cases financial and institutional support, on the basis that their mission and practices align with biblical and confessional Lutheran teaching, as outlined in LCMS Bylaw 6.2, which establishes the process and requirements for RSO status within the Synod; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.1 states that RSOs must "function in harmony with the programs of the boards of the Synod and in furtherance of the mission and ministry of the church", making it necessary to ensure ongoing compliance with doctrinal standards; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6 places oversight of RSOs under the Office of National Mission, which evaluates and reviews RSOs to determine whether they remain in alignment with LCMS doctrine and practice; and

WHEREAS, Faithful stewardship requires ongoing review to ensure that these organizations continue to uphold sound doctrine and biblical practices; and

WHEREAS, There is a growing need for transparency and accountability in the work of all organizations affiliated with the church, ensuring that they adhere to biblical principles in matters of faith, morality, and financial stewardship (Luke 16:10, "One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much"); and

WHEREAS, The LCMS must take seriously its responsibility to avoid supporting or endorsing organizations that have drifted from the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Romans 16:17, "I appeal to you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and create obstacles contrary to the doctrine that you have been taught; avoid them"); therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the LCMS Office of National Mission, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of presidents, conduct a systematic review of all RSOs, ensuring that each organization maintains alignment with biblical teaching and the doctrinal position of the LCMS; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this review assess each RSO's doctrinal stance, financial stewardship, and ethical practices in light of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Office of National Mission be empowered, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of presidents and in accordance with LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6, to take corrective action regarding any RSO found to be doctrinally or ethically out of alignment with LCMS teachings, including

but not limited to placing the organization on probationary status, requiring doctrinal correction, or, if necessary, revoking RSO status; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the LCMS Office of National Mission, in coordination with the various mission office and the council of presidents, shall take immediate action to revoke the RSO status of any organization that is publicly known to be acting in direct opposition to the doctrine of the Synod, including but not limited to those engaged in unlawful activity, those who abet lawbreakers, those who affirm or promote same-sex relationships, or those who facilitate the adoption of children to same-sex couples; and be it further

RESOLVED, That any RSO whose status has been revoked due to doctrinal or ethical violations may apply for reinstatement, provided that the organization demonstrates repentance, publicly renounces its previous errors, and affirms in writing its adherence to the biblical and confessional teachings of the LCMS; and be it further

RESOLVED, That organizations found to be out of alignment with LCMS doctrine be given a clear path to correction and reinstatement, provided they demonstrate repentance and a return to biblical and confessional teaching (Galatians 6:1, "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness"); and be it further

RESOLVED, That the findings of this review be reported in their entirety to the Synod and made available for the benefit of congregations and members of the LCMS; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the LCMS reaffirm its commitment to biblical stewardship, ensuring that all partnerships and affiliations reflect the mission and values of Christ's Church as taught in Holy Scripture and confessed in the Lutheran Confessions.

1 Overture 4-03 2 3 To Affirm the Board of Regents and Administration of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor 4 in Their Efforts to Resolve Financial Deficits 5 6 WHEREAS, In February 2024 the Board of Regents of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor 7 (CUWAA), President Erik Ankerberg, and the administration of both campuses were confronted with 8 financial realities that included a growing financial deficit; and 9 10 WHEREAS, The Ann Arbor campus had been unable to generate auxiliary revenue sufficient to meet its needs leading to an annual average operational shortfall of \$4 million for the entire university; and 11 12 WHEREAS, We recognize that CUWAA is a Lutheran higher education community of the Lutheran 13 14 Church-Missouri Synod serving a focused educational mission in the world accountable for responsible 15 stewardship; and 16 17 WHEREAS, Christians may disagree over how to handle challenging situations which may be concerning 18 and painful for many to hear, especially students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and other CUAA and 19 CUW stakeholders and the Ann Arbor community; and 20 21 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have 22 demonstrated resolve and intentional strategic thought as they considered a variety of initiatives 23 designed to better position CUWAA for the future; and 24 25 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have 26 demonstrated faithful Christian leadership in their service to the students, faculty, staff, and Synod in a 27 fair, reasonable, and responsible manner recognizing that as sinful, fallible mortals their communication 28 efforts could have been handled better; therefore be it 29 30 Resolved, That the Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA be 31 commended for making the necessary decisions to ensure that CUWAA is financially secure and 32 sustainable for future generations; and be it further 33 34 Resolved, That by our prayers they would be encouraged in their responsibility to be "steadfast, 35 immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" 36 (1 Corinthians 15:58 ESV); and be it further 37 38 Resolved, That the English District continue to pray in good faith for the ongoing efforts of the Board of 39 Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA; and be it further 40 Resolved, That the English District continue to pray for the students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and 41 42 other stakeholders of Concordia Ann Arbor as these initiatives have and continue to have impact on the 43 Ann Arbor campus; and be it finally

COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGY AND CHURCH RELATIONS

Resolution 1-01

 (Overture 1-01, p. 4-1)

To Encourage the English District of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to Affirm Unequivocally the Practice of First Communion Prior to Confirmation as a God-pleasing Practice so as to Encourage Member Congregations and Pastors of the English District to Recognize the Validity of the Aforementioned Practice and, on That Basis, Commune Visiting Children Who, Though Not Yet Confirmed, Are Nevertheless Communicant Members in Good Standing and Who, Therefore, Should Not Be Denied the Lord's Body and Blood Because They Have Not Yet Been Confirmed.

WHEREAS, Many member congregations of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod receive children as communicants to the Lord's Supper through the Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation (LSB: Agenda 25-27), and, therefore, have non-Confirmed, yet communicant children who regularly and faithfully commune at their home congregations; and

WHEREAS, The majority of our member congregations do not receive children as full communicant members until they have completed Confirmation and have gone through the Rite of Confirmation (LSB: Agenda, 28-31); and

WHEREAS, Both the Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation as well as the Rite of Confirmation are countenanced and legitimated by Synod as evidenced by the presence of each rite in and use out of the Lutheran Service Book: Agenda; and

WHEREAS, Both rites exist, not by divine command, but as human ordinances and thus neither have the status of a Sacrament (Ap. XIII.6); and

WHEREAS, Neither rite confers the status of worthy communicant, which is determined, not by a human ordinance, "but that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," (SC VI; cf., 1Cor.11:27-29); and

WHEREAS, Both rites fulfill the prescription of the Lutheran Confessions that "people are admitted only if they first had an opportunity to be examined and heard" (AC XXIV.6-7) and "the sacrament is made available to those who wish to partake of it, after they have been examined and absolved" (Ap XXIV.1); (see General Notes for both rites, p. 25 and 28, respectively); and

WHEREAS, The Lutheran Confessions do not require uniform rites, ordinances, and ceremonies for the sake of the unity of faith and the Church (AC VII.3; cf., Ap XV.18), thus allowing disparate rites to admit children to the Lord's Supper; and

WHEREAS, The Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation continues as the minority practice in the Synod, there have been anecdotal cases of children being refused Communion at sister congregations, not on the basis of their unworthiness, determined by whether or not they believe the promise of Jesus "given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," but on the basis, either of their non-confirmed status or, otherwise, an arbitrary age restriction; and

WHEREAS, Refusal to commune such visiting children who have been legitimately received to the Lord's Table through instruction, examination, and absolution, which precedes the Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation, causes such little ones, whose angels always behold the face of their Father in heaven, to stumble through confusion and offense (Matt. 18:6: ; see Ap XV.49 regarding how "traditions are truly traps of consciences"); therefore be it

Resolved, That the English District in convention unequivocally affirms the practice of First Communion Prior to Confirmation as a God-pleasing practice and a legitimate way to faithful reception of the Lord's Supper; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District in convention encourage member congregations and pastors of the English District to recognize the validity of the aforementioned practice of First Communion Prior to Confirmation so as to commune visiting children who, though not yet confirmed, are nevertheless communicant members in good standing at their home congregations; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District in convention reject and condemn the error of refusing the body and blood of Jesus Christ to visiting communicant children on the basis of their non-confirmed status or an arbitrary age restriction; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District in convention encourage the Synod in Convention to adopt the same position; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District survey her member congregations in order to determine the percentage of congregations making use of the rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation, and publish the results of said survey among our congregations; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District in convention encourage the Synod in Convention to survey all member congregations in order to determine the percentage of congregations making use of the rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation, and publish the results of said survey among the congregations of Synod; and be it finally

Resolved, That the English District prepare a tool kit for congregations and pastors that both equips pastors who desire to implement such a rite to teach about the practice of First Communion Prior to Confirmation and that, likewise, equips pastors to instruct congregations who do not yet understand the God-pleasing nature of the rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation so that such congregations who do not observe this practice gladly welcome and receive visiting communicant children who desire to receive the Lord's Supper, and that encourages all communicant members to announce for Communion when visiting congregations other than their own.

1 **Resolution 1-02** 2 (Overture 1-02, p. 4-3) 3 4 To State Religious Objection to Government Interference of Parents' Duty 5 6 WHEREAS, the Small Catechism confesses that God has created and given to each person "my body"; 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the body of the baptized is the temple of the Holy Spirit and belongs not to government or its 10 institutions (such as schools: public or private), but to God (1 Corinthians 6:19); and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Fourth Commandment, as explained in the Large Catechism, places all authority over a 13 child on the parents of that child, so that we confess, "All authority flows and is born from the authority 14 of parents. Where a father is unable alone to educate his child, he uses a schoolmaster to teach the 15 child... So all whom we call 'masters' are in the place of parents and must get their power and authority 16 to govern from them" (para 141-142; emphasis added); and 17 18 WHEREAS, the Scriptures (and the Catechism) do not limit parental authority to a particular age, but 19 state that God has given authority to parents over all children who live in their household; and 20 21 WHEREAS, government in our society – at federal, state, and local levels – has attempted or may 22 attempt to step between children and their parents (impeding the parents' duty to raise their children in 23 the faith and life of the Christian confession) in various ways, including but not limited to 24 Laws that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval 25 Laws that allow, recommend, or give children sex-change operations or medical procedures for 26 "transitioning" minors without parents' approval 27 Laws that permit minors to get an abortion without parents' approval Laws that label parents who refuse their minor children vaccines, sex-change operations and 28 29 procedures, or abortions as engaging in child abuse 30 Laws that remove children from the custody of parents who refuse their minor children 31 vaccines, sex-change operations and procedures, or abortions 32 School policies that teach children various anti-scriptural social agendas without parents' 33 approval 34 School policies that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval 35 School policies that encourage children to "transition" or use gender-confusing language or 36 introduce sexual or gender identities that do not conform with the child's birth sex without 37 parents' approval 38 Therefore, be it 39 40 Resolved, that the English District boldly, unequivocally, and plainly state its objection on the grounds of 41 religious belief to any federal, state, or local law or mandate, or any school policy, that imposes the 42 government's will over the parents' duty to raise their children or that aids the minor child's will to be 43

kept secret from the parents; and further be it

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Resolved, that the English District state plainly its willingness and readiness to support, come to the aid of, and speak in defense of any parents within sister congregations of the English District who face the challenge of government laws or school policies interfering with parents' duties to raise their children in the fear of the Lord; and further be it

Resolved, that the English District urge The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in convention and each and every one of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly state their unconditional agreement with this religious objection to government interference in the Christian parents' duty to raise their children in the faith and life of the Christian confession; and further be it

Resolved, that the English District urge The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and each and every one of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly denounce any teachings of any church bodies which seek to advocate for or tolerate the government interfering with parents' duties in raising their children in the Christian faith and life. Such teachings are unbiblical, unchristian, heretical, opposed to God, and worthy of condemnation; and finally be it

Resolved, that the English District urge her congregations and all their families to benefit their children with the use of Lutheran schools or Lutheran homeschools/hybrid co-ops, or to become involved in their local public school government, that the parents may safeguard their God-given responsibility, and that the children may be protected from such government overreach and godless agendas and may be raised in the proper fear of the Lord.

1 **Resolution 1-03** 2 (Overture 1-03, p. 4-5) 3 **To Reject Kinism** 4 5 6 WHEREAS, We are all descended from Adam and Eve, who were created in God's image, and therefore 7 are members of one human race, each formed by Him and with a special status in His created order 8 (Genesis 1:26-28, 3:20, 9:6; Psalm 8:4-8, 139:13-16; Acts 17:25-26; Ephesians 3:15); and 9 10 WHEREAS, We are all equally sinners for whom Christ died and rose again, that all who believe in Him 11 should not perish but have eternal life (Psalm 51:10; John 3:16-17; Romans 4:25; Ephesians 2:5); and 12 13 WHEREAS, By His will, God's Church on earth includes members from a great diversity of backgrounds (1 14 Corinthians 12:13; Galatians 3:28; Ephesians 2:11-14); and 15 16 WHEREAS, God shows no partiality among His people (Deuteronomy 10:17; Job 34:19; Acts 10:34; 17 Romans 2:10-11; Galatians 2:6; Ephesians 6:9; Colossians 3:25; 1 Peter 1:17); and 18 19 WHEREAS, We are called to deeply love and serve one another as God has first loved us (Leviticus 19:18; 20 Matthew 19:19, 22:39; Mark 12:31; Luke 10:27; Romans 13:9; Galatians 5:14, 6:10; 1 Corinthians 9:22; 2 21 Corinthians 6:3; James 2:8; 1 Peter 2:17; 1 John 4:10,19); and 22 23 WHEREAS, We joyfully anticipate the Last Day, when we will be numbered among a "great multitude ... 24 from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages" eternally in God's presence, and singing 25 His praise (Revelation 7:9-10; c.f. Revelation 5:8-9); and 26 27 WHEREAS, Hatred of the brother is a grievous sin akin to murder, violating the sanctity of human life, 28 and with grave impact on one's eternal salvation (Exodus 20:13 [Deuteronomy 5:17]; Matthew 5:21-22; 29 Galatians 5:21; 1 John 3:14-15; Revelation 21:8; SC The Fifth Commandment); and 30 31 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Committee on Theology and Church Relations 32 released the report Racism and the Church: Overcoming the Idolatry in February, 1994 which condemned the hatred of our brothers, stating, "It is time to let our light shine and, through the 33 34 proclamation of the glorious Gospel of our blessed God, to lead the way to the inclusion of all our sisters 35 and brothers in Christ in the full exercise of the rights and privileges that belong to them as priests. 36 What a beautiful opportunity we have to let God's will be done on earth as it most certainly is done in 37 heaven, where there is not now, nor will there ever be, any partiality shown to anyone. We must all 38 continually seek God's help in helping each other in our Synod to resist the temptations toward racist 39 thinking and to eradicate its poisonous effects in our lives, that we may walk together in true unity of 40 mind, heart, and purpose, even as we are one in Christ."; and 41 42 WHEREAS, The Synod in convention has over time adopted numerous resolutions condemning hatred 43 based on race in all of its manifestations across the political and ideological spectrum, including 2019 44 Resolution 11-04A, To Affirm the Common Humanity of All People and Ethnicities; and 2023 Resolution 45 11-02A, To Reject All Forms of Racism and Affirm Our Witness to All People; and 46 47 WHEREAS, Kinism twists Scripture to divide the Church by race and promote racial superiority and 48 segregation ("Has God indeed said...?", c.f. Genesis 3:1); and

WHEREAS, Kinism has been roundly condemned by the Synodical leadership; and

WHEREAS, Individuals, some of whom are members of LCMS congregations, have promoted Kinism online, at times attacking Synod as a whole, and at times individual members of Synod, sadly attempting to lure the faithful away from the truth of Scripture (Matthew 24:11; Acts 20:30; 2 Corinthians 11:13; 1 Timothy 4:1; 2 Peter 2:1-3; Jude 4); therefore be it

Resolved, That the English District reject and publicly condemn Kinism, affirming that all baptized believers are one in Christ (Romans 12:4-5; 1 Corinthians 10:17, 12:12,20; Ephesians 2:19, 4:4-5,16; Colossians 3:15), and encourages Synod to do the same; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District encourage her pastors to make their congregations aware of the challenge of Kinism, and refute it through the lens of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, and encourages Synod to do the same; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District encourage her pastors in the course of their teaching, to intentionally teach sound hermeneutical principles to the members of their congregations, to equip the laity to respond to this or any temptation of "Has God indeed said...?" (Genesis 3:1) by appealing to Scripture rightly read and understood (Matthew 4:1-11; 1 John 4:1), and encourage the Synod to do the same; and be it further

Resolved, That the English District publicly support any individual or entity who/that is targeted, attacked, and threatened by individuals infected by Kinism, and encourage Synod to do the same; and be it finally

Resolved, That English District call on pastors and laity to mark and avoid those who work to "cause divisions and create obstacles in the Church", and "deceive hearts" contrary to God's Truth (Romans 16:17-18), praying that they repent, receive His absolution and cleansing, restoration to His Church, and eternal life in Him (Luke 15:1-10; 1 John 1:9), and encourage Synod to do the same.

1 **Resolution 1-04** 2 (Overture 1-04, p. 4-7) 3 4 To Encourage Unity Among Our Churches 5 6 **Preamble** 7 With geopolitical and socio-economic strife is on the rise between Canada, the United States, and many 8 other nations; and because these tensions are spilling into the hearts of the members of our 9 congregations; and because the English District is part of God's holy Church and a "District without 10 borders", we respectfully ask that the District issue a public statement encouraging repentance, amity, 11 unity and prayer among our congregations. 12 13 WHEREAS, Geopolitical tension and socio-economic strife is creating division and antagonism between 14 peoples and nations; and 15 16 WHEREAS, This political tension is being felt by members of our English District congregations; and 17 18 WHEREAS, The Kingdom of God is not of this world (John 18:36), Christ is undivided (1 Corinthians 1:13), 19 and so too His Body (Colossians 3:12-15); and 20 21 Whereas, Luther's explanation of the eighth commandment in the Small Catechism states that we do 22 not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead, we are to 23 come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the kindest way; 24 Therefore, be it 25 26 Resolved, That the English District issue a public statement encouraging the Pastors and members of our 27 congregations to repent of their sins, receive the forgiveness and comfort Christ alone can give, and so 28 to pursue peace and unity with one another across international borders, and to pray for and bless one 29 another, beseeching the Father, Son and Holy Spirit's power and presence as they pray.

1 **COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM** 2 3 **Resolution 2-01** 4 5 To Affirm and Retain the Seven Mission Priorities of the LCMS 6 7 **Preamble** 8 WHEREAS, The Board of National Mission and the Board of International Mission reported to the 2025 9 LCMS District Conventions evaluating Synod's current Mission Priorities; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Seven Mission Priorities of the LCMS continue to direct the Synod's mission and ministry; 12 and 13 14 WHEREAS, both the Boards of National and International Mission LCMS found no objection to the current 15 mission priorities; therefore be it 16 17 Resolved, That the English District in convention give thanks to God for the faithful work being carried out 18 by the Boards of National Mission and International Mission; and be it further 19 20 Resolved, That every congregation in the English District be encouraged to review and embrace the seven 21 mission priorities of the LCMS; and be it finally 22 23 Resolved, That the English District in convention memorialize the Synod convention in 2026 to retain and 24 continue conducting herself in accord with the seven mission priorities. 25

Resolved, That the English District in convention give thanks to God for the faithful work being carried out by the campus ministries within the district; and be it further

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Resolved, That every congregation in the English District be encouraged to connect their college-bound members with the appropriate LCMS campus ministry or local congregation; and be it further

Resolution 3-02 (Overture 3-02, p. 4-12)

To Amend English District Bylaw 9.1.2

Preamble

At its December 2-3, 2022 meeting, the English District Board of Directors enacted an agreement with Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) that would transfer governance of the Canada Corporation from the English District to LCEF. LCEF would replace the Canadian congregations of the English District as the sole member of the Canada Corporation and that, as the sole member, it will have the power to elect that entity's Board of Directors.

The agreement with LCEF to assume governance of the Canada Corporation was done, so that LCEF could potentially provide loans to Lutheran congregations and church workers in Canada that held membership outside the English District. That included both SELC congregations and church workers, as well as congregations and church workers belonging to Lutheran Church—Canada.

Authorization for LCEF to provide loans to entities not belonging to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) required The LCMS to amend its bylaws. The LCMS Bylaws were amended at the 2023 Synod Convention [2023 Resolution 9-10A], allowing LCEF to lend to non-Synod entities with the approval of the LCEF's governing board and the approval of The LCMS Board of Directors.

LCEF's assumption of governance of the Canada Corporation received final approval by The LCMS Board of Directors when it met on November 22–23, 2024. On December 5, 2024, the Members and Board of Directors of English District Canada Corporation voted to amend the corporation's governing documents. These actions mean that the former subagency of the English District—the Canada Corporation—has now become an incorporated subagency of an agency of the Synod—LCEF.

Rationale

With the Canada Corporation having become an incorporated subagency of LCEF, it is no longer under English District governance. The English District Board of Directors no longer has fiduciary responsibilities concerning the Canada Corporation. This makes representation of the Canada Corporation to the English District Board of Directors no longer necessary. Additionally, the change in status of the Canada Corporation includes a Board of Directors with members who are not members of English District congregations. Such an entity should not be empowered to make appointments to English District boards or committees.

1 **Resolution 3-03** 2 (Overture 3-03, p. 4-14) 3 4 To Amend English District Bylaw 5.1 5 6 Rationale 7 During the 2022-2025 triennium, a number of District officeholders resigned their offices and took up 8 new roles, either within or outside of the District. This led to several individuals beginning their service 9 during the triennium, while other individuals completed more than half a term prior to their resignation. 10 11 As the nominating process for the 2025 District Convention reached its conclusion, questions were asked 12 concerning the application of District Bylaw 5.1 to individuals who had served multiple terms in office but 13 had resigned during their current term. These questions focused on whether the limitation on tenure 14 would reset for them, particularly since they had not completed a full term but had not been out of office 15 for an interval of less than a year. (d) Any person who is ineligible for re-election or reappointment may be elected or appointed to

1 **Resolution 3-04** 2 (Overture 3-02, p. 4-12 and 3-04, p. 4-15) 3 4 To Amend District Bylaw 6.2.5 5 Rationale 6 English District Endowment Fund Governing Document Paragraph 5.6 outlines a vacancy appointment 7 process to fill any manager seat. That vacancy appointment process can be amended by the District Board 8 of Directors without action by the District Convention. However, if changes to that vacancy appointment 9 process are made within a triennium, the District Bylaws as they currently read would need to be 10 amended. Accomplishing that may not be possible to do for months, if not years, until the District 11 Convention is seated. This situation can be avoided by having District Bylaw 6.2.5 refer to the Endowment 12 Fund Governing Document. 13 14 Therefore be it 15 16 Resolved, That Bylaw 6.2.5 be amended as follows: 17 PRESENT/PROPOSED WORDING 18 6.2.5 Vacancies that occur in the office of District Endowment Fund Manager shall be filled: 19 (a) A vacancy in any regional manager position shall be filled by appointment by the District 20 President, subject to approval by the Board of Directors. WHEREAS, The elected voting membership of the English District Board of Directors currently consists of six (6) ministers of religion [four (4) ordained ministers—President, Secretary, one (1) ordained minister from the Eastern or Lake Erie Region, and one (1) ordained minister from the Midwestern or Western Region—and two (2) commissioned ministers] and six (6) laypersons [one (1) from each District Region and two (2) from the District at-large] who are elected by the District Convention (EN Bylaws 5.2.2, 5.4.4, 5.4.5, 5.5.3, and 9.1.1); and

WHEREAS, Regional representation by ordained ministers to the District Board of Directors is currently provided by the four Regional Vice-Presidents, who "shall advise the President, serve as his representatives, and assist him in bringing to the Board of Directors any needed recommendations" (EN Bylaw 4.3) and also serve as non-voting members of the Board of Directors (EN Bylaw 9.1.2); and

WHEREAS, The English District may be better served by electing ordained ministers with various skill sets (legal, finance, investment, administration, etc.) to its Board of Directors without limitation by District Region; and

WHEREAS, The election of commissioned ministers as voting members of the Board of Directors is no longer limited by District Region (cf. 2018 Resolution 3-03A); and

WHEREAS, The proposed bylaw amendments would not change the existing practice of the District Convention electing six (6) ministers of religion and six (6) laypersons to serve as voting members of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, The nomination process for election of ordained ministers to the Board of Directors at the 2025 English District Convention has been conducted under the current limitation by District Region (EN Bylaw 5.4.1); therefore be it

Resolved, That English District Bylaw 5.4.4 be amended as follows:

PRESENT/PROPOSED WORDING

- 5.4.4 The District Convention shall elect one (1) ordained minister from the Eastern or Lake Erie Region, one (1) ordained minister from the Midwestern or Western Region, two (2) ordained ministers from the clergy roster of the District, two (2) commissioned ministers from the commissioned minister roster of the District, and one (1) layperson from each of the four regions of the District:

1 **COMMITTEE ON CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES** 2 3 Resolution 4-01 4 (Overture 4-01, p. 4-19) 5 6 To Request a Comprehensive Review of the Theological Concerns and Practical 7 **Procedures When a Call Is Terminated or Self-Terminated** 8 9 Preamble 10 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has committed to caring for pastors and church workers in one of its seven mission priorities, to wit: "To promote and nurture the spiritual, 11 12 emotional, financial, and physical well-being of pastors and professional church workers;" and 13 14 WHEREAS, There are a number of reasons a person might self-terminate a Divine Call, e.g. age of 15 retirement, mental or physical health concerns or incapacitations, personal conviction, etc.; and 16 17 WHEREAS, There is biblical precedent for the non-death ending of a tenure of service, e.g. Numbers 18 8:23-26; and 19 20 WHEREAS, The Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR) discussed termination of Divine 21 Call in its 2003 Report "Theology and Practice of 'The Divine Call" only from the perspective of outside 22 termination and not self-termination; and 23 24 WHEREAS, Care should be given to the worker and the people of God served by the worker throughout 25 the length of a Divine Call, including if a Call is terminated or self-terminated; and 26 27 WHEREAS, There is a paucity of theological rationale and practical direction in the Synod for the many 28 ways a Divine Call might be self-terminated before death; and 29 30 WHEREAS, There can be confusion in the Church over legitimate and illegitimate reasons for terminating 31 or self-terminating a Divine Call which might result in anxiety over Candidate status; therefore be it 32 33 Resolved, That church workers and congregations be given clear teaching on the theological and 34 practical procedures when a Divine Call is terminated or self-terminated; and be it further 35 36 Resolved, That the English District memorialize Synod to instruct the CTCR to offer clarity regarding 37 theological and practical considerations for the ways a Divine Call might be legitimately or illegitimately 38 terminated or self-terminated; and be it further 39 40 Resolved, That the English District in convention memorialize Synod that the COP is to establish support 41 and training materials for church workers who self-terminate their Divine Call legitimately; and be it 42 further 43 44 Resolved, That district presidents and circuit visitors work with the workers and congregations of their 45 district to support their called church workers before, during, and after times of termination and self-46 termination; and be it further 47 48 Resolved, That the English District convention send this resolution as an overture to the 2026 Synod 49 convention.

Resolution 4-02

(Overture 4-02, p. 4-20)

To Direct the Office of National Mission to Perform a Systematic Review of All Registered Service Organizations (RSOs)

WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has historically emphasized accountability and doctrinal integrity in its affiliations, ensuring that those organizations receiving its endorsement or partnership remain faithful to the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Titus 1:9, "He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it"); and

WHEREAS, The LCMS recognizes certain organizations as Registered Service Organizations (RSOs), granting them recognition and endorsement, and in some cases financial and institutional support, on the basis that their mission and practices align with biblical and confessional Lutheran teaching, as outlined in LCMS Bylaw 6.2, which establishes the process and requirements for RSO status within the Synod; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.1 states that RSOs must "function in harmony with the programs of the boards of the Synod and in furtherance of the mission and ministry of the church", making it necessary to ensure ongoing compliance with doctrinal standards; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6 places oversight of RSOs under the Office of National Mission (ONM), which evaluates and reviews RSOs to determine whether they remain in alignment with LCMS doctrine and practice; and

WHEREAS, Faithful stewardship requires ongoing review to ensure that these organizations continue to uphold sound doctrine and biblical practices; and

WHEREAS, There is a growing need for transparency and accountability in the work of all organizations affiliated with the church, ensuring that they adhere to biblical principles in matters of faith, morality, and financial stewardship (Luke 16:10, "One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much"); and

WHEREAS, The LCMS must take seriously its responsibility to avoid supporting or endorsing organizations that have drifted from the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Romans 16:17, "I appeal to you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and create obstacles contrary to the doctrine that you have been taught; avoid them"); therefore, be it

Resolved, That the LCMS Office of National Mission, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of presidents, conduct a systematic review of all RSOs, ensuring that each organization maintains alignment with biblical teaching and the doctrinal position of the LCMS; and be it further

Resolved, That this review assess each RSO's doctrinal stance, financial stewardship, and ethical practices in light of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions; and be it further

Resolved, That the ONM, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of presidents and in accordance with LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6, to take corrective action regarding any RSO found to be doctrinally or ethically out of alignment with LCMS teachings, including but not limited to placing the

organization on probationary status, requiring doctrinal correction, or, if necessary, revoking RSO status; and be it further

Resolved, That the LCMS ONM, in coordination with the various mission office and the council of presidents, shall take immediate action to revoke the RSO status of any organization that is publicly known to be acting in direct opposition to the doctrine of the Synod, including but not limited to those engaged in unlawful activity, those who abet lawbreakers, those who affirm or promote same-sex relationships, or those who facilitate the adoption of children to same-sex couples; and be it further

Resolved, That any RSO whose status has been revoked due to doctrinal or ethical violations may apply for reinstatement, provided that the organization demonstrates repentance, publicly renounces its previous errors, and affirms in writing its adherence to the biblical and confessional teachings of the LCMS; and be it further

Resolved, That organizations found to be out of alignment with LCMS doctrine be given a clear path to correction and reinstatement, provided they demonstrate repentance and a return to biblical and confessional teaching (Galatians 6:1, "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness"); and be it further

Resolved, That the findings of this review be reported in their entirety to the Synod and made available for the benefit of congregations and members of the LCMS; and be it finally

Resolved, That the LCMS reaffirm its commitment to biblical stewardship, ensuring that all partnerships and affiliations reflect the mission and values of Christ's Church as taught in Holy Scripture and confessed in the Lutheran Confessions.

1 **Resolution 4-03** 2 (Overture 4-03, p. 4-22) 3 4 To Affirm the Board of Regents and Administration of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor 5 in Their Efforts to Resolve Financial Deficits 6 7 WHEREAS, In February 2024 the Board of Regents of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor 8 (CUWAA), President Erik Ankerberg, and the administration of both campuses were confronted with 9 financial realities that included a growing financial deficit; and 10 11 WHEREAS, The Ann Arbor campus had been unable to generate auxiliary revenue sufficient to meet its 12 needs leading to an annual average operational shortfall of \$4 million for the entire university; and 13 14 WHEREAS, We recognize that CUWAA is a Lutheran higher education community of the Lutheran 15 Church-Missouri Synod serving a focused educational mission in the world accountable for responsible 16 stewardship; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Christians may disagree over how to handle challenging situations which may be concerning 19 and painful for many to hear, especially students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and other CUAA and 20 CUW stakeholders and the Ann Arbor community; and 21 22 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have 23 demonstrated resolve and intentional strategic thought as they considered a variety of initiatives 24 designed to better position CUWAA for the future; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have 28 demonstrated faithful Christian leadership in their service to the students, faculty, staff, and Synod in a 29 fair, reasonable, and responsible manner recognizing that as sinful, fallible mortals their communication 30 efforts could have been handled better; therefore be it 31 32 Resolved, That the Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA be 33 commended for making the necessary decisions to ensure that CUWAA is financially secure and 34 sustainable for future generations; and be it further 35 36 Resolved, That by our prayers they would be encouraged in their responsibility to be "steadfast, 37 immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" 38 (1 Corinthians 15:58 ESV); and be it further 39 40 Resolved, That the English District continue to pray in good faith for the ongoing efforts of the Board of 41 Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA; and be it further

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Resolved, That the English District continue to pray for the students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and
 other stakeholders of Concordia Ann Arbor as these initiatives have and continue to have impact on the
 Ann Arbor campus; and be it finally
 Resolved, That since CUWAA directly impacts our churches, schools, and ministries and in the spirit of
 fraternal support and encouragement; the English District receive a report at its next Convention
 regarding the outcomes, benefits, and the ongoing efforts of the Board of Regents, President Ankerberg,

2025 ENGLISH DISTRICT NOMINATION REPORT District President

Synod Bylaw 4.3.1 requires the election of a District President by each District:

A president shall be elected from the clergy roster of the Synod by each district. Two or more vice-presidents, a secretary, and a circuit visitor for each circuit established by the district shall be elected from the clergy roster of the district. In the case of regional selections, nominees shall be from the clergy roster of the district with membership in a congregation in the designated region. (This shall also be the case for all other regional selections.)

Synod Bylaw 4.7.1 permits Districts to develop their own nominating process in harmony with the provisions of the Synod Bylaws:

Each district may adopt regulations for the nomination and election of its president; the nomination, selection, election, ranking, and succession in case of vacancies of its vice-presidents; and the nomination or selection of any regional officers or regional board of directors members, as long as these provisions do not conflict with the Bylaws of the Synod.

District Bylaw 5.2.1 outlines the process that the English District has established for the nomination of candidates for District President:

Each member congregation of the District shall be entitled to nominate from the clergy roster of the Synod two (2) ordained ministers as candidates for District President:

- (a) Six months prior to opening date of the District Convention, the District Secretary shall send a letter to the member congregations of the District requesting each congregation to submit nominations.
- (b) Nominations for District President shall be accepted by the District Secretary up to four months prior to the opening date of the District Convention. He shall report in the *Convention Workbook* the names and tallies of all ordained ministers who have received nominating votes.
- (c) The names of the five (5) ordained ministers who receive the highest number of nominating votes and consent to serve shall form the slate of candidates. There shall be no opportunity provided for additional nominations.
- (d) The District Secretary shall request from each candidate a description of the candidate's experience and qualifications, as well as a statement concerning his candidacy. These shall be published and distributed to all the convention delegates at least six weeks prior to the convention.

Following this nominating process, each congregation of the English District had opportunity to nominate two members of the ordained clergy roster of the Synod to serve as District President. Sixty-four (64) congregations submitted valid District President nominating ballots that were received by the February 26, 2025 deadline.

In everything that I do, by God's grace, I am fully committed to the Scriptures, the Book of Concord, and my ordination vows. - (a) Six months prior to opening date of the District Convention, the District Secretary shall send a letter to the member congregations of the District requesting each congregation to submit nominations.
- (b) Nominations for Vice-President shall be accepted by the District Secretary up to four months prior to the opening date of the District Convention. He shall report in the *Convention Workbook* the names and tallies of all ordained ministers who have received nominating votes.
- (c) The names of the three (3) ordained ministers from each region who receive the most nominating votes and consent to serve shall form the slate of candidates. There shall be no opportunity provided for additional nominations.
- (d) The District Secretary shall request from each candidate a description of the candidate's experience and qualifications, as well as a statement concerning his candidacy. These shall be published and distributed to all the convention delegates at least six weeks prior to the convention.

Following this nominating process, each congregation of the English District had opportunity to nominate two members of the ordained clergy roster of the District holding congregational membership within its region to serve as District Vice-President. Fifty-three (53) congregations submitted qualifying District Vice-President nominating ballots that were received by the February 26, 2025 deadline (Eastern Region -14; Lake Erie Region -17; Midwestern Region -8; Western Region -14).

As established by District Bylaw 5.3.1(c), the slate of candidates for District Vice-President is limited to the three (3) ordained ministers from each region who receive the highest number of nominating votes and consent to stand for election. No floor nominations are permitted for this office.

The nominating process for Western Region Vice-President led to multiple individuals with the third-highest number of nominating votes consenting to serve, a situation not explicitly addressed in the current District Bylaws. To deal with that situation, the principle established for the elections of Synod President and First Vice-President in Synod Bylaw 3.12.2.1(b) was followed: "In the event of the death, declination, or unavailability of any candidate, the nominee having the next highest number of votes shall become a candidate. *In the event of a tie for the final candidate position, all names involved in the tie shall be included as candidates.*" [emphasis added] This results in four (4) candidates appearing on the ballot for Vice-President from the Western Region.

ENGLISH DISTRICT NOMINATION REPORT

Secretary, Board of Directors, Endowment Fund Board of Managers, District Committee on Nominations, Synod Committee for Convention Nominations

Each District of the Synod is required to elect a Secretary [Synod Bylaw 4.3.1], a Board of Directors [Synod Bylaw 4.5.1], and a Committee on Nominations [Synod Bylaw 4.7.2]. These requirements are fulfilled by the District, as it elects a Secretary from the clergy roster of the District; a Board of Directors with ordained ministers, commissioned ministers, and laypersons elected with regional limitation or at-large [District Bylaw 9.1.1]; and a Committee on Nominations with ordained ministers and commissioned ministers or laypersons elected from each region [District Bylaw 3.5].

Synod Bylaw 4.7.1 permits Districts to develop their own nominating process in harmony with the provisions of the Synod Bylaws:

Each district may adopt regulations for the nomination and election of its president; the nomination, selection, election, ranking, and succession in case of vacancies of its vice-presidents; and the nomination or selection of any regional officers or regional board of directors members, as long as these provisions do not conflict with the Bylaws of the Synod.

Additionally, Districts may elect other officers, boards, and commissions as are required for execution of the business of the District [Synod Constitution XII.4]. Using that authority, the English District has established a Board of Managers for its Endowment Fund, which has four members elected by the Convention [Endowment Fund Governing Document 5.3.1].

The nominating process for the Board of Directors is outlined in District Bylaw 5.4; the nominating process for District Secretary, Committee on Nominations, Endowment Fund Managers, and Other Boards or Committees is outlined in District Bylaw 5.5. Following those processes, congregations of the District, members of the District, and members of District congregations had opportunity to nominate individuals for election as Secretary, Directors of the District, members of the Committee on Nominations, and Managers of the Endowment Fund [District Bylaw 5.4.1; District Bylaw 5.5.1]. This process began on September 26, 2024; the deadline for submitting nominations to the Committee on Nominations was February 26, 2025 [District Bylaw 5.4.1(a); District Bylaw 5.5.1(b)].

The English District is also required to elect one member and an alternate to the Synod Committee for Convention Nominations in preparation for the 2026 Synod Convention. Based upon the rotation of Districts and the assigned roles established by Synod Bylaws 3.12.3.2 and 3.12.3.3, the individuals to be elected are to be professional church workers. Nominations for this position were solicited through the process outlined in District Bylaw 5.5.

The Committee on Nominations has prepared a slate of candidates for election by the Convention Delegates [District Bylaw 5.4.2; District Bylaw 5.5.1]. The slate of candidates and their biographical statements, grouped by office, are listed on the following pages. The slate of candidates can be amended by the Convention, following the process for floor nominations [District Bylaws 5.4.3 and 5.5.2].
